Introduction to our Research on the Walker and Related Lines in Chester, SC

When this project started Bill Gregory, Chester, SC offered to do Court House look-ups for me (Peggy in this report) to see if he could locate information about my ancestor Col. Wm. Walker of Chester who married Rachel Eliza McCullough of prob. York County. Bill went to the Court House each day and sent me what he found about ANY Walkers in Chester County. When he talks about "my Col. William", he is referring to my gr gr grandfather, Col William Walker who shows in the 1850 and 1860 Chester Census with his wife Rachel Eliza [McCullough] Walker and amily. He died before the 1870 Census and Rachel died in 1870.

I soon realized it was escalating into a big project with many Walkers mentioned. We decided to put what he found into a Timeline of events.

Any help with untangling all these Walkers, especially the Williams, will be greatly appreciated.

I have reason to believe that my Walker family had ties of some sort to Oktibbeha, MS that might have ended about 1855 or 1860 when one of the Walker girls wrote a very short piece about saying goodbye to Oktibbeha. You will note multiple references to the Cornwells. Two of Col. Wm. Walker's daughters married Cornwells. Also included are references to the Kennedys. They were likely connected to the early Walkers or McCulloughs and one of "my" Walkers married Allen (Alan) Kennedy.

Virginia thinks she has found Rachel Eliza McCullough's parents. That is a huge breakthrough as my family has been searching for about 45 years for parents of either Col. William or Rachel. If correct, her father was Thomas McCullough married to Rachel Conley. Widow McCullough owned land in York County. In 1826 she had daughters Mary, Sarah, Dorothy, and Rachel Eliza in her household. The family may have lived in Chester County at one time.

I think it prudent to put in the genealogy of Col. Wm. And Rachel as we believe it to be. The Outline Descendant Chart is at the end of this Introduction. It may clarify for you the family I am looking for. I descend from Emma Oni Walker. Any and all information will be appreciated by me and my "Cousin" Ellouise Hall who can be reached at

My gr grandmother Emma Oni Walker married Eugene Hart and had one daughter, my grandmother Jessie May Hart [Shuman]. Eugene appears to have deserted the family soon after Jessie's birth and Emma raised her alone – with the help of relatives and specifically by Dr. Cornwell.

Ellouise's ancestor, Batie Narcissus Jennings Walker married two times. Once to a Jarrell and second to a Dooley.

The members of this Walker family died young. The Civil War was brutal on them. Col. Wm. Did not serve in the War. He died in 1862. Most of the children remaining after the War ended and their mother's death in 1870 went to Charlotte, NC to start a new life.

We are in need of descendants, especially direct male descendants of Col. Wm. to test for DNA. I think the only possibility of a direct male would be through William Roseborough Walker who did leave a male line. My siblings and I have tested and Ellouise's father tested, but none of us are the direct male line. If you know anyone willing to test, please contact me and I will put you in touch with my son who can guide you about which test to submit. There are many tests to consider now and some do not yield the results you are looking for. I don't want you to waste your money on a test that won't yield results for the project.

PHILIP WALKER, (1740 -1794), son of Alexander and Esther, raised a company in Col. Richard Richardson's regiment for service in the Cherokee War of 1776, and furnished a

wagon for transporting supplies. He lost his left ear on October 29, 1777, when two of his neighbors - Capt. Peter Nance and William Henderson - hired a man to bite it off, and was ever afterward known as "Philip Walker Esqr." From May 11 to June 20, 1778, Captain Walker's company was with Col. John Winn on an expedition for the relief of Georgia from British invasion. Then in December 1778 he marched his company to Ninety Six, South Carolina, and took prisoners from there by way of Moncks Corner to Charleston. From there he marched to Gen. Benjamin Lincoln's headquarters at Black Swamp where his company was attached to Col. Maurice Simons' command under Gen. William Moultrie. Retreating in front of the British Gen. Augustine Prevost's troops, it participated in the battle of Coosawhatchie Bridge on May 3, 1779. They marched on to Charleston and remained there until after the battle of Stono Ferry. After the surrender of Charleston the next year, Captain Walker raised another company and was with Sumter on his rounds and the following year marched to the Low Country and was in the battle of Biggin Church on July 17, 1781.

During the summer of 1782 he succeeded Capt. Joseph Palmer as purchasing commissary for Colonel Lacey's regiment and was at the Congarees and Orangeburgh. He was appointed a justice of the peace for Camden District on February 16, 1782, and held this position until his death in April 1794. He married Rebecca Gay (September 26, 1742 post 1826), daughter of Capt. Samuel Gay of York County, but formerly of Augusta county, Virginia. They were the parents of the following children:

ESTHER (c. 1764 - June 12, 1834), married March 17, 1788, Jonathan Hemphill (1760-February 1, 1826), a Revolutionary soldier, and son of James and Abigail (Gay) Hemphill; moved in 1796 to Washington county, Georgia and later to Jackson county, and had four children - Charles Jonathan (1789-1884), married January 20, 1820, Rebecca Boyle; Nancy Agnes (October 19, 1791-April 1, 1862), married November 22, 1810, Col. 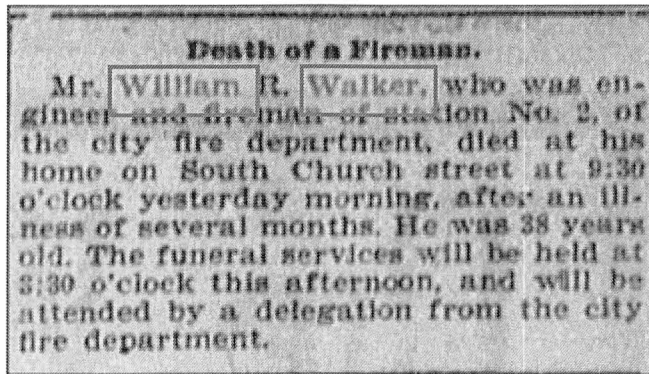

well... the 1850 census is him (my Col. Wm.) with RE, but he shows no cash assets and also  
it states all of them were born in south Carolina....

