You will please to Order a General Muster
of your Regiments at Beverley on Wednesday
the 30th of this Inst. Tho' if you can make
it convenient I had much Rather the
Reviewous should be at Granby;

The Governor of York will be at
the Review, I shall go into particulars you
being an Old Officer, I only beg leave to
mention that it will be Military for your
Officers to appear in the best manner,
if the Officers have not side Arms let
them take Guns, you will direct your

Capt's to make you Accurate Returns
of their Companies on the day of Review

As it is possible your Accounts may
Not be fully settled I have herewith sent
you Ten Blank Commissions, which you
will please to have fill'd off & delivered

Minisburg 4th May 1867

Sir

Your letter of the 27th inst. is received and
in reply to inform you that the
same has been forwarded to the
proper authorities for their consideration
and that you will be notified of the
result as soon as it is known. In the
meantime you are requested to
keep your men in readiness for
service and to be prepared to
march at a moment's notice. It is
also to be noted that the
Officers have made your arms
them take care, you will direct your

Capt. to make you accurate returns
of their companies on the day of marching

It is possible your command
will be fully equipped if you should
you are thanked for your services and
will please to have full of arms

to Such Gentlemen as may be Appointed, I observe
to Commission no person but such that will
have a true sense of these Appointments

You will also Receive Ten Guns & papers of
Militia Law's which you will distribute
to your Officers, I shall leave All Other
Matters to your Good judgment,
