

To the Honorable the President & other Members
of the Senate of South Carolina: The humble petition
of Theophilus Wilson of Fairfield District, respect-
fully sheweth: That at the session of your
Honorable Body of 1847, he petitioned to be placed
on the Pension Roll of the State as one of the
survivors of the Revolutionary Soldiers and was
allowed a pension at the established rate of
sixty dollars per annum from the first of March
1847 (See Reports & Resolutions of House of Represent-
atives of 1847 page 335): That he respectfully
refers to said petition as containing a minute
history of his services in the War of the Revolution
which so gloriously resulted in the achievement
of the liberty of our prosperous Country: Your
petitioner would further state that such was the
character of his service, that he never received
any payment of his monthly pay for the same,
he having served as wagoner most of the time
in said war and the balance of the time as a sub-
stitute for his father John Wilson who was a dev-
oted patriot and soldier in the Revolution, and
at that time old as he was, not only went into the
service himself, but also had four other sons than your
petitioner, engaged as soldiers in the cause of liberty: That
his ^{said} father & son James Wilson, William Wilson pensioned by this State
and died in 1837 before Wilson & John Wilson junior then lived in
what is now Fairfield District and were principally engaged
in the militia service of South Carolina under Colonel
Richard Winn, Colonel Robert Goodwyn, Major Joseph Kirkland,
and Captain William Simons and Captain James Craig
all of whom were officers from same section, viz, the
present District of Fairfield, except Col. Robert Goodwyn
who was from what is now Richland District.
That his said father & brothers are all now no more and

your petitioner the youngest black survivor of his
father's family alone is left to speak the facts of
those trying times & services: That your petitioner was
only about sixteen years of age when his said father
who was Wagon Master in part for Colonel Robert
Egerton's Regiment & in part for Colonel Richard
Winn's Regiment put your petitioner into service of
driving wagons for said Regiments in which service
he was actively engaged at various periods amounting
in all to between two & three years. That he being
under age and employed under his father as Wagon Master aforesaid
did not receive at the conclusion of the war any compen-
sation or monthly pay and as his name was not on the
Company Roles, consequently the Militia Records of this State
furnished no evidence of his services. That your petitioner
unable to obtain a pension from the United States for the
want of such evidence he having delayed to procure his
services in the lifetime of any ^{surviving} Kuckum Comrades & not
being aware of the provisions of the Act of Congress of 1832,
& having grown old in indigent circumstances petitioned
your honorable Body to be placed on the Pension Roll
of this State in 1847 and was graciously allowed a pension
at the rate of six dollars per annum from 1st March 1847
in the receipt of which he still continues. Your petition-
er would now respectfully pray as the infirmities of age
are fast overtaking him being now nearly eighty five years
old, so that he cannot maintain himself ~~so~~ by
manual labor and may soon become a complete
charge upon his children all of whom are in indigent
circumstances having large families of their own to
support and from the fact that he never received
his said monthly pay and also from the additional
fact that other soldiers of the Revolution who are
now dead & who for a series of years shared your
municipal Bounty receiving their pensions annually

from a period as far back as seven years than
the act of 1832 aforesaid would pay the arrears
at the same rates due him from 1st March 1831 from
which time said Act allows payments of pensions to be made
to the 1st March 1847 from which time your petitioner
has been receiving his pension. Your petitioner
respectfully refers to the Honorable Senator &
Members of House of Representatives from his District,
touching his reputation as a Revolutionary Soldier
and his character as a citizen. Your petitioner
therefore prays your Honorable Body to allow him
said arrears so that he may be placed on a
similar footing with others ~~with~~ who likewise
served their country in her first great peril, and
thus be enabled to pass his few remaining days
free from want & from being a charge upon his children
who are not in easy circumstances or upon the poor
list of his District, & as in duty bound he will ever pray.
