

THE GRANT FAMILY

The following is a historical sketch of the Grant family as prepared by Mrs. A. N. Grant (known as "Miss Marie", now deceased) for the first Grant family re-union at Armenia in August of 1935.

The first authentic information we have about the Grant family in this part of South Carolina is that James Grant and John Grant, probably brothers, came before the Revolutionary War, to what is now Chester county, from Virginia. From Court house records in 1798, we find James Grant sold land on Sandy river and bought land on Jewel's Fork of Sandy river. This man's wife was named Dorcas. They had two sons, James II and Benjamin, and four daughters, Polly, Phoebe, Sarah, and Tabitha. We have not yet been able to trace the descendants of James II.

As close as we can figure, Benjamin was born between 1790 and 1800. He married Lavina Williams, a sister of Jesse Williams. To them were born six sons and three daughters: (Capt.) Benjamin Andrew, James Henry, Caroline, Neely Marion, Jasper Newton, Gains, Calhoun McDuffie (Mack), Cynthia, and Sarah. There are three head-stones in Armenia cemetery made by Benjamin. They are rough rocks with the letters "B. G., L. G., died 1870; M. C. G., died 1845." The first stone lay under his house for several years and was placed at the grave after his death. The date was never cut on it.

On the old Walker Mill Pond road, which goes from Mr. John Pressly's store on the Wilksburg road to the road at Sam Grant's that goes past Armenia church, there were two houses. The first one was Benjamin's. It stood about 500 yards below and on the same side of the road as Walter Simpson's gin house. The second one was James R. (Rock) Grant's who married Benjamin's sister Tabitha. This house is about 500 yards below and on the same side of the road, and is still standing. It is now owned by Mr. J. J. Dodds. The way I distinguish these two branches of the family is, the first belonged to the Tribe of Benjamin and the second was founded on a Rock.

Benjamin's oldest son was Benjamin Andrew, born June 16, 1815. He married Sarah McAnulty. They had three sons and three daughters, Francis Marion, of Malone, Fla., now 94 years old; Callie, and Newton. The daughters' names, I do not know. This family went to Western Alabama in 1858. I received this information in a letter last week.

James Henry, born in 1818, married Elizabeth H. Pressley. They had seven sons, one dying in infancy: Benjamin Andrew, James Wesley, Leander Harrison, Lafayette Taylor, Amzi Neely, and Thomas Henry (Dock). They lived in a two-story log house below the present sight of Mr. Sam Dove's house. In the early 50's they built a new house in which Mr. Sam Dove lives and where, eighty years ago today, Mr. A. Neely Grant was born.

Neely Marion, born in 1826, married Caroline Pressley. They lived where Mr. Ainsley Grant formerly lived, and Mr. Henry Wilson now lives. To them were born three sons and three daughters: Ann, Emily and Ainsley (twins), Edward, Martha and Pierce. His second wife was Mary Hohen. They had two daughters, Jo and Ledgie.

Jasper Newton, born in 18--, married Frances Pressley and lived on Walker Mill creek below his brother, Neely's. They had three sons and three daughters: Washington Wallace, Thomas Newton, Jasper Terry, Etta, Phronie and Alphon (Tid). These three Grant brothers married three Pressley sisters.

Caroline, born in 1820, married John Estes, and lived on Jewel's Fork, and later on the Walker Mill road, just above Mr. John Pressley's house. They had two daughters and two sons: Martha, Rhoda, Neely and William.

Sarah, born in 1822, married John Grant, one of Rock's sons. She did not live long.

Cynthia, born in 1824, was never married.

Gains married and moved to Georgia. There were no children in this family.

Calhoun McDuffie married Sarah Johnsey. They moved to Georgia, and had seven sons and two daughters: Benjamin, Andrew, Quinton, George, Morgan, Albert, Alonzo, Zellie and Ollie. This is the original tribe of Benjamin.

Rock Grant and his wife, Tabitha, had five sons and six daughters: Jason, John, Alex, James (Jimpsey), Ben, Serenna (Rene), Catherine, Mary, Caroline, Betsy and Sally. Ben, Betsy and Sally never married. John, Alex, Jimpsey, Catherine and Caroline each had several children. Jason and Mary each had one son.

