Minor, Sr.

A few years before the Rev. he came to Fauquier Co. Va. from Wales in the early 1700's with his Irish wife Margaret O'Connors. He made his will July 1, 1775 - proven March 23, 1778

His wife and son Minor Jr. - executrix, and executor.

To his son W^m a slave

To his son, John slaves, a woman Jean, Pen, Anthony, a boy Moses

(settled in Louisville Ky) To his son James, slaves James + Lure, a riding horse saddle riding apparel and his Bible

To his son Minor Jr. 2 slaves Reuben and Solomon.

Richard came to S.C. 1765 - moved to Duck River, Maury Co. Tenn. 1841

mar. Priscilla McJennie dau. of Benjamin - Mary McJennie att. beginning of Rev.

His 1st course was toward military - made 1st lieut of Capt. Thos. Woodward, Co.

under Col. W^m Thompson - June 18, 1775 - Oct. 20 1775. Rose to rank of major

Went down to Fort Charlotte near Augusta - sent to Fla. A member of S.C.

House of Representatives - elected Lieut Gov - one of the commissioners of Indian affairs

served in Congress 1793 - 1812. His will

Winn (Came to S.C. 1765 moved to Rutherford Co. Tenn. died 1813 or 1814)

John eldest son of Minor Winn, Sr. and Margaret O'Connor. with his bro. Wm and Richard came to S.C. in 1765. Of these 3 boys John was the oldest. They were educated and intelligent men and trained as surveyors.

John Winn was in S.C. 1766 practicing his prof. as surveyor. Dec. 1, 1768 he signed papers as his 1 of his majesty's Justice of Peace. When 1st Continental Congress met 1774 he was a delegate. He was appointed one of the delegates between Broad-Catawba Creek After the (Rivers)

Winnborough (from The Winn of Fairfield Co.)

The town of

John Winn owned most of the land upon which the town of Winnborough would be built, lying between branches of Jackson and Wateree Creeks. On March 8, 1785 John Winn, Richard Winn and John Vanderhorst stating that they had laid out the town of village of Winnborough on land they owned. They petitioned the legislature for permission to establish a market and hold fairs twice a year to be held 1st Tue - Fri - May Tue - Fri on Oct. Horse, cattle, grain, indigo, tobacco, flax offered for sale then. They said that streets, a lot for a church and a square for the fair would be given to the public. No. 8, S.C. Statutes at Large Vol. 4, p 452 Act No 122255 passed March 8, 1785.
