JENKINSVILLE — Matriarch and businesswoman Unita O'Neal Pearson of Jenkinsville passed away on Saturday, Oct. 13, 2012, at Gwinnett Medical Center in Lawrenceville, Ga.

Mrs. Pearson lived in Duluth, Ga. for many years with her three surviving daughters, Mercy (Grady Thomas), Pam (Ronley Williams), Marvy (James Moore) and her grandchildren.

She was born on Oct. 27, 1926, to Walter Wise and Hattie Lakin O'Neal in Jenkinsville, where she lived most of her life. Her husband, the late Fred Douglas Pearson Sr., also of Jenkinsville, and her youngest child, Walter Wayne (Vanessa) Pearson, preceded her in death.

In addition to her Pearson daughters, devoted leaves two Fred sons, Douglas Pearson (Deborah) Jr. of Greenville and William Vincent Pearson Sr. (Renetta) of Irmo to cherish her memories.

She also served as the operator of the water company, responsible for every facet of the department from meter reading, to billing, collections and quality control.

Her legacy as the "water lady" was known for many miles throughout the county.

Pearson's professional pursuits were entrepreneurial in nature and she blazed trails for women every step of the way. Whether she was earning income with her tractor, dump truck, pulpwood truck, mechanic prowess or volunteering with the fire department, it was clear that she was courageous enough to be a female in these non-traditional occupations.

She was very proud of her children and their professional accomplishments as they followed in her footsteps.

Pearson was an inspiration to many, friend to most and stranger to none in the way she travelled throughout her community.

She was sought out to help with difficult situations, consulted when complex matters needed navigation, and often was included in crucial matters pertaining to friends and family.

Pearson was always there for nieces and nephews and as "Grandma" was an important and strong presence in the lives of each and every one of her grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Whether she was known as "Ms. Pearson, Ms. Nita, Aunt Nita, Grandma or the Water Lady," she was always there with compassion and dependable action.

A true sports fan, she was regularly seen in the stands (and sometimes as a sideline referee) at many basketball games, a sport that she excelled at in her

youth.
