

ERRORS FOUND IN THE WOODWARD GENEALOGY AND  
ABSTRACTED DOCUMENTS TO SHOW THE MISTAKES.

Compiled & Entered by Robert R. Hill Sr. in May 1989.

First of all, I am related to the Woodward family of Fairfield County, South Carolina by virtue of a marriage between Thomas Hill (Son of Moses Hill & Savilla Roden) to Jemima Woodward, daughter of Reverend William Woodward & his wife Nancy Elizabeth Barrett. Thus Jemima Woodward (born ca. 1785) was a granddaughter of Thomas (The Regulator) Woodward & his first wife, Jemima Collins.

This family of Woodwards is often confused with the descendents of two Woodward brothers, a Richard Woodward Jr. and a John Woodward, who came into Fairfield County. Both were sons of a Richard Woodward of Bedford County, Virginia.

This Richard Woodward was a 5th generation descendent of the immigrant Christopher Woodward, who came to Virginia on the ship "Tryall," in 1620 (Isle of Wight Co.).

Briefly this Woodward line is Richard 5/, (5th generation) son of Lancelott 4/ (b. 1682-d. 1750 in James City Co., Va.), son of George 3/ (b. 1654-d. before 1704), son of Samuel 2/ (b. 1626-d. 1658 and who married Sarah Hallum), son of the immigrant, Christopher Woodward 1/ (b. ca. 1594 England, died in Virginia).

Over the years, in their research, several persons have linked their South Carolina Woodward family line up to the family of Thomas (Regulator) Woodward, when in fact they are not and are, instead, part of this particular line of Woodwards.

This is somewhat understandable since both families lived in the same general area of Fairfield County and had such common given names as Thomas, William and John, but the Regulator's line (as far as I have been able to determine) had no such given names as Richard, Charles, Isaac, George, Burbage, Nathaniel, Randolph or James and thus, these given names, are a tip off to the fact they **ARE NOT** part of the Regulator's family but instead belong to these Woodwards that descend from the immigrant Christopher Woodward, through his son Samuel, his son George, his son Lancelott (b. 1682-d. 1750 James City Co., Va.) and his son Richard Woodward (b. 1708-d. 1786) in Bedford County, Virginia.

Some of the descendents or members of this family line found in South Carolina, and who have been at times connected erroneously to the Regulator's family are: Richard Clark Woodward (m. Suvilla Pearson), Randolph Woodward, George Woodward, Nathaniel Woodward (went to Miss.), Isaac Woodward,

James Woodward (m. Luvica ?), Burbage Woodward (m. Levica?),  
William Woodward (m. Levica Smith, sister to Luvica Smith).

The Richard Woodward Jr. 6/, (who came from Virginia to  
Fairfield County), married Anne, whose maiden name was either  
Watts or Alcorn. Another source says it was Randolph.

It should be noted that the Regulator's Family came from  
either Maryland or Northern Virginia, while the other  
Woodwards came from southeastern Virginia.

Now among my research, I have come across documents that show  
errors in the traditional information relating to the  
Woodward Family of Thomas (Regulator) Woodward. This is my  
attempt to correct the information and to inform those  
concerned or interested.

"A search of the statutes was made by the editor (Brent Holcomb) for the name change of Augustine Williams to William J. Augustine, but no such act was found."

Regardless, based on the above petition, it is obvious that such a name change was made. This article is very important as it apparently names the children of Augustine J. Williams and his wife LUCY WOODWARD, who was a daughter of THOMAS

All of the records that I have ever seen states that Charlotte Woodward, eldest daughter of Rev. William Woodward & wife Nancy Barrett, married William Turner. Court records confirm this marriage BUT the following suggest that she was married twice, first to JOHN MACON.

I am of the opinion that John Macon was related to Heartwell Macon Sr., originally from Virginia, later Fairfield County and his son Heartwell Macon Jr., also of Fairfield County. Heartwell

Note by Robert Hill: I strongly believe that the date on  
the above Woodward record is 1780. It appears to me  
that the name of the minister was William Woodward  
& that the name of the bride was Charlotte Woodward  
& that the name of the groom was John Macdonald Woodward  
& that the name of the bride was Charlotte Woodward  
& that the name of the groom was John Macdonald Woodward.

Macon Sr. (b. 1741) disappeared from Virginia records ca. 1785 and was the son of William Macon, who was the son of Gideon Macon. I believe him to be the same man that later shows up in Fairfield County.

Gideon Macon (of Virginia) was married to Martha Woodward, a daughter of WILLIAM WOODWARD, of New Kent County, Virginia, and his wife (said to be) a Henly, daughter of Thomas & Eliza (Reynolds) Henly). Gideon Macon died before 1702, because Martha Woodward Macon remarried 2nd time to Nathaniel West, who died ca. 1724. Martha Woodward Macon West remarried a 3rd time to a Mr. Biggers. (NOTE: NO PROOF HAS YET BEEN FOUND TO CONNECT THIS WILLIAM WOODWARD FAMILY TO THAT OF THE REGULATOR'S FAMILY), AS IS SHOWN IN THE BOOK, "THOMAS WOODWARD, THE REGULATOR."

Charlotte Woodward first married John Macon in 1803, 2nd to William Turner when? She was born ca. 1782 in South Carolina and died on (Thursday) the 6th of January 1826.

Other information on the Macon Family shows that a Thomas Hill and wife Sarah (Mathias?) of Halifax County, N.C. had a granddaughter, Martha Hill, who married Nathaniel Green Macon, but what his connection was to this Macon family, if any, is unknown.

