THE ARCHERS OF CHESTER COUNTY, S. C. By Doris M. Helander

There were two Archer families who came to live in Chester District, South Carolina, in the 1700's. The heads of these families were Alexander Archer and William Archer. Possibly they were brothers. Both men are listed with members of their families in the book PROTESTANT IMMIGRANTS TO SOUTH CAROLINA, 1763-1773 by Janie Revill.

In the foreword of Revill's book, she states that the immigrants listed in her book were Protestant refugees from Europe who came to South Carolina on the encouragement of an Act passed by the General Assembly of the Colony on July 25, 1761, called the Bounty Act. She also states that there had been a broadening of earlier immigration laws for the special benefit of these religious refugees.

William Archer, along with his wife Isobella, his son Robert, and his daughters Ann, Mary, and Rose are included in the list of refugees presenting petitions for Warrants of Survey on the Bounty

Act. The ages of the family members are not given but we learn that William Archer (spelled Archier in the book) was entitled to 350 acres and Robert Archer 100 acres which indicates that Robert was old enough to be granted land. The date of these petitions is given as 28 May, 1767.

On 23 February, 1768, Alexander Archer presented a petition for 350 acres, and on page 109 of Revill's book Alexander and his family are listed among a group of people newly arrived from Ireland on the snow (sailing vessel) Gregg. Alexander's age was 27, his wife Jane 25, Susannah age 6, Ann age 4, and William age 2.

In Volume 13, page 69, of Colonial Plat Land Surveys, we find that William Archer's 350 acres were on the waters of Rocky Creek, Craven County (later Chester). The date was 17 July, 1767. On the same page we see that Robert Archer's 100 acres were located in the north fork of Rocky Creek, Craven County. The date of survey was 31 August, 1767. Also on the same page is the name, Alexander Archer, whose 350 acres were in the fork of Edisto River, July, 1768.

During the decade 1760 to 1770 one hundred and ninety-four ships were advertised to leave north Irish ports with emigrants to America, the peak years being 1766 and 1767. Over ninety percent of them sailed to either Philadelphia or New York. South Carolina or Georgia was the destination of twenty-three vessels which sailed during this decade on other than normal trading voyages, thanks to the renewal of the bounty system which had attracted immigrants to South Carolina in the 1730's.

Apparently the Archer families arrived in South Carolina during the peak years of emigration from Ireland. It is believed they came from County Antrim. Previous to residing in Ireland, it is possible that Archer families, like other Scotch-Irish people, made their home in Scotland.

There are some Archer descendants who believe that the Chester County Archers resided first in Chester County, Pennsylvania, but no proof exists. Besides, records of these Pennsylvania Archers indicate they were of Swedish descent.

In the 1790 Census, William Archer is listed in Chester County, S. C., with two males age 16 and up, one male under 16 and one female. His son Robert Archer had two males 16 and up, one male under 16 and five females.

William Archer's will, dated 19 October 1794 and acknowledged in open court 26 January 1795, mentions his wife Isabel, his grandson William (son to Robert Archer), his son Robert, Buckner Hagood and William Peden and John Peden (Buckner was a son-in-law and one of the Pedens was a son-in-law). Witnesses to the will were John Orr, Andrew Smith, David Stormont.

The identity of William Archer's wife Isabel has not been established. Some believe she was a Peden but no records have been found to support this belief.

The children of William and Isabel Archer, as stated before, were Robert, Ann, Mary, and Rose. Robert was married in 1775 to Mary Steele, daughter of Thomas and Catherine Steele of Chester County. Their children were: Thomas, b. 1777, m. Mary McCalla; William b. 1779, m. Anna Peters; Mary, b. 1782, m. Vincent Woods; Isabella, b. 1784, m. George Taylor; Catherine, b. 1786, m. Purnel Fisher; Margaret, b. 1790, m. John McMillan; Nancy Agnes, b. 1793, m. Robert Milburn; Rosa, b. 1795, m. James W. Hogue.

Robert served in the Revolutionary War as a private in Capt. John Steele's Co. of Mounted Rangers, S. C. One source states that he was crippled, whether from a war injury or not is not known. He died in Princeton, Ind., in 1818.

