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# ROUND THE WORLD BY CABLE

## Russian Ambassador Leaves Germany Protesting Against Insult.—Scotch Labour Member Preaches Violence.—Less Emigration from England than before the War

## Germany in the Throes of General Election.—Big Political Struggle in Newfoundland—English Soccer Season Ended.

### SOVIET AMBASSADOR LEAVES GERMANY.

Berlin, May 3. M. Krestinsky, Russian Soviet Ambassador to Germany, left for Moscow to-night. His departure is a sequel to the action of the Berlin Police in entering the building of the Russian trade delegation and searching the house from roof to cellar for a Communist against whom a warrant had been issued.

### LABOUR EXHORTED TO BE DISCONTENTED.

Glasgow, May 4. The feature of the largest May day celebration ever held in Glasgow postponed until to-day was the speech by J. Maxton, Glasgow Labour member of the House of Commons, who exhorted the crowd to eschew the word tranquility and embrace on their banner the word "discontent". Mr. Maxton added as long as we have such conditions don't be peaceful even for the sake of the Labour Government. Politics is not a game now but a very definite and bitter class war which cannot be fought with kid glove methods.

### EMIGRATION FROM ENGLAND LESS THAN IN 1913.

London, May 4. Since the creation of the overseas settlement committee 44,200 immigrants have been assisted under the Empire settlement Act; 31,235 to Australia, 6,830 to New Zealand, and 6,195 to Canada. In the light of these figures and tendencies the report says it is at least safe to assert that there is no prospect of migration reducing the number of the population of Great Britain in a manner injurious to posterity. As a matter of fact the total migration from this country last year though substantially larger than that of the previous year was less by 133,000 than in 1913.

### THE GERMAN ELECTIONS.

Berlin, May 4. General elections took place throughout Germany. Advance reports from all the Metropolitan centres and industrial sections indicate an exceptionally heavy vote, the total exceeding 80 per cent. in numerous precincts as compared with 78 four years ago. Only a few disturbances were reported in and outside of Berlin. The voting in the occupied areas proceeded without obstruction. A very large socialist, and communist vote was registered in the Ruhr, Saxony, Thuringia, and the industrial districts of greater Berlin. In the local residential precincts the German Nationalists and the Ludendorff Party led the others.

### BIG FIGHT EXPECTED IN NEWFOUNDLAND.

St. John's, N.F., May 4. Premier Warren, according to the make up of his new Cabinet which was sworn in before Governor Allardice on Saturday afternoon, has undertaken to fight the approaching election with his former political foe ranked under his banner while his former associates are organized against him throughout the Country. The new Warren Executive consists of: W. R. Warren, Prime Minister and Minister of Justice, W. J. Higgins, Colonial Secretary, H. S. Su Ivan, Minister of Finance and Customs, M. E. Hawco, Minister of Posts, W. R. Bennett, W. S. Munroe, Charles P. Aye, J. Alex. Alexander, Robinson Executive members without portfolio, W. Windsor and W. J. Walsh Minister without seats in the Executive, former having the portfolio of Fisheries and the latter of Agriculture and Mines.

The whole Government personnel with the exception of Hon. M. Hawco, comes from the old opposition Party which was defeated.

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### DEATH OF GIFTED WRITER AND ARTIST.

It is with the deepest regret that we record the passing away of Mrs. Alpheus Hervey. (Hanna Rion) wife of Dr. Alpheus Hervey of the Cocoon, Warwick, whose unexpected death came as a sudden blow to all her friends in Bermuda and will be received as such by the numbers who knew and admired her beyond its shores.

Mrs. Hervey had gone to the King Edward's Memorial Hospital to have attention for her eyes about four weeks ago and whilst there she was found to be suffering from another serious form of illness which caused her medical attendants grave anxiety. Unhappily their fears were too well founded and the patient sank rapidly, the end coming on Sunday evening, May 4th, after a long period of unconsciousness.

The deepest sympathy will be felt for Dr. Hervey in his bereavement and for Mrs. Trehwella, Mrs. Hervey's only daughter, who only returned home in May last after spending the winter with her mother in Bermuda. We understand that she has been cabled for but cannot arrive until some time next week.

It is difficult, even for those who knew her best, to say all that could be said of the extraordinarily gifted personality of the late Mrs. Hervey. Her work as an artist is known both in America and England where some of her pictures are at present exhibition. Her talents as a portrait painter were shewn remarkably during the past winter when she completed several works of a

Her landscapes, of scenes in America, in Cornwall, England, and particularly in Bermuda, for which she had a special love, have found a place in many homes and galleries. As a colourist and re-producer of some of the loveliest parts of our island, she stands alone.

Her musical gifts were greatly beyond the average and as a writer under the name of Hanna Rion she had a charm and fancy peculiar to herself. She had also great skill in gardening and loved flowers and animals with a devotion that they repaid by responding in growth and affection.

Those who were privileged to be frequent guests at the charming home which Mrs. Hervey had created at "The Cocoon", in Warwick, will not need to be reminded of the delightful hospitality the unfailing gaiety and sympathy always to be met with from her, who will be remembered by many, even by those who were only casual guests, as one of the most gracious and gifted women they have ever known.

Born in the Southern States, the daughter of a distinguished judge, Mrs. Hervey had inherited the traditions of an old and wealthy family. It is some years ago since she first came here, where her talents soon found recognition and which she always loved as if it had been her home. Her marriage to Dr. Hervey, a scientist of great reputation, who is also a lover of Bermuda took place about two years ago and all her friends had hoped that her happiness might long continue.

The funeral service was held at Mrs. Hervey's late home yesterday afternoon, when the Rev. Dr. Francis L. Patton gave an address at the short service which was held there. The interment took place at Christ Church, Warwick, the service at the grave being conducted by the Rev. A. S. A. Bishop, Pastor.
