Fairfield County Dedicates World War II Memorial

It was a proud day for Winnsboro and farfield County. In a ceremony attended by well over 700 people on Monday, the Fairfield commu-

nity dedicated a monument to 29 Fairfield County residents who gave their lives for the cause of freedom during World War II.

A year in the planning and organized largely by Bill Haslett with the help of a number of volunteers including Oliver Johnson, Pam and Donnie Laird and others, the afternoon event began with a parade down Congress Street at 4 p.m to the tune of such WWII-era hits as 'The Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy of Company B? Following the parade, the event proceeded to the expanse of green lawn in front of Mt. Zion Institute where a simple granite monument topped with a magnificent American Eagle and inscribed with the names of those from Fairfield County who died in World War II, rested beneath the shade of several large trees near the edge of the clearing.

After the colors were presented by the Fairfield Central High School Color Guard, the community's leaders both praised and thanked those whose names were inscribed on the monument.

The speaker for the program was Clebe McClary, a decorated Vietnam War veteran, who recounted how he lost an arm, an eye and sustained other serious injuries during a firefight in Vietnam and was rescued along with his surviving comrades by helicopters only moments before they would have been overtaken by the enemy.

Following the ceremony and the introduction of surviving WWII soldiers in attendance, the gathering turned silent as a hugler in the distance played Taps.

A meal was served to all the guests and many finished the day posing for pictures with their war heroes in front of the new monument.