Mary, Robert Archer's sister, married Hugh Boyd, also of Chester County, in 1762. Hugh, a Revolutionary soldier, lost his life during the war. From Archer records in Princeton, Indiana, we find the following: "Mary Archer Boyd walked from her home in Chester District, South Carolina to Charleston (one source said she accompanied Mrs. Jackson, mother of President Andrew Jackson, and Mrs. George Dunlap on their trip to Charleston to nurse the boys ill with the plague). Mary Boyd's husband was ill on a prison ship in the harbor. He was taken north for exchange, Mary going with him, but he died and was buried at sea in 1782."

Mary Archer Boyd remained in Chester District, S. C., until 1811 when she moved to Princeton, Ind., with her daughter Nancy, widow of David Stormont.

Rose Archer, also known as Roseanna, daughter of William and Isabel Archer, was married to Buckner Hagood (whose name was sometimes spelled Haigwood or Haygood) of Chester County, S. C. Children of this union, all but one of whom were born in Chester County, were as follows: Elija, b. 1771, m. Peggy McFarland, Molly, b. 1773, m. James Kenedy Allen, William Garrison, b. 1776, m. Sally Garvin, Nancy, b. ca. 1780, m. Andrew McFarland, Rosie, b. ca. 1782, m. William Peden, Buckner, b. ca. 1784, m. Eleanor Pedan, Robert, b. ca. 1787, m. Harriet Payne, Elisha, b. 1809, m. Rebecca Halsell.

The remaining child of William and Isabel Archer was Ann. It is believed that she married a Peden but which one? Both William Peden and John Peden are mentioned in her father's will along with Buckner Hagood who was a son-in-law so it must be presumed that William or John was the husband of Ann. It's likely that William Peden was Ann's husband since he was an executor of the will that was proved in January Court, 1795.

The other Archer family which arrived in Chester District from Ireland in the 1700's, headed by Alexander Archer (believed to be the younger brother of William Archer), apparently increased from a family of three children (immigrants) to a family of seven or eight. According to Alexander's will, dated 19 Nov. 1822, there were two daughters by the name of Susannah. One married a McKee and died before her father's will was made and the other had not yet reached the age of eighteen. Also, there were possibly two sons by the name of Jonathon. One was deceased at the time of his father's will and the other one received certain bequests. It's possible the second Jonathon was a grandson.

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A SKETCH OF THE ORGANIZATION AND REORGANIZATION OF CAPT. STRAIT'S COMPANY FOR THE CIVAL WAR BETWEEN THE STATES.

