The letter on page 139 to James Proctor writes about the Sea Venture (correct spelling) of which I have done some research while visiting the archives in Bermuda. Some Durham ancestors (through the Rich family lines) were on the vessel and thus my interest. I did not find a mention of the Sea Venture going to Jamestown prior to 1609, but I'm not sure that would be mentioned in Bermuda.

#### SEA VENTURE

The colony at Jamestown appeared as though it would follow the Roanoke colony into oblivion, such was the state of affairs. In response, the Virginia Company of London dispatched a relief feet to the colony in 1609 comprising of 600 colonists embarking on 9 vessels. Sir George Somers was the man chosen to be admiral of the fleet. His flagship was the 300 ton Sea Venture, of which he was nown part owner. The Captain was Christopher Newport and also to sail was the Governor designate of the colony, Sir Thomas Gates.

The fleet of whips sailed from Woolwich on May 15, 1609 to Plymouth, England where they met with Sir George Somers. That June 2nd they set out for the New World.

Several weeks later on July 24th the fleet of ships were beset by the tail end of a hurricane and the Sea Venture became separated from the rest of the fleet as the weather worsened. The ship was leaking badly, the severe stress on her hull was opening the seams between the planks and before long there was seven fee of water in the hold. She was sinking. The entire company was pressed into back-breaking work and for three and a half days pumped and bailed for their lives. On the fourth day they sighted land which is now known as Bermuda.

Food was in abundance and the climate agreeable. Shortly after their landing it was decided to send a "Barke of Aviso" to Virginia to explain the non-arrival of the deputy governor and to secure a ship to take them to their destination. After decking over the ship's longboat, Henry Ravens, Thomas Whittingham and at least six men departed for Virginia, never to be heard from again.

After months of waiting, the leaders agreed to continue to build a new ship using the native cedar found in abundance on the island and salvaging the timbers and rigging from Sea Venture. Disagreements arose and people formed into factions with some siding with Sir Thomas Gates, the senior while ashore, and others with Sir George Somers. Partly because of this and because one vessel could not accommodate everyone, another vessel was built. Many knew what was awaiting in Jamstown and were loathe to leave such a beautiful and bountiful island as Bermuda, but at last the ships were ready.

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On launching, the larger ship was christened Deliverance and the smaller, built by sir George Somers, was named Patience. On May 10, 1610 they departed and arrived without incident in Chesapeake Bay on May 21.

One baby boy born in Bermuda to the Easons was christened Bermudas. He continued to America in 1610. The other baby born in Bermuda (a little girl to Mistress Rolfe and christened Bermuda) died in Bermuda.

#### THE WARMOTHS OF CHESTER, SOUTH CAROLINA

Chasing the Warmoth Family back through history is exciting and never ending. Never ending because with each marriage comes a new name to explore. Genealogist state that there are fewer than 350 households in the United States bearing the name Warmoth. The name has been spelled a number of ways including: Warmouth, Wormuth, Wormoth, Warmath, Warmuth, and Warmoth. Today in Germany, Austria, Holland, and even in Paris it is spelled Warmuth. Even so, we are all the same family. The Warmoth Family of Chester is linked by marriages to other families such as: Campbell; Edwards; Glover; Benson; Maloney; Hartness; Lathan; and Littlejohn to name a few. Time and space does not permit going into detail about all of these families. However, a little light will be shed upon some of them.

A large settlement of Warmoths figured conspicuously in the early history of the State of New York. A Peter Warmoth lived in a large brick house at Cherry Valley, NY. This family furnished a lot of soldiers for the War of the American Revolution. At least one of the children of Peter Warmoth was a victim of the Indian Chief Brant who was allied with the British. Christian Warmoth was a member of the First Regiment of the Line commanded by Col. Vanschaik; William and Peter Warmoth served in the Second Regiment under Col. Jacob Klock and Gen. Nicholas Herkimer.

Thaddeus Hartwidge Warmoth was born in VA in 1761 and died in 1847. When only seventeen years of age he enlisted in Capt. Samuel Colson's Company of Col. Thomas Gaskins Virginia Regiment and served through the War of the American Revolution. His first wife

was named Winney and she died when she was sixty-eight years old. His second wife was Mary (Polly) Bonar. He had five sons: Thaddeus, Jr., Thomas, Githian, Henry and John. He had a brother named Thomas who also served in the Revolution. Thomas and Thaddeus, Sr. received a pension in 1818 and his widow (Polly) received a pension of six dollars a month in 1853. After the War they left Richmond Co., VA and moved to Garrard Co., Kt. Throughout its history the Warmoth Family has, at various times, lived in Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, North Carolina and South Carolina.

