Four Doctors of the Pickett Family locate in Worth Co.

There were four doctors of the Pickett family who moved to Worth County from Webster Co.

Dr. Jesse Havis Pickett [son of Jeptha Pickett (1788-1851) & his 2<sup>nd</sup> wife, Jane Havis. His first wife, Nancy Boulware, died in 1826.] the oldest of them and the half uncle of the other three, came in 1881 and settled in Ty Ty, GA. He lived there until his death in 1903. Ty Ty was not cut off into Tift County until after his death. So he was a citizen of Worth County all those years.

Jeptha B. (called Jack) Pickett [Jr.] was the next to come to Worth County. He located at Sumner in 1885. Sumner was the metropolis of Worth County at the time.

Dr. Reuben R. Pickett was the third in the order to come to Worth County. He came in 1892 and located at Sumner and was associated with his brother, Dr. Jack Pickett in the practice of medicine until the latter moved to Springfield, LA.

The last and youngest of these brothers was Dr. Frank Brown Pickett. He came in 1897 and located in Ty Ty, GA. He is the only one now living in this year of 1934.

The geneology of the Picketts show them to be descended from John Pickett, a Revolutionary Soldier mentioned in Archives of Historical Commission at Columbia, SC. Several of his grandsons moved from SC to Stewart, Webster and Sumter Counties, GA. This family of Picketts has given distinguished service in all American Wars. These doctors of Worth County are closely related to Major General George Edward Pickett, who made the famous charge at Gettysburg. They are descended from Edward Mobley and son, Samuel Mobley, of upper SC and Andrew Feaster, all of whom were Revolutionary soldiers.

Dr. Jeptha B. Pickett, Jr.

Dr. Jeptha B. Pickett, known as Dr. Jack, was born in Webster County, GA in 1860. He graduated in Medicine at Atlanta College of Physicians and Surgeons in 1885. He came to Worth County and located at Sumner, where he built up a large practice. He married twice in Worth County, first to Miss Maude Cornelia Hill, and after her death to Miss Mattie Hill. They were members of a large and splendid family of the county. By the last marriage he had one daughter, Maude Pickett. He moved in the 1890's to Springfield, LA, and there he married Miss Nevie Watts and had two children by this union, Nevie and Violet. He died in 1906. After his death his wife, (Mrs. Nevie Watts Pickett) moved to Ty Ty, GA, where she lived until their daughters were grown.