Tracing generations is very interesting, but to listen to the reading of names and dates is very tiresome, so we have prepared a chart, showing the Grant generations, as far as possible, from the two brothers from Virginia to the present day. To my knowledge the two latest ones are James Melvin Grant, born July 22, 1935, a great-great grandson of James H. Grant, and son of Olin and Ada Grant, and Ainsley Smith, born July 24, 1935, a great-grandson of Neely M. Grant, and son of Weldon and Lucille Grant.

These people were industrious, honest and neighborly, working through and through in harvest time. Jasper, Neely, and James Henry, who lived close together, went to their father, Benjamin's very often. Their boys liked to go with them. The young boys were taught to work, but had plenty of fun. They only went to Chester about once a year, and that was when the circus came to town. Uncle Neely (Big Neely) would bring all the boys, Ainsley, Ed and Pierce, Terry, Washie and Tom, Harris and "T", Neely and Dock in the wagon to see the parade and the sights but they never went inside the tents. It was a wonderful trip and talked about for months afterwards.

There were very few schools when these boys were "coming up". Each family paid so much toward a teacher's salary. The school term varied in length, but the children stayed from early morning until late afternoon. There was a log school house at the Bonnet Rock. Just one room with a big fireplace and no windows. So the door stood open to give light. The benches were made of slabs and there was one big desk where the children did their writing. Uncle Jimmy Carson, Miss Betsy Killian, who is still living, and Mr. Harrison Grant, great uncle of Mr. J. Martin Grant, were some of the teachers. Just across the road from this school was a blacksmith shop, belonging to Bill Grant, a son of Phoebe Grant and nephew of Benjamin Grant. Bill and his son, Jim, would make and lay plows, make horse shoes, etc. Little Neely and Ainsley would look through the cracks between the logs of the school house and see the sparks fly as the smiths beat the hot iron on the anvil. The next school was held in the preacher's tent on the old camp ground. Here Mr. Buchanan, first editor of The Chester Reporter, and "Humpy-Back" Jim Sanders taught.

The first Armenia school was built between 1876 and 1880. Mr. John Grant, whose house still stands just below Mrs. Ainsley Grant's on the Chester road, gave the land. Mr. Taylor Grant superintended the building

of it and Mr. Neely Grant and Mr. Zach Roof built the chimney. The next generations went to this school. Misses Molly Lackey, Catty Lucas, Mary Traywick and Mattie Mills, each taught several years, and boarded with Mr. and Mrs. Neely Grant at the cross roads. The late Austin Wilks and Miss Lizzie Lowry also taught here.

The lives of these people were so closely associated with the church that we can not speak of one without the other. The first record we have of a church or a preacher in this community was in 1832, when the Chester circuit extended from near Columbia to four miles northwest of Chester. The preacher was J. H. Robinson, a circuit rider. Preaching was held whenever the circuit rider came, regardless of the day of the week.


The first church was organized and built at Armenia in 1843, by one, James Grant. The land was given by Jesse Johnsey and his wife, Mary. The preacher was Rev. John Watts. Mr. Thomas Pressley, grandfather of James H., Neely M., and Jasper's children was the first class leader. He carried a walking stick with a curved handle and when the boys were mischievous he hooked it around their necks and gave it a twist. In 1859, the circuit was divided and east Chester included New Hope, Armenia, and Capers Chapel.

Sometime during the existence of this church, the Bonnet Rock Camp Ground Arbor was built. There were thirty acres in the grounds. The arbor was good size. There were two aisles, crossing in the center, and the seats were made of slabs. Behind the pulpit there were seats for the colored people. Fresh wheat straw was spread around the altar. The arbor was lighted by candles, one large chandelier, holding about fifteen candles, was suspended from the center of the roof. Single candles burned on each post at the edge of the arbor and the grounds outside were lighted by pine knots. Four stobs were driven in the ground, a plank laid on them and then a shovel of dirt. On this the lighted knots were placed.

Each family had a rude cabin or tent. The fathers, mothers, and children would "pack up" and come in wagons and stay a week while the meeting was going on. Some member of the family would go home each day to tend to the stock. Not only the families from the immediate neighborhood, but also people from miles away attended the meeting. Oh! what glorious services were held there in "lay-by" time. At night the younger children were put to bed and the others went to service. I have been told that the grand old hymns and fervent prayers of those devout worshippers have never been forgotten. I do not know when the arbor was built, but it was torn down sometime between 1875-80, shortly after the second church was built.

