CEDAR SHOAL CHURCH AND CONGREGATION, CHESTER COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA By the Rev. James H. Saye (1878)

Cedar Shoal Church is situated in Chester County, South Carolina, near a road leading from Richhill to Beckhamville down the ridge between Fishing Creek and Beaverdam an affluent of Rocky Creek. It is one mile south of the road leading from Chester to Lancasterville and two miles distant from the bridge at Cedar Shoal on Fishing Creek.

This church was organized by authority of Bethel Presbytery June 22, 1834, by the Rev. Cyrus Johnston. The circumstances leading to this organization were the following, to wit: Mr. Johnston by invitation of a number of Presbyterian families residing in that vicinity had begun preaching statedly at a stand in the grove which surrounded a schoolhouse near the place where the church now stands. These services being well attended, the organization took place as above stated about six months after Mr. Johnston began preaching.

The persons entering into this organization were the following, viz. Joseph Gaston Esq., Jane Gaston, Daniel G. Stinson, Esther Stinson, Lemuel Davison, Anne Davison, Isabella Walker, William A. White, Robert White and Mary White, formerly members of Richardson Church. Together with the following dismissed from Catholic Church with a view of entering this organization, to wit, Dr. J. B. Gaston, Polly B. Gaston, Jane G. Barkly, Mrs. S. Stinson and Margaret Telford, and the following received by examination and profession of faith, to wit, Mrs. Paisly, Elizabeth B. Davison, Jane Davison, Mrs. Woods and Mrs. Elizabeth McFadden.

Joseph Gaston and Robert White having previously been Ruling Elders in Richardson Church were duly installed as the Ruling Elders of this Church. The ministerial services of the Rev. Cyrus Johnston terminated in this congregation early in 1835. In April of this year the Session reported 18 communicants, one of the orginal members having died and another had been dismissed.

It has been mentioned that a part of the members coming together to form this Church were from Richardson Church and a part from Catholic Church. We shall proceed to give some account of these sources of supply or the religious worship enjoyed and sustained by Presbyterians in this region of country.

Richardson Church was situated near a road leading from the bridge at Cedar Shoal to Roddy Town and about 4 miles above the bridge. Whence the pious people came who settled in this region and began the worship of God at this place, existing documents shed but a feeble light. The settlements on the West side of the Catawba River were probably at first regarded as but an extension of the Waxhaws as the settlements on the other side of the river were commonly denominated. It is certain that these settlements were closely associated in distance and interest and perhaps many of the people by relationship and other ties.

To illustrate this subject we shall make quotations from two journals kept by men who passed through this region at an early period and wrote down observations in regard to the appearance of the country and the state of society. The first is an extract from the journal of the Rev. Hugh McAden who was sent out by the Synod of New York and Philadelphia in 1755 through the Southern provinces. He states as follows:

"Friday the 14th (November) took my leave of these parts (near Love, a ford on Broad River) and set out for the Waxhaws forty-five miles good; that night reached Thomas Fasle's where I lodged till Sabbath day; then I rode to James Patton's about two miles and preached to a pretty large congregation of Presbyterian people. Wednesday preached again in the same place and crossed the Catawba River and came to Henry White's."

Here he remained till Sabbath the 23rd at the meeting house five miles off and went home with Justice Dickens (should be Pickens). The preaching here first mentioned was probably in the bounds of the Lower Fishing Creek congregation. So judged from the probable position and the fact that both Fasels and Pattons were subsequently members of this church.

The following is an extract from a journal of travels in the year 1766, by Mr. Candour McFadden, whose home at the time was beyond the Potomac River but who came to South Carolina and took notes of his journeyings and observations. He subsequently settled in the Fishing Creek country and is now represented by a numerous posterity in that region.