If he had of had any cash ... seems he would have had it in 1850... and there were several  
tenement houses in that area at that time.

I had not thought of that. I bet they had to sell everything when he died. So you are thinking  
that he might not have had any land or house to sell after his death? Or for his family to stay  
in after his death? That does make sense with the different family living units after the  
mother's death. Evidently no relatives came forward to help the three youngest children  
when the mother died. Also the journey to Charlotte to better themselves. Maybe they had  
nothing in Chester.

then in 1860... the entire family [Col. Wm. Is still alive in this census] is living in [his] hotel  
with other boarders or guests. a total of 22 person in the building... just suppose the family  
lived in 4 rooms, then a parlor and kitchen and dining room and two guests per room... that  
would have been 12 rooms...

It must have been a large building...

and William has \$ 500.00 meaning that it was not just your average 5 bedroom room  
boarding house.

it had to have been much larger...

that is a possibility or... maybe a relative or older sibling in Charlotte to help them or a  
relative in Chester to finance their move and give references for them

if they all were living in the hotel, and they were the William and Elizabeth, that I looked at today that sold their property in 1859, that might have been when they made move into hotel...

But I can not imagine a hotel owner letting 10 persons in a family move into his uilding.... He probably owned that hotel.... maybe his debts forced him to consolidate property and the family moving into the hotel???

well... Creditors may have seized the hotel.

Peg...

To have 8 children, and to manage to have \$500.00 at that time was an accomplishment. Do you think he might have inherited some cash between 1850 and 1860... maybe his family or hers?

also... I see no will for Rachael ... that means either she did not have any property/estate, or had disposed of it before her death....

possibly were business debts.

maybe a walker bankrolled him in the hotel... it may not have been his to loose.

If the list of debts from 1862 was what he owed, his \$500 wouldn't have covered it, especially if there was not any money coming into the family.

Maybe there would be a map of Chester downtown in 1860 that might show hotels.

I do know that at that time the railroad was coming through here... it started about 1858 or so. and several new hotels were built down the hill in the area of the train depot... about 1/2 mile from confederate monument on top of hill east.

well, lets remember that it was only two and three fourths acre... Two and 3/4 acre... a small lot and the deed says it's north boundary was on Pinckney Street.... and ... I notice one man's land that bordered this lot was a Alexander C. Walker?

wonder if he was a relation?

In SC the woman has her dower right...

I think it is something like one third of the property value in those days...

If she does not sign away that right on the deed, when her husband sells a piece of property... Then she could come back after her husband's death and demand that dower right of one third from the new buyer of the property.

Most new buyers insisted on the wife signing this away in land transactions.

Did you get anything out of the 1870 census that I didn't see?

Is there any way of telling if they are in the same house in 1870 as they were in 1860? Rachael had just died, so she must have been living with the family in the 1870 house. Maybe not? If Rachael was sick for very long perhaps the land (if they owned anything) was gifted to the son who took care of the minor children? That was Thomas A. He never married and was in Charlotte in 1880 and dead in 1884.

Sallie was dead by 1862 so she was on her own. She had one child, a Cornwell when she died.

Charles Thomas was in Charlotte in 1870 and 1880 and dead in 1883.

Anna was married and living in Chester in the 1860. She lived next door to a Jno. D. Walker who was a dentist. She lived as a widow with a child in ? in 1870, and in Charlotte in the 1880 census. Dead before 1887. I believe her name was Anna Elizabeth Walker because that is written in a scrapbook.

Batie was married by 1870 (living where?) and was in Charlotte by 1880. Dead by 1884.

Margaret was married in 1870 and living in Chester.

the 1870 census indicates there was at least 3, possibly 4 separate groups living in one dwelling...I had to have been a large building..... this would tell us it was standing in 1860 through 1870 and I t may have taken two years to build,, can say 1858 through 1870

Peg... note that the cooks name in 1870 is Emily McCollum... wonder if she was a former slave of the McCollum family... Maybe Rachael McCullough was in fact a McCollum?

well heck Peg... you told me that they died young... wow...  
Maybe of TB? it was rampant in those days...

Now to the census of 1870... I am seeing what looks like 15 persons that are living in one dwelling... This indicates they are still in the hotel building...  
and note that they have a COOK... so they were not broke, and one person is a barkeeper (Henry Hill), one a blacksmith (Dooley), and one a seamstress and one a carpenter... surely some of these people paid room and board....

and... then close by in separate buildings (probably small tenement cottages) we see some Walker black persons, that were probably former slaves.

(this points to property and land and slaves....in the Walker family)

It seems they all lived very close together in a row, like a hotel and several cottages nearby...

Yes, I conclude they were probably living in the same dwelling as in 1860 census...