In these early years most people walked to church. Some went in wagons and some rode horseback and the old "upping block" still stands across the road from the original site of the second church. The first buggy in the community, a two wheeled gig, was owned by grandfather Thomas Pressley.

The second church was built in 1872-3. Every family did their share in cutting and hauling logs to the mill and bringing the lumber to the church grounds. The church was built by a Mr. Alexander, from North Carolina, and was a two story structure. The upstairs was used by the Masons and also for entertainments. This man also built the houses of Mr. Wesley Carter and Mr. Jesse Hardin.

REVEREND THOMAS CRAIGHEAD

Thomas was the son of Rev. Robert Craighead and wife Agnes Hart. Rev. Robert Craighead was born in 1633 and died in August 1711. Rev. Thomas Craighead was born in Scotland and came to New England in October 1714 with his sister Catherine and her husband, Rev. William Horne. They settled at Martha's Vineyard and are buried at Chilmark. Their eldest son, Robert Horne, was a sea captain, who resided in Boston and married Mary, a sister of Benjamin Franklin.

Rev. Thomas Craighead married a daughter of a Scotch laird, named Margaret. At any rate, he left New England in 1723 after receiving a call from the congregation of Elk River, and later moving to Lancaster Co., Pennsylvania in 1733. In 1738, he was installed as pastor of the Big Spring Presbyterian Church at Newville, thus becoming the first pastor in the Cumberland Valley, at which time we assume he was well advanced in years. We can reason he must have been born about 1680, for his daughter Jane married Rev. Adam Boyd in 1724, which at the law of averages would place his age at that time at about forty-five years.

The last of April, 1739, at the close of a Communion Service, he pronounced the benediction, waved to the congregation, exclaiming "Farewell! Farewell", then expired in perfect peace. "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His saints." He left four sons and one daughter.

No monument marks his grave, but the spot is under the corner of the first house of worship erected at Big Spring. In front of the main auditorium of the present house of worship is a large tablet with the following inscription:

In memory of a valiant Servant of the Lord REV. THOMAS CREAGHEAD

In this Church October, 1738 he became the first installed pastor in the Cumberland Valley. He died in the pulpit, at close of Communion service, April, 1739; Buried under the corner stone of the original House of worship He was born in Ulster and educated in Scotland. Pastorates: Donegal, Ireland; Freetown, Mass.; 1715 White Clay, Delaware, 1724 Pequea, Lancaster County, Pa., 1733 Supply at Meeting House Springs, Carlisle 1736. Erected 1939 by his descendants Big Spring Presbyterian Church.

REVEREND ALEXANDER CRAIGHEAD

The most colorful and perhaps the most aggressive man to occupy the pulpit of Middle Octorara Church at any time in its long history, was a Scotchman by the name of Rev. Alexander Craighead, son of Rev. Thomas Craighead and grandson of Rev. Robert Craighead, a Scottish minister who removed to Ireland in 1657.

We are not certain of the birth of Rev. Alexander Craighead (1706?), but it is possible he was born in America, or of such an early age on his arrival, that he grew up to know no other land as home.

At the time of his coming to Middle Octorara, Lancaster Co., Penn. in 1735, Rev. Alexander Craighead was, in addition, to his duties there, directed to preach "over the river", being the first to whom this duty was assigned. This type of ministry appealed strongly to a man of his energy and enthusiasm for preaching the gospel. For a time, Rev. Craighead seems to have roamed at will from Virginia to North Carolina.

In 1749, he removed to Windy Cove on Cow Pasture River, Augusta Co., Virginia. He and his congregation went to the House of God fully equipped to meet any attacks of savages. After Braddock's defeat, his people fled to North Carolina and Rev. Craighead became pastor of Rocky River and Sugar Creek Presbyterian Churches. While serving these churches, he was destined to exort an influence upon the thinking of the citizens of Mecklenburgh County, which bore fruit in the famous Mecklenburgh Declaration

of Independence, May 20, 1775. He did not live to personally take part in the action, but all historians agree that Rev. Craighead planted the seeds of Freedom and Independence in North Carolina and he was given credit for being the apostle of the Mecklenburgh Declaration of Independence.