On the twentieth of December 1860 the State of South Carolina seceeded from the Union of the U.S. and Governor Pickens immediately called for Volunteers for States service. The men and boys of Rock Hill, cross-roads and vicinity, which is now Richburg met almost every Saturday, and some volunteered every time that we met, with G.L. Strait as leader of the volunteer movement, until we had the required number of men for a company. We then organized the Company, G.L. Strait was elected Captain, Cad Rivers first Leiutenant, C.W. McFadden, 2nd Leiutenant, W.T.D. Cousar 3rd Leiutenant, J. Westly Thomas 1st. Sergeant, J.C. McFadden 2nd. Sergt. J.S. Drennan 3rd. Sergt. I.N. Whiteside 4th. Sergt. W.N. Gaston 5th Sergt. W.F. Knox lst. Corporal John H. Gaston, 2nd. I.J. Thomas 3rd. E.D. McFadden 4th. W.H. Bradley color corporal. the Company was made by Miss Baskins and presented to the Company one Saturday by the Rev Laughlin McDonald, before we were ordered to Charleston on Aprile, 11, 1861. Leiutenant Rivers was appointed and transferred to Colonel Rions staff and John A. Millen was elected first Leiut. in his stead. In the format of the 6th. Regiment, Straits Company was designated, Co. B. and remained that letter until the term of service expired which was twelve months. On the 11th. of April 1861, we were ordered to Charleston with four other Companies from Chester County. We got to Charleston about 9pm. and were Quartered in an old vacant Hotel for the night as we thought, but at two-oclock the battery from Charleston and Sullivans Island opened fire on Fort Sumpter. Fort Sumpter replying hotly, we were ordered to get up and form the Company. We then marched over the city the rest of the night and all the next day until late in the evening, when we were given Springfield muskets and placed on a steam boat and sent to Mt. Pleasant Island. remained there that night and next day, and had target practice the next night were marched to Sullivans Islands and quartered in the old Moultrie Hotel, which was later burned down by shells from Ft. Sumpter. We remained there and drilled on the beach and drilled every day for a week and sent to Coles Island remained there and drilled about three weeks, from there we were brought to Summerville 21 miles up the Columbia and Charleston R.R. and remained there till some time in July and drilled and done guard duty and while there was mustered from State service to Confederate service and were then sent to Va. We reached the battle of Bull Run just as the battle was decided by the Federal troops retreating towards Washington. The first place that we pitched tents was named Camp Pettus. We remained there and drilled and did guard duty only a We were then taken to Germantown, where we drilled and did guard duty some time, while there the men were nearly all sick principally with measels, and many of them died in an old church used as a hospital. From there we moved to Centreville and remained there nearly till the spring of the year, 1862. 20th. of December our Regiment was sent with the wagon train as a guard up in the Mts. for forage, and at a little place called Brainsville we were fired upon by our own troops by mistake killing and wounding some in nearly every Co. of the Reg. Co. B. lost (1) killed, and (8) slightly wounded. While at Centreville (Spring of 1862) the 12 months service being about out, Pres. Davis called for Volunteers for a period of three years, or during the war long or short with the promise of a thirty day furlough right away to as many as could be spared at the time that would reenlist. Our Company commenced to reenlist and a dozen or so got their furlough,

when they came back another bunch got theirs, but only 20 days and that was the last for some time before we got reorganized, we were ordered back towards Richmond and halted some days at Orange Court There we perfected our reorganization for three years or during the war-by electing Capt. Strait as Captain again, C.W. McFadden 1st. Leiut. W.T.D. Cousar 2nd. Leiut. J.C. McFadden 3rd. Leiut. Sergts. were I.N. Whiteside, J.S. Drennan, W.E. Lewis, W.N. Gaston, J.C. Ferguson Corporals, W.A. Fudge 1st. and I forgot the balance of them. In the formation of the 6th. Reg. this time Capt. Strait being the Senior Capt. our Co. was designated Co. A. and so remained to the end of the war. Capt. Strait was later appointed assistant Surgeon of the Palmetto Sharpshooters (17th) Regiment of our Brigade, but still was in command of the Co. at Seven Pines Battle, Seven Days Battle (June 25-July 21, 1862) around Richmond, from Gainsville (June 27) on to Malvern Hill (July 1) also at 2nd. Battle Manassas (Aug. 27-30), there he was shot in the wrist, got a furlough and went to Chester, took sick and died there without reaching his father's home, which was only 16 miles distant. This narrative of the Co. is written from memory by a member from the first day until the last.

If it is worth anything to the Lafayette Strait Chapter U.D.C. I furnish it with pleasure.

Of 72 members that went to Charleston the 11th. of April 1861 there are living now viz L.H. Dye, Joseph Martin and W.A. Fudge. The Co. had all told at one time and another during the war 160 men and there is now 17 living.

It becomes my pleasant duty, as Captain of the Catawba Guard, to receive, at your hands, this most elegant and appropriate token, of the sympathy and confidence of noble women.

Be assured that we do most highly appreciate and cherish the flattering compliment, thus paid us, by your sex, and may the measure of our esteem and love for the donors be found in the zealous and determined manner, with which we will defend and protect the gift.

The sympathy of woman, under any circumstance, gives additional impetus to the action of man, but in no condition of life does it tend to arouse and stimulate him so much as when he is called to defend the hearth-stone of his mother, his sisters, and all the loved one's at home.