Bill

yes. the cook is a black lady and around 37, if I remember... if this census was given during the working day, most likely while most were out of house working, someone else gave the information...

Also there was a large livery stable right in downtown Chester at that time and young green mules were brought into the area on railroad cars and broke and trained in this area...so a blacksmith had work right in downtown...

RE: 1870 census

Do you suppose they were able to sell it to finance going to Charlotte? If the family managed the hotel after William's death they might not have had to pay rent. But then it should have been listed as a hotel in the 1870 census.

I don't know that all three of those groups were relatives. In other words I don't know that they were one big happy family. Bill Gregory  
I had thought of that also... and it could be possible... or the place could have burned and maybe insurance helped them to move to Charlotte.

Peg...

No I do not think they were all related... I think some were living there as their work was in downtown area of Chester and their customers were in that area. such as seamstress and blacksmith... probably boarders... and the cook, may have cooked for the family and boarders...and then went home to her home after preparing evening meal and cleaning kitchen and back in early morning hours...

...most of the time it lists the head of household first who at that time mostly was the man... He handled family business and answered for the family... Wives were often looked on as less and like an adult child, with no decision making power. (sad )and I am sure that most of the time he was out working and not available to answer questions for a census taker. Women were usually the ones closer house itself work and probably were more available to answer questions...But in the majority of the results... the male head of house was always listed first...so I am thinking the evidence is not there to support the person's claim... I have not heard of that policy. Sealy might have bought a lot of things, that he could use in Sealy's hotel.

#### W. T. Sealy - Trying to piece together what we know:

William Walker was listed as "Livery" in 1850

William was a hotel keeper in 1860

William dies - estate sale- Sealy buys a lot of things (1862)

Rachel dies 1870, but kids live in Chester at time of census, but not stated as in a hotel or near W. T. Sealy. The family doesn't seem to be associated with W. T. Sealy at all. I think they went to Charlotte about the time that Sealy went to GA. That is more than likely just a coincidence.

1850 W. T. Sealy, 38, lives in Chester with his parents. (NOT HIM, I GUESS)

1860-1870 notes

Sealy, 38, Chester, is a hotel keeper - doesn't live with or real near William

Sealy attends and buys things at William's estate sale

Sealy, 50, is a hotel keeper in town of Chester (William Walker has been dead 8 years)

Sealy is in Georgia

So one year they were both listed as a hotel keeper (1860). Since their residences are different I would assume they are two different hotels.

One thing to consider is that Sealy either owed or was owed money from William Walker at the time that William Walker died. He is listed in the paper you sent me "Accounts to Estate of Col. William Walker".

HUMMMMM... (a capital HUMMM, means my ears perked up)

The Sealy family was also located out in Baton Rouge Area of Chester County... a new country to town connection... wondering if this Sealy married into Walkers? or McC's (McCullough)?  
McC's out in Baton Rouge also...  
Wonder if Sealy's mother was a McC?

It doesn't look like W. T. Sealy who attended Wm. Walker's estate sale was a relative.

There is a Thomas McCullough in the 1840 Chester county census... that has adults the age of William and Rachel in the home, [This is a good possibility of being my Col. Wm. Walker.] and a male the age of their son Thomas A... However in 1840 Col. Wm. had three children ages 6, 4, and 1. This McCullough household only had one male under 5 years of age.

Near this family were Craig, Robt. Walker, McCormick, Culp, and Sarah McCullough. All names I recognize.

maybe William's father was named Thomas Alexander?

I checked in 1850 and it appears that Thomas McCullough lives with his son Jonas. The three individuals that might have been Col. Wm, Rachel, and their son, Charles Thomas don't appear to be living with Thomas McCullough. Is this a good lead for us?

There are many PATTON and WALKER names listed on the Fishing Creek Presbyterian Church 1774-1776 visitation list of Rev. John Simpson. There is also one BARNET, with a

note to see also BARNAD, of which there are 4 on that visitation list. However, there are no BARNETTs in the cemetery or other records and only one listing for "PATON". That is: "Margaret STRIGHT, alias PATON, Wife of Christopher, Died July 18, 1788, in her 35th year."

The name WALKER is scattered through the records from 1799 until 1809 and also on the visitation list.

Those shown in cemetery records are:

"Jane Rebecca WALKER, Consort of Dr. John A., Died Mar. 23, 1847, in her 23d year."

"Janet WALKER, Died Dec. 12, 1790, aged 80 years."

Below is the transcribed document from pages 1-3 of "Early Records of Fishing Creek Presbyterian Church", the book mentioned in earlier posts.

There is also transcribed the first minutes of the May 14 1799 Session when Rev. Davies was ordained. Both seem to have been written by the same person and Fishing Creek is written throughout with a double line at the bottom between Fishing and creek and creek is all lower case. When these writings are combined with the one Virginia sent, it gives a more complete view of the two churches and the area during that time.

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Pages 1-3

"A brief historical sketch of the church of FishingCreek , in Chester District S. C.

This church was organized about the year 1770. Of its first bench of Elders were Samuel Neely, John Latta, Robert Walker & Robert Lusk. In the year 1770 this church procured the labors of the Rev. John Simpson from New Jersey. He arrived at Fishing\_creek on the 26<sup>th</sup> of November of that year. He was ordained and installed April 6th 1774 in the pastoral charge by the Presbytery of Orange, which embraced the States of North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia.