Rev. Craighead died in March 1766, leaving eight children. He is buried in the church yard of Sugar Creek Presbyterian Church. On the side of the first church building, which is located one quarter mile west of the present one on Craighead Road, there is a stone marker with a bronze plaque with the following inscription:

SUGAW CREEK

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

FIRST CHURCH IN MECKLENBURG COUNTY

ORGANIZED 1756

FIRST PASTOR ALEXANDER CRAIGHEAD

ERECTED BY

NATIONAL SOCIETY COLONIAL DAMES OF AMERICA

IN THE STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA

1934

Numerous descendants of Rev. Alexander Craighead live in this area now. One daughter, Jane, married Rev. David Caldwell, D. D., a native of Lancaster Co., S. C., the eldest son of Andrew and Martha Caldwell. Another daughter, Nancy, married Rev. William Richardson of the Waxhaws. Rev. Richardson was an Englishman, who came to Philadelphia in 1750, moving later to Virginia, where he resided with the family of Rev. Samuel Davies. He was ordained July 18, 1758 and came to the Waxhaws in 1759 where he became the chief shepherd and spiritual leader of this and adjacent congregations for the next twelve years. Nancy entered into his work with full sympathy and labored by his side in all good endeavors. They had no children of their own, but took into their home his nephew, William Richardson Davie, whom he planned to train for the ministry and to be his successor at the Waxhaw Meeting House.

The churches in Chester, York, and Pacolet Church and Fairforest, are said to have been founded by him. His tombstone in the Waxhaw grave-yard has these words, "He lived to purpose; he preached with fidelity; he prayed for his people; and being dead speaks. Born at Egremont, England; died July 20th, 1771."

After the death of Rev. Richardson, Nancy married George Dunlap and they became the parents of five children.

Rachel Dunlap married John Neely in 1806, son of William and Eliza Gaston Neely of Fishing Creek. Their children were:

Rachel died in 1874, in Drew Co., Arkansas.



CAPTAIN WILLIAM H. EDWARDS' RECORDS

Many thanks to Mrs. J. G. Stevens, Box 4674, Pinopolis, S. C. 29469 for sharing the following article with us.

Records taken from Mr. A. S. Salley's office, State House, Columbia, S. C.:

"Payment to Mr. Edward McFadden during the Revolutionary War. No. 301, issued the 16th day of October, 1784 to Mr. Edward McFadden for ten pounds, five shillings and four pence farthing sterling for 52 days militia duty in 1781 and 1782 as per account audited principal. Llo 5.4-1/4 annual interest."

(Capt. W. H. Edwards was a direct descendant of Mr. Edward McFadden.)

Copy of Miss Margaret McFadden's trousseau for her wedding to William Henry Edwards, bought from Wylie & Moffatt's store at Lewisville, S. C. on Oct. 6, 1856. This receipted bill for her trousseau is in the handwriting of the late Captain W. Lyle Roddey of Rock Hill, S. C., who was a clerk in this store at the time. Captain Roddey was the ancestor of the Rock Hill Roddeys.

In writing of the death of Mrs. Barbara Martin, sister of Mr. Joseph Nunnery, Capt. W. H. Edwards stated that at that time Oct. 8, 1912, she was 72 years of age, but gave no date of her birth or death. Apparently she was around 72 years old when she died.

Mrs. Jane Y. McCosh, daughter of Dr. Samuel E. McFadden and Elizabeth Culp McFadden, born Oct. 5, 1833, married R. M. McCosh Oct. 28, 1856, died June 30, 1915 (twin sister of Margaret McFadden who married W. H. Edwards).

Mrs. Della McCosh, daughter of R. M. and Mrs. Jane Y. McCosh, born May 18, 1860, married N. P. Alexander in 1884 (N. P. Alexander died June 29, 1899) died May 30, 1907. She had seven children - all dead now (1957) except Kathleen, Harold and Chester Alexander.

Edgar Alexander, son of N. P. and Adella McCosh Alexander died June 16, 1924, aged 38 years, survived by his widow, Margaret Roddey Alexander, and three children: Mary Janet, Roddey and Edgar, Jr.

Luther Holden Alexander, son of N. P. and Adella McCosh Alexander, born June 11, 1890, died June 3, 1910.

Louise McFadden, daughter of John C. and Louisa Waters McFadden, and wife of J. H. Means Beaty, died Feb. 22, 1926 of a stroke of appoplexy, aged 49 years.

