Wilson, Nathaniel

While residing in the Long Cane Settlement of Ninety Six District, he was on an expedition against the Cherokee Indians and was court-martialed about 1780 for refusing to bear arms against the British. He deserted to the British and was at the siege of Ninety Six, where he was seriously wounded in the head by a rifle ball. Loyalist Claims, LIV.

Wilson, Robert

He served in the Third Regiment from 5 February 1779 to 1 July 1781. N.A.859.

He enlisted during 1775 to serve under Capts.

Joseph Wood, Joseph Brown and Col. John Winn and was in the Snow Campaign. After 1 June, he was under Capt. Thomas Robbns, Col. Goodwyn and Gen. Williamson on the Florida Expedition. In the fall of 1776, he was under Capt. Joseph Fearmster and Col. John Winn. In 1777, he was again under Robbns and was sent against the Indians. He assisted in building Fort Independence under Captain Lusk and Gen. Tutt. On 5 February 1778, he re-enlisted under Capt. John C. Smith in the Third Regiment and was in the siege of Savannah, the battle at Stono and the siege of Charleston, where he was taken prisoner. He was to be paroled in June, but escaped and was recaptured by Tonies. He escaped again and joined Capt. Allison, Col. Neel and Gen. Sumter. He served as a first lieutenant under Capt. James Reed and Col. Bratton. He was in the battles at Rocky Mount, Hanging Rock and Fishing Creek. He then served as a lieutenant under Capt. McCool and was in the battles at Fish Dam Ford and Blackstock's Plantation. Beginning in December 1780, he commanded the guard of the baggage wagons under Col. Richard Hampton. From August 1781, he commanded the guard at Marshall's Mill under Col. Bratton. A.A.8627; S149; X697; N.A.246; N.A.853.

He served in the militia under Capt. John Armstrong and Col. L. Richardson. He served

seventy days as a quartermaster during the siege of Charleston during 1780. P.I.; A.A. 8628; Y322; Yearbook, 1897.

Wilson, Russell

He served one hundred eighty-three days in Capts. Michael Watson and William Butler's Company of Volunteers on Horseback from 15 December 1781 to June 1782. (Corley, Abner, S21707); N.A.246.

Wilson, Russell, Jr.

He served in the militia after the fall of Charleston. A.A.8629; U118.

Wilson, Samuel

He served sixty days under Capt. Henry Moran during 1781 and ninety days under Capt. McBride during 1781. In addition, he served one hundred twenty-two days under Capt. James Witherspoon during 1782. All of the service was under Colonel Horry. A.A.8630; Y628.

Wilson, Samuel

He enlisted in the Sixth Regiment on 21 March 1776. N.A.853.

Wilson, Samuel

He enlisted on 7 July 1775 in the Rangers under Capt. Ezekiel Polk and Col. Thomson. S.C.H.&G., III, 4.

Wilson, Theophilus

He became a wagoner at the age of sixteen for Col. Winn's regiment. At other times, he substituted in the militia for his father, John Wilson. A.A.8630A.

Wilson, Thomas

b. 22 December 1764, Sumter District, S. C.

d. 18 January 1834

He was captured during August 1780 by Col. Tarleton while at home and taken to Camden and held for nine weeks before he was paroled. In March or April 1781, he enlisted under Capt. John Armstrong and Col. Richardson. He was in the battle at Quinby Bridge and in several skirmishes. A.A.8631; P520; U120.

Wilson, Thomas

While serving in the Third Regiment, he was court-martialed on 7 December 1779 on the charge of desertion and was sentenced to receive one hundred lashes on his bare back with a cat-o'-nine-tails. S.C.H.&G., XVII, 119-120.

Wilson, Thomas

He served seventy-three days as an adjutant in the militia during 1782. In addition, he served three hundred thirty days as a light horseman during 1782. A.A.8631; Q619.
