I'm not sure what to make of this. Most of it is highly inaccurate.

"Children of Hans Georg Wagner and Elizabeth Johnstone are:" -- I've never seen a contemporary document that clearly attributes his name as "Hans Georg".

"we read that Marie Delashmette, descended from a French marquis. The real name of Marie Delashmette = Marie Louise Julie de la Riviere de La Fayette (1737 -03 April 1770)" -- No. Not even close. Her family members also moved to Fairfield Co, SC -- Elias Delashmette was a Tory Captain.

"She was the wife of Michel Louis Christophe Mortier de La Fayette, Marquis de La Fayette (13 August 1731 - 9 July 1759) been. Her French husband, was banished by Louis XIV, to America, where he died. Both had a son Marie-Joseph-Paul-Yves-Roch-Gilbert du Motier, Marquis de La Fayette or Lafayette (September 6, 1757 Chavaniac, France, May 20, 1834 in Paris, It is General Lafayette, who fought in Chickahominy, Mississippi, as it is written in Moberleys and Their Connection. After the war he returned to France. Have had for this name counterfeiting there was a reason, whether you had a certain influence in society, which could happen unnoticed such a deed. Had perhaps the family of the Marquis in France, from hereditary reasons, trying to conceal half-siblings of General Lafayette in America. Was it the general himself, or was the reason the assets and the land of the general in America?" -- Oh my, where to begin....well, General Lafayette's father was dead in 1759 in France -- so how did he manage to also die in the American Colonies, you might ask. You can also see a picture of his wife Marie blah blah Riviere, which is interesting if she was supposed to be a commoner's wife in Fairfield SC. And she died, in France, at her father's home, in 1770. Another interesting question of how she pulled that off while she was simultaneously giving birth to a daughter in Fairfield Co, SC.

"We'll probably never know. Only in America with a child 2 years old, married Marie Delashmette (de Lafayette), Hans Wagner. 1961 her son, Isaac Wagner comes to the world. Then the other children. General Lafayette's stepfather is Hans Wagner. He grew up in his family, his mother died in 1770, is perhaps after the birth of her last Child. 1771 was hans wagner widower.. General Lafayette was orphaned at age 13." -- Lafayette lived with his grandmother in France after his father died, Lafayette was commissioned in the military at 13 and attended college in Paris. He was a Major General at 19 (Good Lord!). He came to the Americas to fight in the early years at Brandywine, then went back. He landed at Georgetown and met either Maj Benjamin Huger and his oystermen (according to Lafayette himself) or John Buchanan and "Pompey / Fortune" (according to local legends). So actually, we do know -- it's all factually wrong.

"His education by the Moravian Brethren and the Christian family of Hans Wagner, he has not forgotten." -- Except he was educated at the College du Plessis, part of the University of Paris, not at any Moravian seminary in the boonies of Maryland or North Carolina.

"He builds a hotel in the capital of Moravia, Olomouc Olomouc today, befitting to live there when he visited his brothers in Moravia." - Surely you jest.

"I have seen it written Lashly in information furnished to me as the wife of Clement Moberley a son of the first South Carolina Moberley." -- No, you have seen the name John Lashley in records, because John Lashley was a person who owned land in Fairfield County -- on Beaver Creek no less. That is not John Delashmette.

"Mr. Wade Brice informed Miss Marion Durham, was that the Marquis DeLashmette, that he was a French nobleman, banished from France for political offenses against the Monarchy of Louis XIV, he owned nearly a principality of land, some on the Yadkin River in North Carolina," -- In the mid-1800's to early-1900's, everybody in the colonies prior to the Revolutionary War was an exiled nobleman according to local traditions. Or an Indian Princess. Or both -- an Exiled Noble Indian Princess...related to a Magna Carta Baron. It is complete BS. The Delashmettes are French, probably Huguenot to explain why they ended up in Maryland in the early 1700's, but they could have been spillovers from New France just as easily -- come down from Canada, or got stranded on the way to Canada, etc. You rarely get insight into the motivations for people showing up in early America. Elias Delashmette SR is on the Maryland records with Hans Waggoner.

married Capt. Andrew McLean Whose daughter Katie married John Mobley. Therefore it may
be well to note right here that the descendants of John Mobley and his wife Katie are
descended from Hans Wagner through two wives, Marie DeLashmette and Elizabeth

Johnstone. The DeLashmette name in this country has been corrupted to DeLashmette, and I have seen it written Lashly in information furnished to me as the wife of Clement Moberley a son of the first South Carolina Moberley. The first DeLashmette to come to this country, Mr. Wade Brice informed Miss Marion Durham, was that the Marquis DeLashmette, that he was a French nobleman, banished from France for political offenses against the Monarchy of Louis XIV, he owned nearly a principality of land, some on the Yadkin River in North Carolina, that he once owned the lands on which Mr. Brice lived and now owned by his widow, Mrs. Matilda Brice near Woodward, SC The deed is on record here at Winnsboro. Some have thought the Marquis moved with other DeLashmette's to Kentucky, but that is an error. He went from South Carolina to Chickahominy, Mississippi.