The sight of that "Banner", will remind us that we fight not for empty fame, that we fight not to secure or reinstate a prince or potentate to his throne, that we fight not that the historian might call us warriors, great and renowned, but that we fight for "Our Homes", our sweet, sweet homes.

When we behold that Palmetto, the emblem of our beloved state, we will remember that under its shade we were born, reared and protected, and like that rattlesnake, we say to the foes of our Carolina, don't tread on her, to her we swear our allegiance and for her honor and prosperity, are we ready to sacrifice our all, aye, are we ready to "do or die".

There we see the Crescent, emblematic of the growth and increase of our county, in everything which characterizes her people, and may the measure of our courage, in the defence of her sacred rights, be like unto a full grown moon.

When we contemplate that portion of sea, we shall remember Moultrie and her gallant defenders - Yes, we will remember the gallant Jasper, as he rescues the handi-work of your noble predecessors, from the beach and restores it, his idol flag, to the battlement, amid a hail-storm of shot from Britannias ships.

The portions of swamplands, there represented, will recall like a chain to our minds, the bravest of the brave, Marion, Sumpter, Lee and their partisan followers, who fought, bled and endured all the hardships incident to stern war, that the triumph of liberty might be the triumph of freemen, battling in a just cause.

Those mountains and hillocks, naturally bring to our mind's eye Eutaw, Kings Mountain, Camden, Cowpen's, Hobkirk's Hill, and many other places, the remembrance of which, is a source of pride to every Carolinian.

We there mentally, behold the immortal Baron DeKalb, as he lies bleeding, in a foreign land, in liberties cause - there we see the brave, good and noble Green, as he beats back the enemy at Eutaw, the brillant and daring Morgan, as he charges and routes the British columns at the Cowpen's, and many others, to whose fame orators, historians and sages alike, love to do homeage.

When we turn to the reverse side, to gaze upon that lovely home scene, there is not a single heart in this noble band that will not leap with joy, as it brings to his mind the far-famed Catawba, "the land of the free and the home of the brave" - near by that scene lie some of the most memorable events in the history of the Palmetto State. Beyond we mentally behold the Hanging Rock, where the chivalrous Capt. McClure led forward the progenitors of many sons and daughters of Chester whom it is our pleasure to greet today, many of whose comrades, in common with that heroic spirit, died there as patriots, breathing forth prayers to God, in behalf of the cause of the just.

With so many endearing associations, clustering around about this stand of colors, we of the Catawba land, solemnly vow, by all that it sacred, that our lives and our sacred honors are pledged in its defence.

Then be assured that so long as a single arm of the Catawba's shall retain its vitality, so long as that arm shall maintain its muscular activity, just so long will this flag float, honored and adored, to the breeze, and when its hallowed folds shall kiss the dust, to rise no more, the spectators, who witnesses the scene, may publish to the world, in truth and in justice, that the land of the Catawba Guard is cold in the embrace of death.

Be assured farther, that it shall not only be our high aim to carry this flag, as becomes patriots and brave men, but, prompted by the strong and sacred ties of friendship, love and gratitudes, it will be our highest aim to remember you, who have thus, so kindly bestowed your confidence and esteem and -

"Long, Long be our hearts with such memories filled! Like the vase in which roses have once been distilled, You may break, you may ruin the vase, if you will, But the scent of the roses will hang around it still."

Lt. Cousar - into your hands do we place this flag to you shall we look for its safe keeping - Immulate the brave Seargent Jasper, at the seige of Moultrie, and if needs be, share his fate at the battle of Savannah. Capt. G. Lafayette Strait, M.D.

The flag for the Catawba Guards was made by Miss Elizabeth Wells Baskin (fiancee of Dr. Strait). Dr. Laughlin McDonald, minister of Union A.R.P. Church presented the flag to the company before they left for Charleston on April 11, 1861. Dr. Gilbert M. Lafayette Strait was a son of Jacob Fox and Isabella Wylie Strait. He was born Sept. 30, 1834, and as a young man studied medicine under Dr. Aylette in New York where he received his degree. He distained the exemption granted to his profession and at the beginning of the War Between the States, he went forth as Captain of the Catawba Guards, Co. A, 6th Regiment, S.C.V. health in the winter of 1862 forced him to resign his commission as Captain and accept the job of Assistant Surgeon of the 17th Regiment. It was while serving in this position that he took dysentery and came home where he died two weeks later at the home of his uncle, Dr. A. P. Wylie in Chester, S. C. on October 18, 1863 and is buried in Chester.

