

DODONA MANOR

Built probably mid-18th century by Nicholas Minor, captain Virginia militia (French and Indian war) and founder of the town of Leesburg. By mid-19th century it was the home of George Washington Ball, captain, C.S.A. on the staff of his cousin, General Robert E. Lee. In the mid-20th century, home of General George Catlett Marshall, the eminent soldier statesman, and his wife. Since 1961 the residence of Colonel and Mrs. J. J. Winn, the latter being the step-dau. of General Marshall.
