

John Tidwell seems to have been dead by 1716. In that year a suit on behalf of his estate was settled in favor of his brother Richard (II). The settlement called for John's guardian to turn over to Richard 4,000 pounds of tobacco on the grounds that "the said John Tydwell hath not been heard of for many years." This settlement probably represented John's share of his father's estate.

Ann Tidwell married Charles Brown, who in May, 1700 brought suit against Andrew Delabree to answer objections against him in behalf of Robert Tydwell, son of Richard Tydwell, deceased, and Brother of Ann Tydwell Brown. (Order Book 1698-1705, p. 82).

Peter Tidwell was born about 1688. In 1698, at the age of ten, Peter was apprenticed to John Clements. (Order Book 1690-98, p. 256a). In January, 1702, Peter was ordered by the Court to remain with Jane Clements, widow of John Clements. On February 26, 1718, Richard Tydwell (II) and Robert Tydwell recovered 4000 pounds of tobacco from Peter's guardians, Roger Wigginton (who had married the widow Clements), John Garner and Samuel Damourvell. This settlement was for Peter's portion of his father's estate and was handed over to his brothers based on the fact "neither is it known whether he be living".

A great deal is known about Robert Tidwell. As has already been stated, he was placed under the care of his