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UNION WOMAN RECALLS WAR

(Taken from the Charlotte Observer, 1933)

In the year 1840 - the same year that Queen Victoria married Prince Albert and the German Kaiser's father became King of Prussia - there was born to Mr. and Mrs. Jeremiah Cureton, in their farm house on the banks of Waxhaw Creek, a girl, whom they named Anna.

Four-score years earlier the grandfather of Anna Cureton rented one of his Union County farms to a family named McKaymie, and on this farm Andrew Jackson was born.

Long has Andrew Jackson been dead, and long has his birthplace been disputed, but Anna Cureton, who in 1868, became Anna Stevens, still lives, and at the age of 93, is as active, mentally and physically, as a healthy woman of 60. With Anna Stevens still lives the stories which her father and grandfather told her of the Jacksons:

"Mrs. Jackson had been riding all day, she was on her way to visit her sister, Mrs. Crawford, who also lived in Union County. They stopped near night-fall at the McKaymie place to rest. Feeling ill, she was persuaded by Mrs. McKaymie to spend the night, and during the night Andrew was born. A few days later, Mrs. Jackson continued her journey to the Crawford place. On this place, with Mrs. Jackson's sister, Andrew was reared."

"When his father died, many years later, the snow was so deep that no ladies could attend the funeral. The men had to put the casket on a sleigh. When the cortege went from the creek up the hill, the coffin slipped off the sleigh. All the men had to take a dram or two to keep from freezing, and they did not miss the corpse until they arrived at the Waxhaw church. They had to return and search for it, locating it four miles from the church."

"Andrew Jackson's father is buried at the Waxhaw Presbyterian Church, Lancaster County, S. C., on the McKaymie lot."

"As a young lady, I attended Limestone College, having earlier gone to school with Martha Walkup, the mother of Henry Belk. When the war broke out, I returned home. All the men in the family went

off to war, and though I was only 21 years old, I had to run the three plantations. I almost lived on horseback. Dr. John Newton Nesbit used to call at the cabins of our slaves and treat them. He would frequently take me along and he taught me a great deal about medicine. The slaves always called me 'Doctor'."

"At Gettysburg, the 'Waxhaw-Jackson Greys,' officially called Co. E, 24th N. C. Regiment, went into battle 107 strong. After the battle only seven men remained. My brother, Captain T. J. Cureton, was wounded and carried a bullet in his leg until his death, 50 years later."

"I presented the flag to the 'Waxhaw-Jackson Greys' at Wilson's Store, N. C. on the 4th of July 1861. The next day I rode to Charlotte and visited my uncle, W. J. Cureton. While there a troop from Raleigh heard of my visit and came to see me. They all sang Dixie for me and it was the first time I had ever heard the

piece played or sung."

"In 1868, I married James H. W. Stevens, who had been a member of Captain John D. Wiley's Company, 'the Lancaster Greys', and later he joined the cavalry. He was riding beside Preston Hampton and General Wade Hampton when Preston was mortally wounded. General Hampton stopped, and with my husband, picked up the dead body of his son. With tears streaming down his face, he said to my husband, 'Such are the fruits of war', and ordering that his son's body be taken to the rear, the old general remounted his horse and rode on, with my husband into the thick of the battle."

"My husband returned at the close of the war, unharmed. We raised nine children, I'm nearly 94 years old but still take care of all my business, look after my farms, and my home in Union County, attend church each Sunday, and thank God for the wonderful life He has given me."

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EULOGIES BY REV. JOHN B. SWANN

The following are excerpts of eulogies preached by Rev. Swann who pastored Bullocks Creek, Mt. Pleasant, and Olivet Presbyterian Churches from 1892 until December 31, 1919. These excerpts are submitted by Rev. Jerry L. West of Bullocks Creek who has the original eulogies in his personal files.