"Friday July 18th. Set out from the courthouse (Charlotte) and crossed Sugaw Creek-- An exceedingly grassy country but thinly settled. And a few miles farther came into the Catawba nation. It is a tract of country 15 miles square 7 1/2 on each side of the Catawba River with a vast extent of old Indian fields on the East side of the river but the Indians is moved a few miles lower down the river though I saw many of them. Here I crossed the Catawba River about twenty miles from Mecklinburg. It is a large river, about 100 perches (perch is 5 1/2 yards) over and in common seasons rideable. It makes its course South as do all the principal rivers in those parts, but turns more easterly and after a course of above 200 miles bassing by a famous trading place called Pinetree (Camden) and receiving the Congaree (might be Cougaree) Broad river, Saluda and many other rivers, it falls into the sea 70 miles east of Charlestown.

"About 10 miles over this river, I came to Fishing Creek, where the road to Saluda crosses it. Here I turned down the creek to the Southeastward 15 miles and proceeded no farther. It is a large creek, runs very deep and slow with a fine level country about it and thick settled in some places. Here the Rev. William Richardson has a congregation, to whom he preaches one Sabbath in three. He is esteemed a very worthy man and labors faithfully among them. The rest of his labors is spent about ten miles distant in a place called the Waxhaws on the East Side of the Catawba river. Here I am now about 50 miles from Pinetree and about 180 from Charlestown, and about 40 from Broad river and about 100 to Saluda river. I am now about ten miles in the South Province. The land hereabouts is exceedingly grassy and lies very level, but no swamps nor marshes, the water good and clear but not very cold. The land is exceeding fruitful in many places but there is much of it not settled, being esteemed but thin, although it produces excellent pasture, so that they who get a piece of good land may keep what stock they will, of all sorts."

From the above extracts it appears-

1. That there was a Presbyterian population in striking distance of the Lower Fishing Creek Church in November 1755.

2. That in July 1766 it was a church enjoying the regular services of a pastor, the Rev. William Richardson, in connection with the Waxhaw Congregation.

Of the families resident in the bounds of this congregation at the

time of McFadden's visit 1766, we mention Justice John Gaston who located on the west bank of Fishing Creek one mile below the Cedar Shoal. John Gaston was a native of the North of Ireland, was of Huguenot ancestry who fled from France upon the revocation of the edict of Nantes and stopped first in Scotland whence they removed to Ireland where John was born. About 1730 with others of his relations he came to Pennsylvania where he married Miss Esther Waugh. His brother Hugh became a minister of the Presbyterian Church and was the author of a work known as Gaston's Collections.

About the middle of the 18th century John Gaston, following the current immigration southward, came to the valley of the Catawba. In the year 1760 he was residing as above stated on the South or West bank of Fishing Creek within a mile of the present site of Cedar Shoal Church and five miles below Lower Fishing Creek Church. He was a surveyor by occupation and did an extensive business in this line. He was also a Justice of the Peace under the royal government. He and his family were connected with the Presbyterian Church and devout Christians. His family consisted of 9 sons and three daughters; to which at the beginning of the war had been added 2 grandsons. He had four sisters married and residing in the region of Fishing Creek. These were Mary McLure, a widow in 1780 and residing three miles east of Lewis turn-out on the C. C. & A. R. R. on the road to Rocky Mount, Mrs. Strong, who resided in 1780 at Fishing Creek Church, Mrs. Knox and Mrs. Rosborough, wife of Alexander and mother of the Rev. William Gaston Rosoborough. Mr. A. Rosoborough's residence was a mile westward of Rich-hill. These families were all connected with the Church and probably with Lower Fishing Creek in 1766. Most of them were distinguished in the War of the Revolution either by deeds or suffering and many of them by both. The home of the Justice was devastated by plunderers and he driven into exile though his head was whitened by the snows of 80 winters. Three of his sons were killed in the battle of Hanging Rock and his youngest son Joseph was shot down and carried the scars to his grave in 1836.