Mr. Simpson sustained the relation of Pastor to this church in communion with Lower Fishing\_creek, afterwards, Richardson; But having withdrawn from that church he continued the Pastor of this church until 1789, when this relation was dissolved. He however served the church for one year more and then removed to Pendelton District S.C. where he continued his ministerial labors until his death on February 4th 1808.

The congregation remained vacant, with the exception of a few months in 1793, when they were supplied by Mr John Bowman, a licentiate of Orange Presbytery until 1795. In September 1795 the church preferred their call to Mr. William G. Rosebrough a Licentiate of the Presbytery of South Carolina (which was organized in 1785). He took their call under consideration and labored amongst them for two years under considerable infirmity of body and at length was compelled to (return?) their call.

In April 1798 this church gave an invitation to Mr. John B. Davies to labor amongst them, as a (supply?). He was a Licentiate of the Presbytery of South Carolina. His labors proving acceptable, this church in union with Richardson presented their calls to Mr Davies to become their pastor. Mr Davies having accepted their calls he was ordained and installed as the Pastor of the two churches May 4th, 1799. His labors were devoted to the two churches for the space of thirty three years, when (1831) the pastoral charge of Richardson was resigned; but that of Fishing\_creek retained and still continues (1839). When Mr Davies became Pastor of this church its bunch of Elders were Samuel Neely, David Carr, David Neely, Thomas Neely, Thomas Latta to whom was added in 1801 Mr Hugh Gaston.

In 1804 Thomas Neely, Thomas Latta, Hugh Gaston, Josiah Porter, Charles Brown, Wm Walker, D. Davis. In 1808 Thomas Neely, H Gaston, Josiah Porter, Jas Steele, Chs Boyd, Jas Wallis & Samuel Lewis. In 1812 T Neely, H Gaston, J Porter, Ch. Boyd, J. Wallis, S. Lewis, Jas. E. McFadden & John Boyd. In 1820. H Gaston, C. Boyd, S. Lewis, J.E. McFadden, J. Boyd, William Bradford, Edward Crawford, D.A. Rosebrough & John Neely.

In 1827. C. Boyd, S. Lewis, J. Boyd, J. Neely, E. Crawford, Wm Stringfellow, Robert Miller, Alex. Gaston & Josiah H. Gill In 1835 C Boyd, Superannuated, E. Crawford, W. Stringfellow, R Miller, J.E. McFadden, Alex. Crawford & Wm Cowan.

May 14th 1799

Mr John B. Davies was on this day ordained by the Presbytery of South Carolina, to the whole of the gospel ministry, and installed as the Pastor of Fishing\_creek and Richardson

congregations. It was unanimously agreed that Thomas Latta act as clerk for this Session, and that a record of the transactions of the same be kept; and that other papers be preserved. N.B. The members of this Session are Samuel Neely, David Carr, David Neely, Thomas Neely and Thomas Latta.

The only papers now to be found in the hands of this Session are 1. A certificate signed by Hugh Brooke V.D.M, of Burt Ireland stating that Sarah Porter is a member of the church & dismissed in good standing. 2 A certificate stating that William Brown & Wife Jane, Charles & Archibald his sons, also Will. Thorn & his wife were of fair and good standing when dismissed. Signed by Rev. John Lewson & William Allen. & 3 A certificate from Rev. Sam W Yongue Pastor of Leban, recommending as in good standing Thomas Wright & Nancy his wife.

I did get your ancestry information. You should send it to "The Bulletin". [schustel@comporium.net](mailto:schustel@comporium.net) While I was going through my information on the Walkers of Sandy River, I found a William Walker that was about the same age of Col. William Walker. His parents were John Walker 1777-1866 and Elizabeth Ross Douglas. (see Walkers of Sandy River)

I got a call from Russ Hall in Memphis this afternoon. He is in the line of Charles Walker son of Adam and Rhonda Terry Walker. He said most of his information had his ancestors living in the city of Chester and being buried in Old Purity Cemetery. They owned a house and property in Chester called Red Banks. He has more information on the Walkers of Sandy River than I do.

I noticed some of your Walkers moved to Charlotte. My grandson is from Charlotte and lived in Dilworth. So I was familiar with some of the cemeteries in that area. Have you ever gone to the Charlotte library? They have a lot of Walker information that I didn't find in Chester. I have never been to the historical society in Columbia. The other JAW is the right age but married in 1841 a Kirkpatrick lady who lived into the 20th century. I have nothing more on this other fellow but some on his family.

He is supposedly William B. Walker and is approx. 50 years old, as is the adult female of the household.

Col. and Rachel were married by 1840. Wm could be in this household, but someone Rachel's age is not. Not knowing the wife's name I can not follow her in the 1850 census and William Walker is too vague to research. Would have to go by the childrens ages in the 1850 census to identify him.

In 1830 he (this William Walker) might have lived near a Kennedy and a McCulla and two McCulloughs (Jno and Thomas). I think he is William married to Jennett [Lemen] with daughter Jane in the 1850 Census. In a history I read I learned they had a daughter **Narcissa!!!** And a son James.

on page 5, it states that col walker's house stood where the new jail now stands, the new jail was built in 1842... But we still do not know if that COL Walker is our man or the other Col William Walker.