W. T. Ferguson, husband of Nannie McFadden (daughter of Dr. Samuel E. and Elizabeth Culp McFadden) died at Corsicana, Texas, at the age of 64 years (no date given in the notice), born near Landsford in Chester County, S. C. (no date given); had lived in Texas 20 years.

Mrs. Nannie McFadden Ferguson, widow of W. T. Ferguson and daughter of Dr. Samuel E. McFadden and Elizabeth Culp McFadden, died in Corsicana, Texas, Jan. 13, 1924 in her 80th year. The family moved to Texas in 1894. She was survived by the following children: Mrs. May Alford, Herbert, Clarence, Ernest, Arthur and Joseph and eleven grandchildren.

Frederick Alston Nunnery, son of Joseph and Dorothy McFadden Nunnery, born April 15, 1859, died July 25, 1932, married Miss Nannie Thomas, who died in 1930. Mr. Nunnery was survived by the following children: Mrs. W. E. Boney of Blythewood, S. C., Mrs. Hugh Murray of Monroe, N. C., Mrs. Seivern Nottingham, Frankton, Va., Mr. Mel A., Henry Grady and Benjamin.

Charles Grady Crook, son of W. Pleasant and Minnie Ford Crook, died Dec. 23, 1933, survived by his mother, three sisters: Miss Elizabeth Crook of Charlotte, N. C., Mrs. C. M. Sibley of Rock Hill, S. C., and Mrs. A. C. Dawson of Columbia, S. C., and by five brothers: Robert L., George F., H. P., W. Kenneth and B. T. Mr. Crook was buried in the graveyard of Harmony Baptist Church in Chester County, S. C.

A. O. Pittman, one of the charter members of Harmony Baptist Church, born February 1844, died Nov. 2, 1916.

S. E. Killian, born June 1, 1852, died July 1, 1928, married first Miss Julia Cherry and second to Miss Margaret Hyatt. By his first wife he had the following children: Ev., Eston, Essie and Julia; and by his second wife he had the following children: Reba, Clara, Martha, Laura, Ernest, Isaac and Banks.

Rev. L. C. Hinton died Nov. 11, 1905.

Mrs. John Sullivan (Janie Neely) died March 20, 1899; she was married during the holidays of 1898.

Mrs. Olivia Edwards Pittman, wife of John C. Pittman, died May 31, 1891 of cancer of the head, aged 48 years. Funeral conducted by Rev. L. C. Hinton and A. McA. Pittman, buried in Harmony graveyard.

Major John Kennedy, grandfather of Mrs. Eugenia Babcock, and founder of the Baptist Church in Chester, S. C. in 1830. He was born Feb. 12, 1770 - died April 7, 1867; fought in the Mexican War.

Mrs. Mary Ann Elizabeth Williams, widow of Grandison Williams and mother of Mrs. C. C. Edwards, born October 4, 1839, died Nov. 19, 1928. She first married a Pratt and Mrs. Edwards' maiden name was Eliza Pratt.

Captain William Henry Edwards was born January 30, 1833, married Margaret McFadden, daughter of Dr. Samuel E. and Elizabeth Culp McFadden, who was born October 5, 1833. They were married on October 28, 1856. Capt. Edwards died Aug. 8, 1920 and his wife died on May 12, 1920. They had eleven dhildren, eight boys and three girls, as follows: Charles Claude, Reid McCosh, William Henry, Frances Clementine, Samuel McFadden, Joseph Edwin, John Culp, George Ernest, Robert Lee, Mary Elizabeth and Margaret Jane. (June 27, 1957. All of the above children have now passed away except John Culp, Robert Lee and Margaret Jane.)

John C. McFadden, only son of Dr. Samuel E. McFadden and Elizabeth Culp McFadden, born in 1841, died June 27, 1912. His mother, Elizabeth Culp McFadden died in 1853 and his father, Dr. Samuel E. McFadden, died in 1856. He married Miss Margaret Louise Waters a few years after the war. They had the following children: Samuel E. McFadden, Mrs. D. N. McLauchlin (Fannie), Mrs. John G. White (Bessie), and Mrs. J. H. Means Beaty (Louise). (In 1957 all of these children have passed away except Mrs. John G. White.)

On Feb. 23, 1933 Mr. C. C. Edwards was made a life deacon of the First Baptist Church in Chester, S. C., after having served as deacon for 35 years. He was the son of Captain W. H. and Margaret McFadden Edwards.

