

Sgt Meng, who has been overseas since Aug. 1942, saw action in Africa, Italy, France, Belgium and Germany. He was wounded Jan. 9, 1945, in Germany, when a mortar shell hit his tank, and was awarded the Purple Heart. He spent some time in hospitals in France and England.

A member of the 813th Tank Destroyer Battalion, Sgt. Meng entered the service March 30, 1942, received his basic training at Fort Bragg. At the expiration of his leave May 12, he will report to Fort Story, Virginia.