Well the exact location of this lot is known, as the "new" jail still exists...

so there should be a deed trail back to this William Walker whose home stood there.

and hopefully his wife that signed away her dower rights name was Rachal...

also the Roseboro mentioned as being sheriff was sheriff in 1858 i remember.

and it speaks of the late war, as if it was written after the civil war... so that would move the written date up to after 1865...

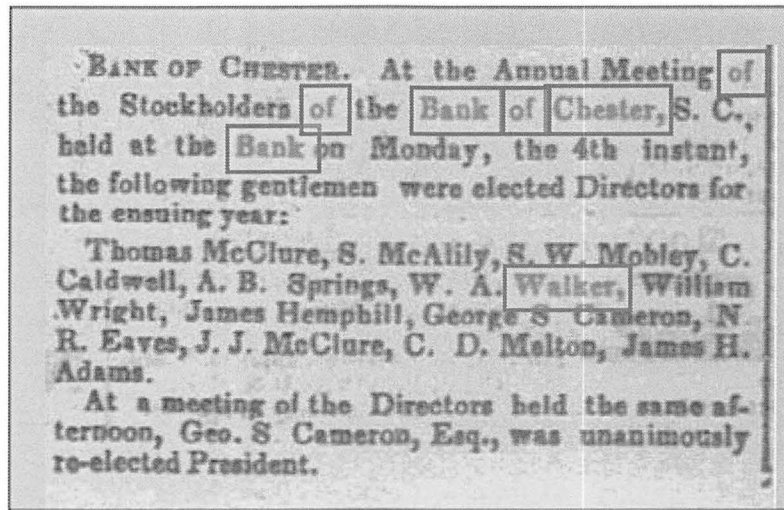
Read it carefully and see if it gives you any clues as to how old any person mentioned is and we then can maybe establish a date it was written, by that person's death date.

"There were four old citizens that I overlooked when I was reviewing Chesterville. John D. Simrill father of our present good citizen, Joel Simrill. I do not remember where he lived when we first came to Chester, but he later kept the hotel then kept by Fowler Kennedy. Also Col. William A. Walker. He lived in a house where the city jail now stands. He once was postmaster and Colonel of a regiment of militia that mustered in town. He was one of the best known men in the country. . . . "

From Bill Gregory on the same article as above: .....The James Hemphill, lawyer, mentioned on page 3.. The author states that James Hemphill "lives in the same lot" , and "Tho he is far along in eighty"... This James was listed as age 86 in the 1900 Census... Can we assume that this account of Chesterville was written around 1895 to 1900? James Hemphill died in 1902 at age 89... Also... as I read more carefully... the author states on page 5 that "Col William A. Walker was "colonel of a regiment of militia that mustered in town." Do you all think this may have been a local sort of an inactive duty national guard? That may have drilled occasionally? Bill

The librarian at the Chester Library told me that during the Mexican War some "John Does" would gather up a bunch of local men and form a regiment. They were not necessarily military people. The leader was often referred to as Colonel. Emma (my Col. William's daughter) was pretty young when her father died. She might not have known he fought (if he did indeed fight) in the Mexican War. When she wrote her papa was too old to fight the Civil War.

Sorry, we don't have Rachael or Col Walker in our records. The closest we have to her date is Matilda McCullough who married William Strong in 1830. Samuel Penny McCullough, born 22 Jul 1824 married Eliza Strong.

There is a strong possibility that your McCullough's migrated from Chester County, S.C. to Lincoln Co. TN with our relatives. They were Associate Reformed Presbyterians and some moved to the community of Molino or Yukon in Lincoln County. My direct line relatives lived next to McCullough Creek (now called Molino Creek) in Molino in the 1860's.

Our relatives continued moving together as a church congregation to the Rosemark, Shelby Co., TN area. They built the Richland A.R.P. Church and their descendants continue to live in that area. There are McCullough's on Armour Road (where we were raised) and are relatives.

Peggy... there is a Walker Street here in Chester... It is less than two short blocks from the courthouse and where the old jail once stood. and 3 short blocks from the old opera house, which on 3rd floor, housed the first conscription library in the city... Walker Street is in an area that used to contain many large two and three story homes ... some of which were hotels or boarding homes... and turning off onto walker from center street, you will see a large vacant lot...This is the area where the "Colored Music Hall" stood,

I guess about 1900 and behind that the railroad track and a short distance away maybe a block was one of the train depots...Many families after the war had some of their former servants still with the families and they had taken the name of their former owners...you will see this occasionally...Some even continued to attend the "white churches" until their deaths.....

When the opera house burned in Chester, the fire departments from Rock Hill and York responded and assisted or were on standby... it was a much taller structure than the one that was restructured from the ruins... the older one was at least a story taller in the tower... The fire alarm bell that sounded the alarm, came from within the opera house tower itself... The library was on the third floor and some books were saved by volunteers that threw them from the upper windows. If my memory is correct, I think the house had ceased to be used for shows at the time of the fire... it was old stored props and back drops that fueled fire....Bill

ummm boarding houses were a bit less expensive and usually smaller... and more for longer term visits.... Lots of salesmen called in Chester... some had standing reservations for their scheduled visits in the area....could also rent horses/buggies right in downtown area... Livery was just behind the opera house. There were 4 hotels I know of in the area of the opera house/ library and courthouse... (infact the lot that the opera house stands on was formally the site of a large hotel....) opera house built in 1907...and there were 3 or 4 couple blocks east at the railroad depot out Lancaster street...and in the area behind the courthouse that now stands there were several boarding houses. It was very common 20 for some of the owners of the larger homes to have boarders... not seen too often now.... a few of them were used as hospital space during the civil war, as there were so many wounded arriving in Chester. Chester at one time was at a major cross road in the state...before interstates, had to go through Chester to get anyplace in state it seemed. Bill Gregory

Peg... did Col Walker have an obituary in Chester paper?