Walter Brown who moved into the congregation a little subsequent to 1766, was afterwards a Ruling Elder of the congregation. The later Rev. John Brown, D. D. of Georgia was his son. He was also the father of Mrs. Jane Gaston, wife of Joseph Gaston, both of blessed memory.

The wife of the Rev. John Bowman was the daughter of Mr. Alexander Rosborough and the sister of Dr. A. Rosborough, late an Elder of the Fishing Creek congregation who removed to Middle Tennessee.

The death of Mr. Richardson took place in the Summer of 1771.

In the year of 1773 this church in connection with Upper Fishing Creek was supplied by Mr. John Simpson who was ordained and installed pastor of these congregations in 1774 by the Presbytery of Orange. He continued Pastor of this church till after the close of the Revolutionary War when he withdrew from this place.

It is probable that Mr. John Bowman, a licentiate of Orange Presbytery, supplied this church a short time in 1793 as it had been resuscitated the year previous under the labors of Mr. John Brown who was supplying at Waxhaw and other places. Mr. William G. Rosborough also probably supplied here in the years 1795, 1796 and 1797, as they called him in regular form, but he from feeble health was compelled to return their call after two years of effort in their service.

In April 1798 the united congregations of Fishing Creek gave an invitation to Mr. John B. Davies to labor among them as a supply. He

was a licentiate of the Presbytery of South Carolina. The Church of Lower Fishing Creek changed its name to Richardson probably in 1792 through respect for its first pastor. Hence is to be known by that name.

Mr. Davies having accepted calls from Fishing Creek and Richardson was ordained and installed over these congregations May 14, 1799. Mr. Davies remained in the pastoral charge of these churches till 1831 when he resigned that of Richardson but retained that of Fishing Creek. We thus see that this church enjoyed his ministrations for a period of 33 years.

The question arises who were the Elders of this congregation in the first years of its existence? We are unable to determine this matter. It is probable that Justice John Gaston may have been in this office from his known character and position. At the reorganization in 1792 Walter Brown and James Crawford were Elders. Crawford came from the Fairforest Church shortly after the revolution and settled about a mile from Cedar Shoal on lands now belonging to Erwin White. His son Edward married and settled in the Waxhaw congregation with which he was connected till his removal within the bounds of Fishing Creek congregation of which he was installed an Elder in 1819. Another son, Alexander Crawford, came into Fishing Creek Church as an Elder in 1835 by certificate from Richardson.

Mr. Davies began to supply this Church in April 1798. At that period there were 44 members. Added up to October 1, 1799, 17, making a total of communicants at that period of 61. On the 17th of that month the following addition was made to the Session, to wit, William Davidson, James Gaston, Joseph Gaston, Isaac McFadden and Felix Davies.

The William Davidson here named came a few years before from the Bethesda Church and settled on Fishing Creek east side a mile below the bridge at Cedar Shoal.

On the 20th of July 1822 Alexander Crawford, Isaac McFadden and Robert White were set apart as Elders.

The ministry of Mr. Davies at this church extended through a period of 33 years, ending in 1831. In this time there were added to its membership upon examination 78, by certificate 29, total additions 107, 115 were dismissed, 29 members died, 212 infants were baptized and 10 adults. The last report 1831 states the communicants then to be 26.

There had then been a sensible decline in the strength of the congregation. The cause was probably removals by the members into distant places and the coming in their places members of other denominations. The Gastons are known to have removed, except Joseph who died on the homestead of his father in 1836.

It was mentioned that certain persons were received from Catholic Church at the organization of the Cedar Shoal Church. The following facts in relation to this matter are worthy of record.

When the Rev. Mr. McCulloch was pastor of Catholic he had preached statedly about Rocky Mount. In the Spring of 1809 on the invitation of Samuel Ferguson, an Elder of Catholic, he began preaching at a place on the road above Beckamville and about five miles from the site of Cedar Shoal Church and on the same road lying on the ridge between Fishing and Rocky Creeks, a position truly Mesopotamic in its surroundings, having the big creeks on each side and the lower gap between them stopped by the river a few miles distant. People living on this peninsula are cut off from Catholic by distance and big Rocky Creek and its affluents.


