Witchazel blossoms

Witchazel blossoms

(July 14, 1900) A few small flowers of Witchazel were found on the ground near the base of a large tree. The flowers are white, bell-shaped, with five petals. They are about 1/2 inch long and 1/4 inch wide. The leaves are opposite, elliptical, and pointed at the tip. The stems are woody and have a rough texture. The bark is greyish-brown and has a distinct lichen-like growth on it. The flowers are very fragrant and have a sweet, spicy smell. They are pollinated by bees and butterflies. The fruit is a small, round, brown seed pod.