J. S. H. Faris, son of Mr. Newton and Cynthia Choate Faris in the India Hook Section of York County, S. C., born Feb. 9, 1876, married Miss Eula Setzer - died in April of 1928 of pneumonia; survived by his wife, four sons and four daughters: James T., Newton S., Paul A., and John L., Mrs. T. E. Poole of Gastonia, N. C., and Misses Margaret, Dorothy and Cynthia Faris; two brothers: Paul D. and Thomas W., two sisters: Mrs. Norman Black and Miss Bessie Faris. (1957 - Miss Bessie Faris has passed away.)

John E. Nunnery, son of Joseph and Dorothy McFadden Nunnery, born April 3, 1877 - died March 30, 1949. He was Superintendent of Education for Chester County a number of years prior to his death.

Mildred Edwards, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. J. E. Edwards, married Beverly Whitmire, December 10, 1930 and were the first aerial honeymooners in Greenville's history. (First plane linking North with South. They were guests of the airline. Twenty-five years later, they were invited to a celebration and were presented with an engraved silver bowl.)

Mrs. Eliza J. Roberts, mother of Mr. G. Marvin Roberts, died at her home in Marion, S. C. April 5, 1924, aged 71 years, survived by two daughters and four sons: Mrs. Eastman Flowers of Rains, S. C., Miss Cora Roberts, G. M. Roberts, M. E. Roberts, F. H. Roberts and E. R. Roberts of Marion, S. C. G. Marvin Roberts was drowned Sept. 7, 1932 near Whitestone, Va.

John R. Roberts was drowned at Myrtle Beach June 8, 1936, and was probably a nephew of G. Marvin Roberts.

G. Marvin Roberts was one of the best friends of Mary Elizabeth Edwards when she lived in Columbia.

This Bible was published by H. S. Goodspeed & Co. in 1869. It has the Apocrypha, a Concordance and the Psalms in Metre. All family page entries are in the same hand writing, in the same ink and apparently at the same time, so that none were made until long after the fact. The latest entry was Lula Darby's birth. I believe this Bible was her property. A. Darby and Laura Hunter Darby had three daughters: Lula, Mattie Pressly (is Pressley her middle name or her married name?) and Emma. (Henry A. Hunter was from Huntersville, N. C.) It is believed that there are no living descendants of this particular Darby family.

---- Cherry Family

Chauncey Lafeyette Cherry, a native of Chester County, was the son of Gregg and Mary C. Cherry.

The home where Cherry was born is just over the line in York County; his grandfather, Gregg Cherry's home, was located between Landsford and El Bethel Church. Gregg Cherry died leaving a widow. After his death, she willed the farm, (174½ acres), to Lafayette Cherry, the father of R. Gregg Cherry, former Governor of N. C. Lafayette sold it to J. T. J. McFadden.

Governor Cherry's father and mother, grandfather and grandmother are buried at El Bethel Methodist Church. His great-grandfather and great-grandmother, Robert and Letty Cherry, are buried in Union A.R.P. Cemetery at Richburg.

Robert Cherry died in 1798 and was among the first to be buried in historic Union Cemetery. He was among the earlier settlers of Chester County.

Governor Cherry was born on Oct. 17, 1891, and his mother, Hariette Davis, of Gaston County, died in 1894, leaving her son while still an infant. Governor Cherry went to Gaston County to live with his mother's people. His grandparents were Isaac Newton Davis and Amanda Wilson Davis. Harriett was visiting her sister in eastern Chester County when she met Lafayette Cherry. Her sister married H. M. Lineberger.

Lafayette Cherry was a Confederate soldier, his father Gregory Cherry, was a soldier of 1812. He was a musician and was with Captain William Chestnut's Company, First Reg., S. C. Militia, commanded by Lt. Col. Hugh Means. He joined Oct. 1, 1814, and was discharged March 7, 1815, in Charleston.

Lafayette Cherry had several brothers and sisters: Martha married a Porter; Ruth married T. W. Roddey; Nancy married Abram Ferguson; Sarah married a Killian. Brothers were: William J.; Elijah H.; Robert P.; and George P.

Robert Cherry, who died in 1798, mentions the following sons and daughters: George, John, Sarah, William, Jennet, Jamison, and Gregg. His first wife was Mary Riley and his second wife was Lettice Leach.