WILLIAM A. ROBINSON

January 19, 1906

"Our brother had many dark days. He buried two bosom compan-Several times, since I have known him, God brought him to the open grave of those who were near and dear to him. These were dark days to him. A little over two years ago the hand of affliction was heavy upon him. Death robbed him of the strength of his old age, of his youngest son. This was the breaking up of business with him. It necessitated his leaving his old home where he expected to die. He remarked to me, after moving to Sharon, "I can never be satisfied here, but I have not long to stay in this world". I do not know wheter he praised God for this affliction or not; he did not complain. But he is praising God for it now ... Expect to meet your father in glory. Not as an old decrepit man but in all the agility of youthful vigor. ... God has given him to you for many long years; yes, until gray hairs are beginning to admonish you of the approach of old age. We sympathize with you in your affliction and commit you to the tender mercies of Him who

inflicted the stroke."

(Mr. Robinson was born May 26, 1827 and died January 18, 1906. He is buried in the Bullocks Creek Cemetery between his two wives: JULIA ANN C., who was born October 8, 1822; died February 23, 1877 and SARAH ELIZABETH, who was born January 13, 1829 and died October 23, 1895. Nearby is the grave of his daughter, JULIA E. J. ROBINSON, who died March 4, 1876; age 3 years, 11 months and 26 days. The son mentioned in the eulogy must have been A. G. L. ROBINSON who died September 26, 1903; he also is buried at Bullocks Creek.)

JOHN "JACKIE" D. SMARR

April 29, 1897

"...Thus time takes the color out of the cheek. It wrinkles the brow, bends the once manly form and gradually the person fades and dies. How true is this of him whose death had called us together this morning. He has gone through all the various stages of life. Once he was a smiling infant on his mother's lap. In a few years he was a romping lad. In a few more years he was a buoyant youth. In a few more years he entered young manhood full of life and hope; sharing the usual joys and pleasures with is young companions. In a few more years he became a mature man, cumbered with the cares of life. Once in his life he stood by the side of her who was to be sharer of his joys and burdens, and promised undying faithfulness to her. She has long since preceded him to enter into the possession of her eternal reward.

(MARGARET A. SMARR. Born June 22, 1826 died March 6, 1861)
Time after time as the messenger of death invaded the sacred
precincts of his family circle and robbed him of his loved ones,
until only two children were left. And still the pale faced
monster was not satisfied. It came again and with relentless power
tore from his fond embrace the star of the family, a lovely daughter. (ALICE JANE SMARR. Born January 27, 1860 and died June 9,
1883.)

In a few more years he himself began to walk with measured steps, his physical power began to fail and his youthful vitality was fast leaving him. Time was doing its gradual but sure work with him. Age crept over him until he became what we term, an old man. It was in this last stage of his life that I first knew him; he was known, when I came amongst you all, as "Uncle Jackie Smarr". Ever since I have known him he was on the gradual decline. He was fading away as a leaf. This fading process continued until just before sunset of April 27, 1897 when the silver cord was broken, the brittle thread of life was cut, and today we say of him, "He is dead".

Uncle Jackie had been a member of Bullocks Creek Church for a number of years and in talking to him on his death-bed where we two were alone, he expressed a firm and abiding faith in Jesus, as the Savior of his soul...altho he has followed one after another of his children to the grave, he has left one lone boy and several grand-children behind... Now, my brother, let me remind you that altho your heart is sore this morning because God has taken from you the strong arm of counsel on which you leaned, He has given him to you a long while... While you commit the mortal remains of your father to this last resting place, the grave, you can think of him as being with his other children and with her who gave you birth... Can you not, my brother, when you return home, take your father's Bible and write, "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints?"

(JOHN D. SMARR was born January 27, 1818 and died April 27,

1897. Near his and his wife's graves are the graves of other of their children: "BUDDIE" SMARR died December 22, 1855; 9 months and 10 days old. "BUDDIE LOVE" SMARR, aged 1 year, 5 months and 12 days. JOHN EDWARD SMARR born July 10, 1851, died September 20, 1855 and JOSEPH EUGENE SMARR born March 1, 1858 and died September 15, 1860.