ITEM TWO, I give and bequeath unto my son BAXTER SIMSON (SIMPSON) Two Hundred acres of land, lying on both sides of Sande (Sandy) Run and adjoining to the other land aforesaid of my son WILLIAM SIMSON (SIMPSON), on the upper side??? one breeding mare my bullet gun, one bed bolster, one rug and two blankets, one iron pot, six plates and six spoons.

ITEM THREE, I give and bequeath to my son THOMAS SIMSON (SIMPSON) Three Hundred and Eighty Six Acres of land, lying on the South side of Chapamamsik?? Creek likewise one breeding mare, one feather bed bolster, rug and two blankets, one iron pot, six plates and six spoons.

ITEM FOUR, I give and bequeath unto my daughter MARY WOODARD (WOODWARD) one hundred acres of land, where she is now seated and lying on the north side of Sandy Run, to her and the heirs of her body forever.

ITEM FIVE, I give and bequeath unto my daughter ANN SIMSON (SIMPSON) after her mother in laws (Stepmother) decease, one (lamb?) and calf, one feather bed boulder, rug and two blankets.

ITEM SIX, I give and bequeath unto my beloved grandchildren, the son and daughter of MARY WOODWARD, THOMAS WOODWARD AND ANN WOODWARD, one ewe a piece.

ITEM SEVEN, I give and bequeath unto my ever loving wife JANE SIMSON (SIMPSON) my plantation and liberty of one hundred acres of land where I now live (for) her life and after her decease, to fall to my son BAXTER. I also give her the privilege of the whole (tract) for timber for the use of the plantation. I also leave my wife all my moveable estate except the legacies herein before mentioned, and leave my wife whole and sole executor of this my last will and

Signed Sealed and Delivered in the Presence of us.

I desire my movable estate maybe inventoried and returned and not appraised.

COMMENTS ON SOME OF THE ABOVE INDIVIDUALS BY ROBERT HILL:  
There was a daughter named CHARLOTTE WOODWARD, (she was the oldest daughter) that in 1803 was married to John Macon. He apparently had died and Charlotte had remarried to WILLIAM TURNER, the buyer of the above land. It is noted that SHE DID NOT SIGN THE DEED! Perhaps this was not necessary since it was her husband that was buying the land and since it would also legally be hers, there was no need for her to sign. Charlotte (Woodward) Macon Turner, died shortly after the above deed, her death was on 6th January 1826.

Another daughter named in the will of the deceased William Woodward Sr.'s will was named "ASSANETH." She was the youngest child, born after 1806 and did not sign the deed.

There was also a son JOSEPH ADDISON WOODWARD who did not sign the above. He was born in 1806 showing him to have been about 16 years of age (thus a minor) at the time the above was signed. Since his mother signed I assume his signing was not necessary.

OTHER NOTES AND COMMENTS ON SOME OF THE ABOVE INDIVIDUALS:

William Woodward Sr. (the deceased named above) was the

son of Thomas Woodward (known as the "Regulator") and his first wife Jemima Collins. They lived in Fairfax County Virginia and William was born there on 7th October 1762. He died on 23rd July 1820 in Chester County, S.C. He served one term in 14th U.S. Congress (House of Rep.) from 4th March 1815 till 3rd March 1817. He was a Baptist minister, physician and he helped to established the "WOODWARD BAPTIST CHURCH," which is still functioning in Chester County today and named after him. He was also a Revolutionary Soldier.

Son John Woodward and wife Mary Mobley moved to Georgia, where he later died.

Thomas Hill died between January and May of 1824. Wife Jemima (Woodward) Hill is said to have gone to Mississippi with a daughter and her family and died ca. 1851 but this has not been proven. I suspect she was born ca. 1785 and not 1792 as has been previously stated.

Reference to the two witnesses: Green B. (Berry) Mobley was the son of William Mobley & wife Nancy Coleman. William Mobley was son of Clement Mobley.

Green B. Mobley married 1st, Savilla Hill, the daughter of the above Thomas Hill, and they moved first to Georgia and then to Alabama. Savilla died in Alabama ca. 1839-40. They had 3 children, Martha Mobley (b. 1833 in Ala); a son Barrett Mobley (b. 1835 in Ala); and a daughter named Caroline Mobley (b. 1839 in Ala.). Green B. Mobley married 2nd time to a widow Henrietta Wilson in Alabama and they had no children.

Thomas Hill and George W. (Washington) Hill were brothers, sons of Moses Hill & Savilla N. Roden. Thomas was the eldest of nine children, while George was the 8th child but youngest son. George W. Hill married Sarah A. Moore and later moved to Green County, Alabama.

Thomas Hill was married ca. 1805 to Jemima Woodward, daughter of William Woodward Sr and Nancy Elizabeth Barrett. Green B. Mobley was a son in law of Thomas Hill & Jemima Woodward, having married their daughter Savilla Hill.

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**CASE NUMBER 8, MISTAKEN NAME OF A DAUGHTER OF REV. WILLIAM WOODWARD.**

A family group sheet in the Fairfield County Museum shows that a daughter of Rev. William Woodward was a Martha Woodward, who married Ellender Robinson. This caused quite a bit of confusion but actually the correct name of this daughter was **ELLENDER (probably for ELLEN)** who married **WILLIAM ROBINSON**. (See the previous Court document above

Comments by Robert Hill; This shows that Thomas (Regulator) Woodward had purchased some land in Union County on March 2nd 1774 and then willed it to his daughter Elizabeth Woodward, who then sold it to Thomas May on the 12th February 1785.

The important thing here is that my information from a Family Group Sheet obtained from the Fairfield County Museum showed that Elizabeth Woodward had married William McMorries Jr. ca. 1788. If they did marry it was after January 7th, 1793 when Elizabeth signed the above deed on that date. Note it states she was a **SPINSTER** and at that time lived in what had recently become Union County.
