You will find an answer to your inquiry in the statement(s) checked below. We do not keep copies of this correspondence. If it is necessary for you to write again, please return this form and all related correspondence to:

1. The enclosed information will help answer your recent inquiry.
2. Please review carefully the enclosed letter which describes the contents of military and related records on file at the National Archives, and request your request for copies on the enclosed NATF Form 26. Order and Billing for Copies of Veterans Records. (Because of the volume of requests we receive each day, we must limit our service to processing requests submitted on the pre-scribed forms.) Pre-payment is required. **Billing for this service has been discontinued.**
3. To locate a veteran's file, we need the following information: (1) name of veteran; (2) war or period in which he fought; and (3) State from which he served.
4. The National Archives does not have records relating to military service prior to the Revolutionary War. You may be able to obtain information by writing the State archives in the State from which the veteran served.
5. The National Archives does not have records relating to service in World Wars I or II or subsequent service. You may obtain information by completing the enclosed Standard Form 180 and directing it to: National Personnel Records Center (Military), 9700 Page Boulevard, St. Louis, MO 63132
6. Prior to 1944, Army regulations allowed the preparation of only an original discharge certificate in support of a pension or bounty-land claim. Confederate soldiers in service at the time of surrenders did not receive discharge certificates. They were given pensions based on military service until 1955. Inquiries about State pensions should be addressed to the State archives or equivalent agency at the capital of the veteran's State of residence after the war.
7. Federal Government units until 1955, inquiries about State pensions should be addressed to the State archives or equivalent agency at the capital of the veteran's State of residence after the war.
8. A soldier's record does not necessarily show all battles or engagements in which he may have participated, nor does it necessarily list all of the officers under whom he served.
9. The bounty land warrant application files relate only to claims based on service rendered in wartime between 1775 and 1855.
10. Records in the National Archives relating to burials of veterans are incomplete. You are advised to address your request for information to the National Cemetery Service (41A), National Cemetery System, Veterans Administration, Washington, DC 20420.
11. When a file fully reproduced will contain more than ten pages of reproductions, we select from the file for reproduction the documents we determine to be of the most value to you for genealogical purposes. By specifically requesting, you may receive copies of all documents in a file. We will bill you for the additional reproduction cost.
12. A veteran's military service record is a file separate and apart from pension files and bounty land warrant application files. Compiled military service records do not normally contain family information.
13. We are enclosing reproductions of a summary of the veteran's military service, taken from his pension application file.
14. A brief history of the organization and activities of the military unit mentioned can be found in Frederick H. Dyer's *A Compendium of the War of the Rebellion* (New York, 1959), Volume 3. Your local library may either have this publication, or be able to assist you in locating a copy.
15. Your remittance of \$ _____ will be refunded by Treasury check in a few weeks.
16. Compiled Military Service records for the Revolutionary War period are fragmentary.





He married in 1783, Hannah ----; he died October 31, 1844, and she survived him in Chester District, South Carolina, and died October 29, 1851.

hundred eighty four and two hundred fifty two
personally appeared before me a Magistrate
within the County of Chester and
one of one said, Miss Martha Aiken a
citizen of Chester District in the State afore-
said who being duly sworn according to
law, declares that she is the daughter of
annah Aiken late deceased, that her mother
annah Aiken was inscribed on the Revolu-
tionary pension Roll after her father's decease
which was on the 30th October 1844. That
her father drew a pension up to the time
of his death, and after his death, her
mother annah Aiken employed a pen-
sion agent by the name -- Butts to receive
her pension on account of her husband
William Aiken) her son in the Revolutionary
war, and to give her pension (certified)
which he did and paid over to her, a
sum of two thousand dollars, the amount not deducted.
That the pension Certificate has been
lost or mislaid and the said Butts
the agent, has removed to parts unknown
That this deponent is informed, that her
is nearly seven years pension due to his wife
and two children (but ~~his~~ ~~she~~ ~~she~~) the
surviving children of William Aiken and
annah Aiken like the amount paid to her
mother. That her father William Aiken
died on the 30th October 1844 and her
mother the 29th of October A.D. 1857. That

And that the same is hereunto appended. This deponent further states on his oath that he was married to the said Nancy Aiken who was the daughter and oldest child of the aforesaid William and Hannah Aiken. On the first day of January A.D 1805 And that his first child was born in November in the same year. And that a record of the ages of his oldest children is herunto appended.