During the late 1700's, the Bullock's Creek Presbyterian Church had as its pastor a very distinguished and learned man in the Rev. Dr. Joseph Alexander. Rev. Alexander was a graduate of Princeton University and attended that school when the prominent Jonathan Edwards was its president. First settling in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina, Rev. Alexander helped to establish a college there by the name of Liberty Hall. Afterwards, Rev. Alexander settled near Bullock's Creek (York District, S. C.), bringing with him a wealth of education and experience and quickly becoming a respected person in education and within the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Alexander maintained a grammar school near his church which was one of the earliest - if not the earliest - school in York County. However, it was not just a grammar school but more of a classical academy where Latin and Greek were very much a part of the curriculum. Rev. Alexander taught some very prominent men who traveled from far away to attend his school. In an address at Bullock's Creek on October 16, 1890, Dr. T. R. English mentioned some of these men as: Issac Sadler, a poet; Governor Johnson of South Carolina; Judge Smith of Yorkville; William H. Crawford of Georgia, Presidential candidate; and Andrew Jackson, President of the United States.

Seeing that a college was needed for the encouragement of learning, and that Rev. Alexander had operated a grammar school "in which a considerable number of students have made great proficiency in literary education", the South Carolina Legislature incorporated the school as Alexandria College on December 16, 1797. By this Act, Alexandria College was fully incorporated and maintained "the same powers of any college of this State". The State Legislature also appointed twentyone men as trustees of the college. These men were: Joseph Alexander, James Templeton, John Simpson, Francis Cummins, Robert McCulloch, James White Stephenson, John Brown, Robert Wilson, William Williamson, Robert Becgum Walker, Samuel Whorter Yongue, John Foster, John Kennedy, James Gilliland, William Smith, Abraham Nott, Andrew Love, Alexander Moore, Thomas Brandon, William Bratton, and Samuel Dunlap.


Two full years after incorporation, on December 21, 1799, the State Legislature granted escheated properties to the college at the disposal of the trustees. However, the college never reached the success expected and Rev. Alexander, possibly because of infirmity, gave up the college and was succeeded by Rev. George Reid. After a few years, Rev. Reid removed the school elsewhere, possibly to Winnsboro as he began Mt. Zion College there in 1802.

Even though Alexandria College never reached the success hoped for, it is without a doubt that the Rev. Dr. Joseph Alexander helped pioneer early education in the upper part of South Carolina. Rev. Alexander died on September 29, 1809.

Major General S. W. Crawford of Huntsville, Ala., visited Chester in 1871 and wrote this letter to his father Rev. S. W. Crawford, D. D. telling of his trip.

> Huntsville, Ala. Nov. 20, 1871

Dear Pa:

I wrote you something of my trip to Chester C. H. and promised something more in detail and here it is.

On the third of November I left Chester in a carriage with Dr. A. P. Wylie, whose guest I was, and taking the Saluda road, traveled about six miles. We turned off to the right near a Mr. Wherry's and crossed the "Mountain Gap" road; and shortly after the South Fishing creek, and coming in about a mile further on to the Old Fishing creek and graveyard.

I entered the graveyard at once and began an examination of the gravestones. It is a very old yard, established before the Revolution. An old stone fence surrounds the space, now about four acres. A new part has been added towards the creek. The old soapstone tablets show the old graves, although many have fallen and others remain in fragments. There were no stones placed here before 1800. At least Mr. D. G. Stinson, an old man of 80 who had been sent for by Dr. Wylie, and who joined us in the graveyard says that such is his impression. The Crawfords and Wylies were buried here.

Alexander Crawford Born March 6, 1783 Departed this life Feb. 2, 1852 Aged 67 years.

Agnes Crawford Wife of James Crawford Died 1838, aged 82 years.