In the 1850 census... it appears there are 5 households of Walkers in one area... all farming... and in the Killian home next door there is a Walker child... Did any of the Walkers marry into the Killians? also I saw a few Wylie persons in one home. who were they, were they relations?

1850 census only states Chester, South Carolina  
1860 Baton Rouge, which is out in West Chester County ...left of or west of highway 9 going in direction towards Spartanburg...so it appears they were farming out there and lots of Walkers at that. and looks like they were prosperous. Wonder if William got a land grant? you might check Land grants also... or he may have married into the property.... [I don't think my Col. Wm. Walker was in Baton Rouge.]

William and Rachel Walker received their mail at the Chester County Courthouse, so they lived very close to the city center... I also see the Brice family, I know that they had homes on Wylie Street... one home closer in, within sight of the courthouse, and then on the left just before the train tracks at end of Wylie Street another large house on the left. Both these homes have been pulled down... the one closer in, about 1977 or so...

(1870 maybe?) I see John Walker was sheriff.. and at that time the sheriff family was provided housing in the old jail, that is still standing...It is to the right of the library. Sheriff's family had one floor for residence, I think the main floor and prisoners were on 2nd and third floor....that was at 108 / 131.

ok... Emma, Mary and William were in building/dwelling number 89 (1870 Census) and they were family unit number 104 in order of visitation... so they all were very close... It may be possible that they all lived in a large building/house/hotel/boarding house... The plantation Hotel stood where the City Hall/Opera House was built... but it burned ....

Peggy... the address of the old jail in Chester is 128 center street, if you want to take a look... It was the second jail in Chester, it was converted into apartments and the 3rd jail located directly behind the courthouse. the 3rd jail is now the Chester museum and the 4th jail is the new complex on Dawson Drive.

Red Bank plantation (built by a Walker) was down towards Richburg Community maybe 10 miles east, from Chester... It was and still is owned by the Gaston family... Baton Rouge is about 10 miles west of Chester...

I just found this when I was filing away some old notes today... "My grandfather Robert Walker Wilkes b. 1883 died Feb 1960. buried New Hope Methodist Church. His first cousin was E. Alston Wilkes."

Remember the Wilkes family came from out at Baton Rouge Area also those Roden men mentioned are also west Chester county/ Baton Rouge family...

I was wondering if the Robert Walker Wilkes... Maybe he had been named for Robert Walker...

if so there would be a link... maybe his grandpa or somebody was a Walker.

I dunno...

who was Wylie McCullough? could he have been named for a Wylie relative?

if they in fact were originally from Chester County... the answer lies there in the deeds... where Elizabeth, wife signed away her dower rights with each sale... not so much in purchases of land, but sales. **This is not my Col. Wm.'s wife, Rachel Eliza.**

well... the 1850 census is him with RE as his woman shemay have been rachael  
ELIZABETH

but he shows no cash assets and also it states all of them were born in south Carolina.... If he had of had any cash ... seems he would have had it in 1850... and there were several tenement houses in that area at that time.

Peggy... meaning that it was not just your average 5 bedroom room boarding house. it had to have been much larger....

that is a possibility  
or... maybe a relative or older sibling in charlotte to help them or a relative in Chester to finance their move and give references for them

if they all were living in the hotel, and they were the William and Elizabeth, that I looked at today that sold their property in 1859, that might have been when they made move into hotel...

But I can not imagine a hotel owner letting 10 persons in a family move into his building.... He probably owned that hotel.... maybe his debts forced him to consolidate property and the family moving into the hotel???

well... Creditors may have seized the hotel.

Peg...

To have 8 children, and to manage to have \$500.00 at that time, was an accomplishment. Do you think he might have inherited some cash between 1850 and 1860... maybe his family or hers?

also... I see no will for Rachael ... that means either she did not have any property/estate, or had disposed of it before her death....

possibly were business debts.

maybe a walker bankrolled him in the hotel... it may not have been his to loose.

Maybe there would be a map of Chester downtown in 1860 that might show hotels.

I do know that at that time the railroad was coming through here... it started about 1858 or so. and several new hotels were built down the hill in the area of the train depot... about 1/2 mile from confederate monument on top of hill east.

well, lets remember that it was only two and 3/4 acre... a small lot and the deed says it's north boundary was on Pinckney Street.... and ... I notices one man's land that bordered this lot was a Alexander C. Walker? wonder if he was a relation?

In SC the woman has her dower right...

I think it is something like one third of the property value in those days...

If she does not sign away that right on the deed, when her husband sells a piece of property...Then she could come back after her husband's death and demand that dower right of one third from the new buyer of the property.

Most new buyers insisted on the wife signing this away in land transactions.

Now to the census of 1870... I am seeing what looks like 15 persons that are living in one dwelling... This indicates they are still in the hotel building....

and note that they have a COOK... so they were not broke, and one person is a barkeeper (Henry Hill), one a blacksmith (Dooley), one a seamstress and one a carpenter... surely some of these people paid room and board....

and... then close by in separate buildings (probably small tenement cottages) we see some Walker black persons, that were probably former slaves.