This deponent also states on oath that he came to the United States from Ireland in the year one thousand seven hundred and eighty five And settled in Fairfield District in the State aforesaid. And in the immediate neighborhood of the aforesaid William & Hannah Aiken at which time and place they were living together as husband and wife, so deponent certain knowledge and were recognized as lawfull man and wife by their neighbors.

benefit of the provision made by the Act of Congress
passed March 3rd 1843 and June 17th 1844 granting pen-
sions to certain widow of Revolutionary soldiers.

That she is the widow of William Aiken late
Revolutionary pensioner deceased of Chester District
State of South Carolina, who was a soldier in the Army
of the Revolution and drew a pension under the Act
of the 7th June 1832 at the rate of twenty dollars per annum.

She further declared that she was married to the
said William Aiken in Fairfield District S.C. in the
Month of September hundred and eighty three 1783
first at the time of the revolution, and that her husband
and the aforesaid William Aiken died on the 31st day
of October eighteen hundred and forty four (1844) and that
she has remained a widow ever since that period.

She also declared that she has no family born showing
the date of her marriage nor the births of her children.

The evidence in support of your claim, under the act of June 7, 1832, has been examined, and the papers are herewith returned. The following is a statement of your case in a tabular form. On comparing these papers with the following rules and the enclosed notes, you will readily perceive that objections exist, which must be removed, before a pension can be allowed. The notes and the regulations will show what is necessary to be done. Those points to which your attention is more particularly directed, you will find marked in the margin with a brace, (thus: {}). You will, when you return your papers to this Department, send this printed letter with them; and you will, by complying with this request, greatly facilitate the investigation of your claim.

David Hamilton, John Sloan and Robert
McKnight were all out with disponent under

troops. Other troops were there also. Left the
magazine and marched toward Newbury
and near Newbury ^{filled} ~~filled~~ in with a de-
-livery out of Genl. Green's Army. Received
at ^{near} ~~near~~ them two or three days. Was also
met by Col. Henry Thompson & his State troops
the militia and Hampshire State troops joined
and marched down through the town of
Fay. was at Rockingham twenty miles above
Salem, in the 15 mile burnt, and back
and passed through the rest of the burnt
country. The troops were all mounted. Capt
John Hanson was along and General Melvill
Winn commanded the Regiment of militia.
Sam'l Smart was Adjutant. The regiment was
out about two months this time but was allow-
ed to disband for only two months.

Regiment was first sometime in February
1781 until the last of October 1781 constantly in
militia duty either in the long service daily
marched or in scouting parties against the
British under Captain Manning, with the excep-
tion of a few days in November two days at the time.

at Broad Haven as a place of rendezvous. Major Gray
was Lieutenant, and also George Hinchliffe. The com-
pany was employed in patrolling and escorting
the troops. The troops performed several excursions
through Hobb's Settlement in Springfield District
in the course of these they disbursed a body of rebels
thither at the house of one Smith in Hobb's Settlement
~~and~~ at which the rebels left one in hiding
William Smith and then fled. Report was sent
under Captain Smith in this time two months
at the end of which time Captain Hinchliffe
arrived with some men and Captains
Report was transferred to his command. William
Gray was Captain Hinchliffe's First Lieutenant
and William Rivers Second Lieutenant. Captain
Hinchliffe and his company under his first Lieuten-
ant went to Longmeadow just a little above the pres-
ent site of Cranbury and remained there to collect
more men. The ~~different~~ Lieutenant William
Gray with his company and several other
Militia companies lay across the junction
of Hockliffe and Captain Hinchliffe & Com-
pany, Capt. John White & Company were there.
A company of Artillery arrived in the morn-
ing ^{before} the fort surrendered, thence a Colonel Taylor
commanded the whole of the Militia. Report
on the morning of the surrender whilst no guard
was paid off by ~~the~~ a detachment from the
fort. The guard were sent back until next day
assisted by a company from the main army.
After the surrender the Army were marched from
the Longmeadow to Worcester, where they encamp-
