Hello,

Sorry for not getting back to you sooner. To answer your question about C.C. Freeman. There is no records showing a C.C. Freeman graduating from West Point prior to 1903, there is also no C.C. Freeman serving with the South Carolina Volunteers during the War with Spain. There was a Constant Freeman of Maryland who graduated from the United States Military Academy (West Point) in 1834, but died in 1839 as a 1st Lieutenant.

If you would like I can come up to the Museum this Saturday and will be glad to look over the picture as it may be able to give me some clues as I know a few things about military uniforms that might help me identify who he served with, and certainly to take the opportunity to look at the original Span. Am. letters.