J. F. Straight Born Sept. 19, 1802 Died July 10, 1865 Aged 62 years 9 months.

> George Straight Died 1843 Aged 79 years.

Joseph Gaston

Archibald Gill Died April 23, 1823 Aged 89 years. Died 2nd of Oct., 1805, aged 46 years.

I wandered on down the centre of the graveyard, trying to decipher the old marks; old Mr. Stinson was on his knees before some old tablet; his white hair flowing in the wind and looking like "old Mortality", when suddenly I came upon an old bent soapstone tablet; right in the midst of the Straight's space, and judge of my emotions when I found that underneath my feet lay Rosanna Wylie, the sister of Dr. Wylie and the kind aunt who sheltered Aunt Margaret during the early days of her orphanhood. Yes there was the record, and annexed. I give you almost facsimilie of her tomb-stone.

> Sacred to the Memory of Rosanna Strait wife of Christopher Strait Who died Oct., 2, 1812 Aged 46 years. I'm going unto the happy shore Where pain and death are known no more.

Old Strait had three wives, and there they lie, side by side, with old Christopher at the head. He outlived all of them and then departed. Close by the grave of Rosanna Strait is a stone bearing the following: "Here lies the body of Margaret Strait, alias Patton, wife of Christopher Strait who departed this life, 8 July A. D. 1788 aged 35 years."

Near this grave also is that of his first wife (a Reamer) Mary Strait. She died August 29, 1734 aged 48 years. And then comes old Christopher himself, he died Jan. 14, 1816 aged 77 years, and he had the following cut on his stone:

"My day has come, my glass has run My resting place is here; This stone was got to show the spot Less man might dig too near."

Which leads to the conclusion that Christopher was something of a "wag".

But it was fast growing dark, and the cold N. E. wind gave token of speedy rain and so after plucking a few flowers from Rosanna's grave and a hurried examination of the old church, we returned to the comfortable wraps of the carriage, and turned our horses heads southward and soon arrived at Mr. Lewis's, son-in-law of Mr. Stinson's where we remained all night. Of course the object of my visit was the absorbing subject of conversation. A more thorough search was to be made and the whole matter was discussed. Mr. Stinson knew everybody apparently that had been in the county for the last century. His memory was something wonderful, and already persons in search of historical and revolutionary associations have found him out, and a cute Boston Yankee who is writing the life of Sumpter has just been here and at his house for two weeks.

It appears that a Mr. Douglas bought the place after Christopher died and made some changes, but I will give the account as I obtained it from Mr. Wherry, who has lived all his life next to the place, and who now owns it.

We now arranged the following programme for the next day. We were to return to the churchyard and, then go to see Mrs. Crawford who lived close by and who is now very old and has lived all her life in the neighborhood. After that, to return to the Saluda Road and go to Dr. Strait's place, after that we were to take the road to Rocky Creek and the old Covenanter church. Old Stinson was rich in his memories of bygone days, and he read to us from the "Women of the Revolution" by Mrs. Ellet a long contribution of his own. The fact is he has furnished more material for history hunters in that section than any living man. He went into the Covenanter settlement questions and produced a book written by Dr. Howe, called the "History of the Presbyterian Church in South Carolina." In this book is an article furnished by Mr. Stinson on the Covenanters of S. C. and it gives a short but concise history of the church in this section. It gives an account too of the churches and the various ministers and the whole history of the organization. Martin the first minister came over in 1772. He died in 1806, he had the oldest Covenanter church in the county. It was two miles east of what is long known as Catholic Church on the Rocky Mount road, about ten or more miles from Chester, and between Big and Little Rocky Creeks. This old Covenanter church was burned by the British in 1780 on account of a sermon preached by Martin urging the settlers to take arms for Independence. The Covenanters not feeling themselves strong enough to sustain a minister and not altogether liking Martin (for he was a fighting parson

and fond of whiskey), joined the Seceders and the Associate Reformed and established "Catholic Church", the name indicating the general or universal use of the church. Rev. Martin preached for many years. The old quaint church and its old graveyard impressed me very much, but I will tell you of it directly. Martin settled on Rocky Creek and died in 1806.