JAMES E. ROBINSON

January 28, 1902

"When these associations of the family are more than ordinarily tender, it makes the separation all the more cutting. Such was the case in the family of our departed brother. When a boy, he was a special favorite amongst the old people, so I learn. His association with his friends were ever endearing. Yet these qualities shone brighter in his own family than any where else. He was, so I learn, a very tender father and loving husband. This being the case, the separation is obliged to be hard. Yet there is one comfort in this: even tho it be nothing more than human. Your recollections of him, will always be that of pleasure. This should give you comfort."

(Mr. Robinson was born December 9, 1839 and died January 26, 1902. He married Martha Jane _____ who was born October 13, 1851 and died June 24, 1920. They are buried at Bullocks Creek Cemetery.)

EMMA HARDIN BURRIS

February 11, 1902

"Those who share in the joys and sorrows of each other; who live on the most intimate terms, who pour into each other's ears the tenderest expressions of their love, are things that are hard to give up. These sweet associations make the separation of husband and wife sharp and cutting.

But here, we have a double affliction. The first day of this month you buried a tender and loving daughter and an affectionate sister. (MARY M. BURRIS. Born November 23, 1887. Died January 30, 1902.) She was young and in the full vigor of youthful elasticity. Only a few days before her death, she had the promise of a long life. We do not know at whom death is aiming his cruel shafts until the work is done. She was cut down as a flower and her youthful bloom was faded forever from her cheeks. ...And now, just upon the heels of this, comes, if anything, a severer stroke.

It is true that our departed sister had passed beyond the period of youth. While we could not say of her, she was young, yet we could not say she was old. She was very few years beyond the prime of life and was in the midst of her usefulness. Yes, she was, and had been for a good many years, the bosom companion of him who is bereaved of her, and was the object of the instinctive affections of her children. This makes the separtion O, so hard. A wife's affections and a mother's love cannot be too highly appreciated. Then this affliction falls heavily, not only on the immediate family, but (also on) the one who gave her birth still survives and mourns for her only as a Mother can. Then there are those who look into the same face and call her mother.

Now to you, my sorrowing friends, I can assure you that this audience sympathizes with you. There are those present, my brother, who know how you feel today. They can enter more fully into sympathy with you than others, for they too, have buried their bosom companion. There are those here who have tenderest sympathy for these motherless children for they know what it is to lose a mother's love. This should be of some comfort for you. Then you

can think of the happy meeting of her and Mary on yesterday morning. This should be of some comfort for you."

(Mrs. Burris was born February 9, 1855 and died February 10, 1902. She married JOHN THOMAS BURRIS, who was born January 17, 1854 and died September 28, 1924. They are buried at the Olivet Presbyterian Cemetery in McConnells, York County, SC.)

JOHN L. MILLER

February 12, 1898

"...Death may come suddenly and we know that it is true. Often times it comes when we are least expecting it. Some years ago a man rode horse back several miles to church and during the exercise, his life went out. He was not expecting death at that time. He went to church professedly to meet with Jesus; but had no thought of seeing Him in all of His unvailed glory.

Such is the case with our departed brother. It is quite probable that when he fell into the unconscious embrace of sleep night before last that when he awoke to consciousness it would be in the eternal world. Uncle John Miller had been about here for nearly 85 years. Everyone knows him. He was noted for his genial temperment. The afternoon before he died he was at a neighbor's house and was the same jolly Uncle John Miller.

While his has been, comparatively speaking, a lonely and retired life, yet he has not lived solely for self. A more accommodating man can hardly be found in York County. But why talk of his traits of character, for I speak to those who know him a great deal better than I do.

He has seen many friends pass away and doubtless has often times thought of his own exit. Yet it is quite possible that the Son of Man came to him as a thief in the night when he was least expecting Him. His light of life went out suddenly. There was a flutter and then all was dark. Life is gone and gone forever. That life which had animated him for over four score years, went out, almost in the twinkling of an eye... Being prepared for His coming means every thing to the soul... It is brought home to our hearts by the sudden departure of our aged brother. I see those here today, the whitness of whose hair indicates that the time for them to depart is drawing near. So the admonition comes to you from that casket, "Be ye also ready."

