18. 16 September 1795, William Tidwell sold tract of land on Hog Fork of Wateree Creek to his brother John Tidwell (part of original grant to Presley Tidwell).

North Carolina:

23 November 1771, John Tidwell and wife Mary sold 221 acres on Allison Creek in Surrey County, North Carolina to James Williams for 100 pounds.

From the first U.S. Census, which was taken in 1790, we find that 91 Tidwells were enumerated, six in North Carolina and the remainder in South Carolina. From the following table, it is apparent that sons greatly outnumbered daughters. Please note that out of the 91 Tidwells counted, there are only 38 females...and that number includes wives and widows as well as daughters. Please note that there were 35 Tidwell boys under the age of 16. Apparently the older generation of the Tidwell brothers, Richard (III), William, John and Francis were already dead as their names do not appear on the census rolls. The ones bearing the traditional family names of John, William, etc. were sons or nephews of the older ones, since they still had very young families.
