It is related by Thomas Hughes Nolen, b. 1859 and residing in 1940 in Jackson, Butts County, Georgia, a G.I.G.Y. man, that it was told to him as a child that the family resided before the Revolutionary War at Noland's Landing or Ferry in Virginia. This would place them in Loudoun County, Va., where Philip Noland established ca 1750 a ferry across the Potomac River, variously referred to as Noland's Ferry or Noland's Landing. Stephen No(w)land on moving from Charles County, Maryland, may have stopped at Noland's Landing in Loudoun County, Va., for a period prior to settling in Frederick County, Va. He further recalls that older generations of the descendants of Philip Noland of Loudoun County, Va., and his family residing contemporaneously with each other in Va. and Md. It is his family which

Re 1790 Census: After careful study it is assumed that the Steven Noland listed therein is the Father, Stephen Nowland/Noland, Senior, and that the James Noland, Shad Noland and William Noland are his sons. It is not known who the Susanah Noland is, it is logical to assume that she is the widow of one of the sons of the father, Stephen Nowland/Noland, Senior, very probably the widow of David Nowlin, a record of whom is found in the Courthouse, Fairfield District, South Carolina, Volume G, Page 55, when on September 27, 1788, he witnessed a deed from Jane Rogers to Shadrack Noland, and later proven by him on March 20, 1790. Since he is not listed in the 1790 Census and 1800 Census it is assumed that he probably died between March 20, 1790 and the date of taking the 1790 Census. It will be noted that David Noland, Junior, is listed in the 1810 Census.

It is not known and can not be explained at this late, why two other sons, Stephen Noland, Junior, and George Noland, known to have been living in Fairfield District, South Carolina, in 1790, are not listed in the 1790 Census.

It is assumed that Stephen Nowland/Noland, Senior, the father, died subsequent to the 1790 Census and prior to the 1800 Census. The Stephen Knowland listed in the 1800 Census is presumed to be the son, Stephen Noland, Junior. The one son "under 16" and the five females listed for Steven Noland in the 1790 Census can not be identified, the father Stephen Nowland/Noland, Senior, if living in 1790, was at least 65 years of age, it is not known whether or not his wife was living in 1790, it may be assumed that a widowed daughter with one young son and three or four young daughters was living with him.