Mr. Stinson produced an old letter from Henry Malcolm to John Lynn from Ballygowan Ireland, May 30, 1773, in which he says "we have it reported here that Mr. Martin and his Covenanters had ill getting their lands and that Mr. Cochrane was the occasion of all their trouble." In going over the grounds of the day, Mr. Stinson told me of McLeods letters and that a Mr. Gates of Charleston had referred Mac to Dr. Douglas who referred him to Mr. Stinson. He told me also that some ten years ago, a Mr. John Simpson had asked him in regard to your father and mother and that he applied to a Mr. Thomas Walker whose mother was a cousin of Dr. S. B. Wylie, your uncle. This Mr. Walker lived below Landsford on the Catawba. John and William Wylie, cousins of Dr. S. B. Wylie, lived and died here at, or near the Union Associate Reformed Church. You will find it marked on the map I sent you. This Mr. Walker told Mr. Stinson that he had heard Dr. Wylie preach.

After making a note of these facts it was time to retire for the night.

Saturday Nov. 4th 1871.

We were up at daylight and were soon on our way. We went first to Mrs. James Crawford's the daughter of Archy Gill. She was over 68 years of age, and was brought up at a place near her present residence. She lives about one mile in a direct line from Mr. Strait's. She remembers Aunt Margaret very well and said she had a sweet voice. She said she saw her start with Joh McNinch and his wife, Aunt M. riding horseback, John McNinch and wife in a buggy. She remembered that it was reported that either Aunt or Mrs. McNinch was injured during the trip, by the fracture of some limb. It was this woman's son, Mr. James Crawford, that McLeod wrote, but he declined to answer him.

We then went to Fishing Creek graveyard, and remained an hour, looking over the old tablets and deciphering the worn inscriptions. On our return we met Mr. Wherry, to whom we had sent word to meet us and he turned and accompanied us to his house on the Saluda road, (the same road we had come yesterday) and just at a point we had turned in we passed on down the Saluda road about a guarter or half a mile and here close to the road stood the site of Christopher Strait's old house. Here at last, I stood upon the very site of the house that had sheltered Aunt M. after your loss. I was fortunate in having for my guide a man whose whole life had been passed on the next place, who remembered Aunt M. and who could give me much reliable information of the property. The foundation of the old house is now grown over and nothing but the outline remains, and hardly that, the old stones forming the foundation of the chimney still exist. I broke off a small piece of granite and will enclose it with this. Near its site stands the old well from which no doubt Aunt M. often drew water. I send a sketch of the old well I made and spring house as it now stands. Three old trees stand around it, two catalpas and one large Kentucky coffee tree, very old. The old house was about twenty-five by twenty feet, one story and had a half high, built of pine logs, peeled not hewn. It was torn down by Mr. Douglass who built another near it which still stands vacant, although still habitable. In front of

the old house is a large walnut tree, and there are china and locust on each side of the road. The old locust have been standing a long while. The timber has been all used from the place and there is not none on it to fence it. Douglass who bought from Strait, used the old house for a kitchen and dining room for a long time.

From Douglas it went to Billy Best and from him to John Pagan and then to a Mrs. McDaniel, a widow; John Pagan married her daughter and went west and sold it to Mrs. McDaniel. She held it for three years and then sold it to James and David Crawford, who bought it from Sam Boyd and from Boyd it was bought by David Crawford. He sold it to Edward Mills, and he sold it to Mr. James F. Wherry who now owns it, and whose family have owned the adjoining place for over a century.