(Mr. Miller's name is found on the 1861 Muster Roll; he served as a private in the Broad River Light Infantry.)

JOSEPH W. CARROLL

November 24, 1904

"...It is not our custom, as you all know, of eulogizing the dead; but surely I can be pardoned, in this case, if I refer to that part of his life which appeals, with pointed emphasis to the heart of every true Southern person. When the tocsin of war was sounded in our Southern land our brother was among the first to And his efforts toward a final victory ceased only when enlist. Lee surrendered at Appomattox. While he escaped death at the hand of the foe, he did not escape the missiles of death unhurt. On the battlefield in Virginia he spilt his blood, his flesh being pierced by the enemie's bullet; yes, he was wounded in defence of his home and the land he loved. To the veterans of the bloody war in the sixties, your ranks are thinning, only a few remain, and their hair is whitening for the tomb. This procession to the cemetery today leaves you one less. At the next roll call he will not answer to his name. His tongue is silent in death. Amidst the rattling of the musketry and the booming of the cannon, he was unflinching, for his heart was in the cause. While he came through four years of one of the bloodiest wars recorded in history he could not escape the fiat of high heaven. Yesterday, the pale faced monster grappled with him and he had to yield to his icey touch; his life went out and today, we say of him, "he is dead". All that his comrades in arms can do for him now is to lay his remains gently away in the cemetery and we are going to do this, are we not?

... For several years our brother had been on the decline of life, on the downward grade. Yes, fading as the leaf. This fading process continued until noon, November 23, 1904 when the silver cord was broken, the brittle thread of life was cut and now, we say of him: "he lived 70 and 1 years and he died".

Altho the leaf fades, dies and drops to the ground, it leaves its strength behind. While living, it was all the while absorbing the sunshine, air and moisture and passing it to the stem to which it was attached. Thus adding to the growth and strength of the tree. Thus it is with our departed brother, he has left six children and several grandchildren behind. So while he is dead, he still speaks through them.

Now to you, my sister. You are today a widow. You feel desolate, lonely and sad. No one on earth can take your consort's place in your heart. The deepest secrets of your inner self were too sacred to be committed to anyone, save him whom you called by the endearing name, Husband. No wonder you are sad. Yet you should remember that you have had him for (a) bosom companion for 34 years, nearly. God let him remain with you a long time and after he had grown old and feeble He took him away. My sister, God has the right to do this. He said, He would be the judge of the widow. And He means it.

To the children: You have never known till now, what (it) is to be without a father's love. You never had and never will have a truer friend. His heart was knit to you. I remember well his remark to me the day I performed the nuptial rite of his oldest child. He said, "I have been through the war and saw much hardships but I never shed a tear. This, today, is too much for me. It is hard to give up my daughter". Of course you will miss him. His chair will be vacant. You are, today, stripped of an earthly father. Yet, hear what God says to you: "I will be a father to the fatherless".

Now a word to the brothers: your ranks are thinning. There is one less today. Only a few remain behind. You can call to mind many a happy time you have spent together when boys. These things are in the past now. While you have been living in separate homes for a number of years, yet that tie of blood which bound you together is strong and it is hard to break the severing of it. Yet you must. God's will must be done. Even should it run counter to our wills. Then can't you say with God's ancient servant, "The Lord gave, and the Lord hath taken away, blessed be the name of the Lord". It is the Christian's duty to have his will absorbed in God's will.

(Mr. Carroll was born November 16, 1833 and died November 23, 1904. He was married to MARTHER INMAN who was born November 24, 1852 and died June 27, 1921. The both, with other members of their family, are buried at Bullocks Creek Presbyterian Cemetery.)

Miss Maggie Harris, at whose home I copied the Bible, said she thought that the MARY HALSELL who died in 1859, aged 79, was a sister of PETER HALSELL Sr. I have not searched for documentation of this, however.
