





Agnew, John			He served in an independent company of rangers under Capt. Robert Ellison during 1775
Aiken, William			Born February 1760 in County Antrim, Ireland Died October 1844 He migrated to Pennsylvania in 1775 and then to Fairfield District in 1777. in 1781 he served under Capt. Edward Martin and Col. Taylor and fought at Camden. During July 1781 he rejoined Martin and marched to Green's Camp. He was at sometime under Col. Winn
 Alston, John	Died on June 3, 1787 age 48	Molly Alston	While living in Camden District, he was a horseman under Capt. Jacob Frazier and Col. Thomas Taylor from May to July 1781, he also served under Capt. Gilbert Johnson
Anderson, David			He enlisted in the 6th Regiment on April 2, 1776. He became a Corporal on March 9, 1778 and was a private on October 19, 1778. During 1779, he served under Capt. John Buchanan
Anderson, James			Born 1753 Served in the Rangers under Capt. Thomas Woodward and Col. Thomson during 1775.




Andrews, Owen			While living In Fairfield District he entered the service in 1779 as a volunteer for three months under Jacob Fraser and Col. Thomas Taylor. He was in the battle at Stono Ferry. In 1781 he was drafted to serve one month under Capt. Lewis Pope. Thereafter he was drafted to serve one month under Capt. James Craig and two months under Capt. Frazer. He was stationed at the High Hills of Santee until 1781. During 1781 he was under Gen. Sumter and was at Congaree, Biggin Church and Orangeburg. Next he served under Gen. Henderson and was at Edisto.
Armstrong, Samuel			He served in an independent company of rangers under Capt. Robert Ellison.
Armstrong, William			Born August 14, 1765 in Ireland While living in Fairfield District he volunteered after the fall of Charleson and served under Capt. James McClure and Gen. Sumter. He served two years and six months under Capts. McClure, John McCool, John Mills and Ned Martin and was at the battles at Rocky Mount, Bratton's Plantation and Hanging Rock, where he assisted in burying he body of his captain. His own coat had four ball holes through it. He volunteered to serve under Capt John Mills at Kings Mountain, Col. Pickens and was under him at the battle of Cowpens. In addition, he was in the battle at Eutaw Springs, Sumter's Defeat, and was at Charleston when the British left.
 Ashford, George	February 11, 1758 - April 25, 1815	Ashford	Married Jemina Rabb Served one hundred fifty days under Capt. Lewis Pope and Col. Taylor of the cavalry from February to August 1781. also served in Marion's Brigade in 1783
Askew, John			He served in an independent company of rangers under Capt. Robert Ellison during 1775 and served 108 days in the militia during 1882.



Bishop, William			Born March 26, 1760 in Greenville, N. C. Died February 2, 1836 While living in Fairfield District he enlisted during March 1779 and served under Capt. John Moore and Col. Winn and was at the battle of Stono. He re-enlisted in October 1780 under Capt. Murray and Col. Grimes of North Carolina. He was in the battle of Cowpens. Next he joined Col. Dixon's North Carolina Regiment.



Thereafter he was under Capt. McKenzie. He was in the battles of Hanging Rock, Camden, Monck's Corner, Orangeburg, in a skirmish at Four Hole Bridge and was wounded in the stomach by a British bayonet during the battle at Eutaw Springs. At one time he was in the cavalry under Col. Washington. (He moved to N. C., Tenn., Ky., and Indiana)
Bland, Edward			He served in an independent company of rangers under Capt. Robert Ellison during 1775.
 Boney, Jacob	September 15, 1750 - March 31, 1795	Sykes	Served in the light dragoons under Capt. Alexander, Lt. Col. Wade Hampton and Gen. Sumter; during 1782 he was in the militia
Boyce, Alexander			He became a lieutenant in the 6th Regiment during 1776 and was a captain on June 27, 1778. He died during November 1779 of wounds received at the siege of Savannah on October 9, 1779.
Boyd, William			Born in 1748 in Ireland He served as a sergeant in the Rangers under Capt. Thomas Woodward during 1775.

 Buchanan, John	Died in April 1824 age 74 Captain - Rev. Vet.	First Methodist	Served as a captain in the 2nd and 6th Regiments from 1777 and was taken prisoner in Charleston on May 12, 1780; was exchanged during June 1781 and served until the end of the war. In addition he was a captain in the 3rd Regiment during 1782 and 1783 and became a brevet major on September 30, 1783
Buchanan, Robert			Died August 31, 1780 He became a 2nd Lieutenant in the 6th Regiment on April 18, 1776 and was a 1st Lieutenant on January 23, 1778. In addition he served as a lieutenant in the 6th Regiment under Capt. John Buchanan during 1779. After being taken prisoner while in the 3rd Regiment at Charleston on May 12, 1780 he died.

Carson, John			Born about 1749 in Maryland He served in the Rangers under Capts. Richard Winn and Thomas Woodward during 1775. At sometime he was under Gen. Sumter. He was in the battle at Sullivan's Island, Hanging Rock and Ninety Six. (Moved to Kentucky)