Wherry was born in 1802, remembers well Aunt M., and spoke of her sweet voice, mentioned some of her songs. His father and mother saw Aunt M. go north with John and Mrs. McNinch. The place is about 200 acres. It was all woods nearly in the early part of the century. The Rail Road from Chester to Charlotte, N. C. now goes through the low grounds. Douglas rebuilt the house in 1816 or -17.

Christopher Strait was a tall fine looking man of good presence and a successful planter of cotton and corn. I had forgotten to mention that Dr. Gibbs lived on the place at some time and cut down a fine orchard; some few fruit trees still remain. Mr. Wherry lived on his father's place when Aunt Margaret was at Mrs. Strait's. He said they called her Peggy.

After visiting her house and seeing his family, who were very kind, we turned towards the Rocky Creek country. I had lingered long about the site of the old place, of which I had heard so much in my childhood, but it was far from satisfactory. It was here I learned the sad end of Rosanna and the spot was pointed out to me. Desolation and decay seemed to reign unmolested and I was not sorry to turn away from it to more inviting scenes.

We kept on the Saluda road to "Lewis Turnout" half way to Chester when we turned to the left on the Rocky Mount road to Beckhamville we were hunting up the old folks we could find. First we stopped at a Mrs. Ferguson's or Finney's, she was a Johnson, was over 80 but she was not communicative. I think she thought we were Ku KLUX for she would give no information whatever. I finally asked her how old she was, but this was an unfortunate question and stirred up the female reserve to a fierce extent. "I don't know how old I am, I never kept no writing. I don't remember nothin."

Our visit was short as you may infer and I was greatly tempted to allude to a story of her early life. I had heard among the "Faste" of the Country. She was courted in her early days by John McKee, a pompous old pump, who expired in Chester only two or three months ago, aged 84. He lived in the village and was a punctilious man. He went to her house one night to see her. It was a new house, and the boards had only been laid on the floor upstairs but had not been nailed down. Miss Johnson was upstairs making herself beautiful, John was sitting before the fire in the room immediately below. But Miss Johnson with that curiousity that reigns in the female breast thought she would take a peep at John. She was at the moment nearly in the condition of Hans Breitman's mermaid, "a maiden mit nothing on," so she stepped to the edge of the board which immediately tilted up sending Miss Johnson to slide right on top of John and doubling him up to the floor. The old woman, her mother who was in the room, retained her presence of mind, hollered to her to "run to the barn" and she ran out leaving John McKee on the floor. He picked himself up and then broke off the match, but I said nothing about it and we soon left. (To be continued in the next bulletin)

Jane Eleanor Craig, fifth of nine children born to Thomas & Elizabeth Craig. Thomas Craig married his cousin Elizabeth Craig and was disinherited by his father, William Craig. Thomas was the son of William & Jane Logan Craig. William was the oldest son of John & Eleanor Craig who came to S. C. from Ireland in Nov. 1773, landing at Charleston, and locating near Enoree River, in what was then the Ninetysix District. John Craig was born sometime prior to 1740, and after coming to S. C. served in the Revolution as a private in the S. C. Militia. He died in 1785, and was buried in the old Duncan's Creek Presbyterian Churchyard, near Clinton. The will of Eleanor Craig, his widow, is recorded in Laurens, S. C. court records.

May the 3rd, 1779

Dear and Loving Husband,

I received your letter dated April the 27th last past. I gladly embrace this opportunity to let you know I and the children are all in good health at present. Blessed be God for his mercy. Wishing these may find you in good health also. The frost that was on the day of the 29th of last month, hath killed chief of the wheat and the rie (rye), if not all, it killed also part of the flase (flax). Nothing would be more desirable to me than to have your company at home with me but I would be far from desiring you to desert. I have got the field for the corn cleared and William Paul hath plowed it for me, and I expect to get it planted this week. No person hath molested me to rob me as yet, but I am many times in great fear when dogs bark at night. I add no more at present but I remain your loving and affectionate wife until death.

Jennet Linn Please to tell John Rock and John McDill that each of their wives are well.