(this points to property and land and slaves....in the Walker family)

It seems they all lived very close together in a row, like a hotel and several cottages nearby...

Peggy... I just have a deep feeling that the Kennedys (Major John or his brother George) of Chester, or maybe one of their wives (Evans wife of Major John Kennedy) were somehow connected to either your Rachel or William... Bill

This is interesting about Catharine Evans Kennedy of Chester.

I will now speak of mother's family. My grandfather Richard Evans had three brothers, John, Isaac, and Owen, and one sister. I think her name was Hannah. They were all Whigs and were in the army in the Revolution. They attended the Whig meeting at old Justice Gaston's and volunteered their services. They and I think three Walkers were all the Whigs that were in Sandy River, it being a hot bed of Tories. My grandfather married Katherine McCarter of a highly respected family. They were married before the Revolution and had several children. She was very much distressed and annoyed by the Tories. (A number of the stories are repeated in Catherine Hinton's Evans history -see this information)

As it may be a satisfaction to some, I will tell the names of some of the persons whom my father's brothers and sisters married. Uncle Kelso married a McNeal. I can't remember who Uncle John N. Wylie married first, but I think she was a Nelson. His second wife was a Miss Pepper. Aunt Susan married Alexander Walker. Jennette married William Walker, a brother of Alexander. Mary married D. Hamilton, and Sallie married William Morris (?). They all moved to Alabama except Jennette and my father Peter.

Peggy... note above from the Wylie/Evans material... two sisters (Susan Wylie and Jennette Wylie) married two Walker Brothers... and one Alexander and Susan (it is implied above) Walker husband and his wife " moved to Alabama with all the others... wonder who these two Walker's parents were???? Bill

Margaret, Colonel William died intestate...

He died 'round July 7th 1862 (as his probate papers state)

His file is 112, package 191. His son, Charles T. Walker served as Adm of his estate.

I will attempt to scan/send to you the 6 pages I photocopied of his returns of his estate and proceeds of his estate sale, so you can see what was bought by whom....This may provide some leads also...

I saw NO mention of his wife in any of these probate papers....

I pulled 4 files for Walker family, that I thought might promise leads...

Walker children file 130, Pack 475, which was for guardianship for 3 minor children.

A. J. Walker, file 91, pack 1444, a Wm Walker (unidentified) serving as Adm, and this file was missing.

and Sara E. Walker file 96, pack 1592 (this Sara was a minor and Wm. Walker (unidentified) served as guardian) August 1847

Early McCullough wills, Chester County, SC probate

Peggy, In searching the McCullough wills I did not find one for Rachel Eliza...  
So, I went a bit further back, hoping to find a near relation:

1. Elizabeth McCullough, died intestate, April 1852, file 57A, pack 1619... a Elizabeth McCullough (unidentified) bought a bedstead for \$5.00 and... AH McCullough bought many, many items at this sale.
2. Samuel McCullough, 1856, file 104 pack 21...  
Left his plantation to Oliver P. McCullough.
3. Thomas McCullough, file 114, pack 231, November 24, 1862  
inventory of this estate Dec 11, 1862... adm was Mrs. ME McCullough

well, the first document, is not that important... it more or less states that Col William Walker died intestate and gives Charles power to settle his estate.  
Could not find a Rachel Eliza Walker or McCullough for a will... at that time, if you did not have anything, you did not have a will most of the time

R E Walker, I took to be Rachel Elizabeth [Eliza], as it appeared a widow was buying for household..... with intentions of keeping house...  
It will be great to see which McCullough's and Walker families you have it narrowed down to, checking census/ages..... (chuckle)  
So many left this area starting when the new territories opened up ...  
I am kinda droopy ... after all was in probate for 4 and half hours today.... doesn't time fly when doing research? Bill

these are the only probate papers available. I was disappointed also.  
and the type of job that it appears they took in Charlotte, were hard jobs.....that did not seem to pay very much...  
It may be that they did not own land. No land was mentioned in the estate sale, nor slaves... or lived on someone else's farm....  
hard to say, and this was during that HORRIBLE time just after the civil war and reconstruction...  
Maybe go for earlier wills, and try to find if either of them had parents that owned property or left them land/cash.... then look at deeds if necessary.....Bill

From an internet forum:

The Robert Walker mentioned in Bishop Asbury's Journal is Robert Walker on Sandy River who married 2nd Elizabeth Sealy Hardin about 1785. Bishop Asbury spent the night Dec 24th 1800 in Robert Walker's home after preaching at Sealy's Chapel. He said in the journal that Robert Walker was in his 80th year which would make him born about 1720 (Where?). Who was his first wife? Children? What happened to them? I am a descendant of Robert and

Elizabeth's first son, Sealy Walker born 1785.

Oni ....I just looked over the descendants of Col William Walker... and noticed two females that shared Oni in their names (one was Emma Oni Walker, and the other Emma's niece Mary Louisa Oni Cornwell...) on page 3

I have taken a liking to that name... I wonder where it came from??

The girl's name **Oni** |o-ni| is a variant of **Ann** (Hebrew), and the meaning of Oni is "favoured grace". also can mean "prayed for"

Chester Hospital Information:

built by a doctor Pryor as a hospital... had one of the first schools to produce nurses. probably a wing for women and one for men.

he also bought the lot Rachael's house stood on and tore them down and used the wood from Rachael's to build a rental house. and he moved in the corner house that was Doctor S E Babcock's home... this gave him two lots and a larger yard. it seems the more current the record, the longer it takes to go through it.