The Cherry family line goes back to the Duke of Orleans, Normandy, France. They also trace their ancestry to Rev. Peter Kolb of Mannheim, Germany, who served on the Palatinate, the Emperor's representatives.

The McCrorey Family

The McCrorey Family of Fairfield had as its progenitor in Scotland, Allen MacRaurie, who married into the Clan Ronald McDonald, and became chief, and taking the part of "Bonnie Prince Charlie" after the battle of Culloden fled to North Ireland County Antrim, and from there members of the McCrorey, Turner, Adger and Law families came to Fairfield.

William McCrorey (1745-1838) was the first of his name in Fairfield. He came there in 1790, having previously married in Ireland, Margaret Adger (1747-1805). They brought three minor children with them, John who married Molly Peggy Turner; James, who married Jane Crawford; and Susan, who married William Adger.

John McCrorey (1773-1849) by his wife (Molly Peggy Turner) had seven children: James A. (1802-1893), who married Sarah Lundy Thorne; Thomas, who married a Miss Peydon; Martha Miller, who married Dr. William Thorne; Susan Miller married Daniel McCullough; Betty Miller married Mr. Matthews; Agness Miller married John Richmond; Margaret Miller married James Adger.

The foregoing reared families, who are mostly buried at Mt. Olivet Presbyterian church.

James McCrorey, who married Jane Crawford, had two sons, James, who married Lucretia Mobley, and John, who married Dorcas Mobley. Both had large families.

Susan McCrorey, who married William Adger, had a number of children, some lived in Fairfield, some in Charleston. The Smyth family of Charleston are descendants.

James A. McCrorey (son of John and Molly Peggy Turner McCrorey), who married Sarah Lundy Thorne, and lived to be nearly 92 years of age, was one of the most highly respected men of his day.

In the Confederate war James A. McCrorey had three sons to serve: James Law, William Turner, and John. James Law McCrorey was imprisoned at Fort Delaware, New Jersey, where he died. He kept a diary which has been deposited in the library of the University of South Carolina. It is a classic, and gives an intimate picture of prison life.

He left a widow, Mrs. Mary Adger McCrorey, and four children: Mary E. (Mrs. James Ragsdale), Adger, John Turner, and William Adger McCrorey.

William McCrorey was one of the bodyguards who conducted President Jefferson Davis as far as Charlotte, N. C.

The other children of James A. and Sarah Lundy Thorne McCrorey were Sarah, who married Capt. James Beaty, of Winnsboro, and William Turner McCrorey (1834-1906) who married Miss Mattie Hawthorne. They had nine children: Minnie E. who married Mose H. Mobley; Emma A., second wife of Mose H. Mobley; Nannie Lee married Pickett McCullough; Sarah married Edward D. Mobley; Martha married Thomas Woodward Starnes; James Law married Maude Edwards; Lou married J. P. Keller; Sue married T. T. Farr; and Hawthorne married Eulalie Ragsdale.

The following is a quote from this letter:

"I knew nothing of the Old Edmonds Church till within the last thirty years. Riding about that time in company with the Rev. A. A. James about the northern line of Chester County, he pointed to an old building and said that is Old Edmonds. That community has gone through various changes since that day. Now Zion, a flourishing Presbyterian Church, stands about two miles east of it. Olivet, another good congregation, stands two to three miles north of Old Edmonds. Olivet was where Dr. Rose, pastor of Sharon, had preached several years. Finally, the Independants supplied the place and Olivet came into our connection in our union with the Independants, now united with Zion as a pastoral charge. Last year a church was organized in the vicinity of Cabean's stand in the southern section of the Bullock's Creek congregation.

Mr. Ratchford, the only Independant minister remaining in our bounds now, supplies that new church (Mt. Pleasant) in connection with Harmony, Mt. Carmel, and Ramah, a new church near Kings Mountain."

"Well, your cousin Rebecca and I are still fast anchored here, but know not what freak may loose our moorings. But I feel some interest in a plot of ground just north of old Fishing Creek Church pretty well covered over with reminiscences of the departed. No Presbyterian minister has yet been laid away in that sacred acre though the congregation has been blessed with the stated ministrations of the Gospel since 1773. Its ministers departed and have been buried in other cemeteries."