I was averaging 2 to 2.5 file boxes on the earlier years a day... and now (even with my more experienced eye at going through the documents, as they follow a repeated pattern) the best I can do now is one box a day, and then I am dead. LOL

Hi peggy (deom Bill - talking about his own lineage and what he hoped to find in the court house)

the boxes are taking longer than they did in the earlier years.

I can barely cover a full box in an afternoon. I am only good for about 4 hours each day in archives, and then it takes me about another 2 to get the data typed out and to you.

I also am finding a few things for Virginia... nothing major... only cases that let us know when her Westbrooks were still in the area serving on jury.

I did find a mention of one of my great great grandfathers when he served on a jury. (Alfred Bolch, different line)

unfortunately my Jacob Stone parents remain in the shadows.

oh well...

I only am really looking for 4 individuals:

(1) my greatgreatgreatgrand father William Tillman **Gregory** (where he was buried) I know his lineage.

(2) His wife Susan, who were her parents? ...

Elmira Stone married Marion Tillman **Gregory**, son of the above couple....

(3) Jacob Stone, Elmira's father, who were his parents?

(4) Eliza, Jacob's first wife... who were her parents?

wonder when the son Richard [Kennedy] died? [Richrd died 1914 in Charlotte.]

when did Anna's husband die? [1864 Allen Kennedy died in the Civil War.]  
now also.... the man that first owned the hotel we keep referring to was a Mr George Kennedy...

But I do not know his relationship if any at all to Major John Kennedy...

but I do expect some sort of kinship...

[John Kennedy and Katherine Evans had a George. My dates for him are 1807-1825. He is the only George I have in FTM.]

Della Bixby, who married Allen Kennedy's son was a dear friend to my grandma and gr grandmother in Charlotte. My gr grandmother promised Anna that she would look after her children. She must have known she was dying ahead of time. We never quite understood that because Emma wasn't much older than they were. I often wondered if she made that promise to another Anna, also a relative. Peggy

I also found the civil case books today.

they will be so much more easy going than these boxes of jumbled cases.

I am looking forward to seeing what I can find in them.

I counted up boxes today and I have about 20 more to go and that will put me up to 1903 and after that I guess I will switch over to the civil cases...

The civil cases are by year. and have a sort of index like the deed books. so it should be a little easier going in those. I am looking forward to working in those! Bill

I am now at year 1885, those few straggling cases were in middle of later records.

this was most likely a reserve unit that met monthly, like home guard....

I doubt it was the same Captian Walker, sure wish I knew who he was.

and on that Thomas and Dave (Probably David) Walker.

now we know was father of one stray Thomas. LOLOL

I guess I am at the year 1886 or so now.

just think in another 15 years or so, I can start in the equity books! woo hoo!!!

Purity Presbyterian Church on Wylie Street was built in 1854. The other Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church was not organized until summer 1869 and building built much later.

This doesn't mean that Rachael was a member of this church...

but it would have been easy for her to walk to the church.

it is only a block from where her house stood.

Rachael died on 21st of March 1870 and was "funeralized" on the 22nd. [I read that her funeral (1870) was at "The Presbyterian Church" in Chester. Peggy]

Peggy did you notice that the chief of police in Charles era was a McNinch...? I bet he had ties to the McNinch family in Chester...

Hi Peggy... I just read the notes....

John Kennedy and George Kennedy were brothers.

George Kennedy owned the property and hotel building that Col William Walker had... his business in and next door to it was a livery stable and the next building was the Presbyterian church that was sold to the Catholics....

The livery stable lot was later bought by the Catholic church and construction was done to provide a home for the priest and a side yard... This Catholic church (St. Joseph's) is still in business...

Across the narrow street (20 foot away) was Major John Kennedy's home/tavern/and boarding house combination...

His rank was honorary...

Major John Kennedy had married a Miss Evans of Chester County...

Her family lived just south of Chester, about 2 to 3 miles out of town in the area of the Cornwell community and train stop.

She was a well informed and educated young woman....All of her children were provided tutoring in Chester and later graduated from colleges and led professional lives... I believe the Walker Children were included in this course of studies.....This is how the Walkers might be connected to the Evans family... and if I remember the Evans and Walker graves are side by side...

Could it be that there is a connection to those Evans, McCulloughs, Walkers? Kennedys? Interesting huh?

Peg... check this death certificate...(It's Mrs. Hannah Anderson)

There is a relationship of sorts there...

## Preface to our Chart of Walkers Found while Researching in Chester, SC

When this project started Bill Gregory, Chester, SC offered to do Court House look-ups for me (Peggy in this report) to see if he could locate information about my ancestor Col. Wm. Walker of Chester who married Rachel Eliza McCullough of prob. York County. Bill went to the Court House each day and sent me what he found about ANY Walkers in Chester County.

I soon realized it was escalating into a big project with many Walkers mentioned. We decided to put Walkers we could identify into this chart format.

Any help with untangling all these Walkers will be greatly appreciated.

I have reason to believe that my Walker family had ties of some sort to Oktibbeha, MS that might have ended about 1855 or 1860 when one of the Walker girls wrote a very short piece about saying goodbye to Oktibbeha.