Thaddeus' son Henry was the Grandfather of Henry Clay Warmoth who fought as a Lt. Col. in the Union Army in the War between the States. Henry Clay served as the Governor of the State of Louisiana from 1868 to 1872.

John M. Warmoth, Great Great Grandfather of the Chester Warmoths was born in 1809 in Milton, VA. He was a harness and saddle maker by trade. This trade had been passed down through the family from the earliest Warmoth. He had two sons: James Richard and John Randolph who were born after he and his wife moved to Cabarrus Co., NC. Both of the sons became saddle and harness makers. James Richard was married to Martha Glover. He was the Great Grandfather of the Chester Warmoths. He was born in 1834. He and Martha and two sons: William Jefferson and James Edward. James Richard served in the Confederate Army from 1861 to Appomattox in 1865. He was in Co. H\_Greggs Brigade--12th Regiment--Infantry as a Private. He was wounded at the Battle of Jericho Ford on May 23, 1864.

He lived with his wife and two sons in the vicinity of Sharon in York Co., SC. James Richard's brother John Randolph was born in 1830 and died in 1904. He married Prudence Logan and they lived in Grindal Shoals, Cherokee Co., SC. They had five children. One daughter, Lady Shelton Warmoth, married Cameron Littlejohn and they had eight children. One son, Bruce Littlejohn, became a South Carolina Circuit Judge and then became Chief Justice of the South Carolina Supreme Court. He retired from this position but still serves as a Judge when needed. Descendents of John Randolph still live in the Gaffney, SC area.

James Richard's son William Jefferson was born in 1865 and died in 1900. He was married to Harriett (Hattie) Harrison. They had three sons and lived in Rock Hill, SC. One granddaughter, Anne Warmoth Odom, lives in Chester, SC.

James Richard's other son, James Edward, was the Grandfather of the Chester Warmoths, was born in 1868 and died in 1948. He was married to Eliza Ann Maloney and they had four children: James Richard, Charles Saye, R. Louis (died when five years old), and McHugh (died in infancy). Charles Saye married Ocie Brakefield and they had five children. He was Mayor of Sharon, SC for thirteen

years. He served in Co. B--55th Pioneer Infantry in World War I. James Richard (Jim), father of the Chester Warmoths, was born in 1893 and died in 1966. He married Fanny Belle Campbell and spent most of his adult life employed with Springs Industries as a weaver. He was a member of the SC State Guard in both World War I and II. Together he and Fanny Belle had twelve children:

Edward Louis and Mary Louise were born in Sharon, SC in the house in which their father had been born. All the others were born in Chester, SC.

Eliza Ann Maloney, wife of James Edward Warmoth, was born in 1874 and died in 1912. She was the daughter of James Gardner Maloney, Great Grandfather of the Chester Warmoths and Margaret Lilly Latham Maloney. (Leathem-Latham-Lathan). James Gardner Maloney served in Co. ) -- McGowans Brigade -- 12th Regiment -- SC Volunteers -- Infantry --He was captured May 12, 1864 at Spotsylvania, Virginia and C.S.A. imprisoned first at Belle Plain, VA and then at Ft. Delaware, According to history, this last prison was as bad as Delaware. the horrible Andersonville Prison. He was a prisoner for ten months before being exchanged. He served from January 1862 until February 1865. He was the son of Austin Maloney, Great Great Grandfather of the Chester Warmoths who came from Ireland and settled first in Fairfield County, SC. Austin's wife was named Leacy and this name has been handed down to others in the Maloney family.

Margaret Lilly Latham Maloney was the daughter of James Dickson Latham, Great Great Grandfather of the Chester Warmoths and Elvira Margaret Hartness. James Dickson was born in 1823 and died in 1859. He was the great grandson of Andrew Anderson Leathem who was born in Ireland in 1730 and died in 1790. Records show that: "John Monford Captain of the Snow, Betty Gregg, brought Andrew Anderson Leathem and his family to America in 1768. Other familiar names of today on the passenger list were Gilmore, Burns, Berry, Bankhead. They left Northern Ireland in hope of a better life in America. Most came on the Bounty Act of 1761 which paid a man's passenger order, granted land, and other necessities of life on the

promise they would clear land and make permanent homes in the New Land. Andrew Anderson Leathem and son Richard signed their memorial on Sept. 1, 1768. This was in Craven Co, now York Co, SC Bullocks Creek Vic. Land Grant from King George the Third of Great Britain. Andrew Anderson and son Robert (James Dickson's Grandfather) both fought under Lts. Moore and Miller, Capt. Wallace and Col. Bratton in the War of the American Revolution. Andrew Anderson was the fifth Great Grandfather of the Chester Warmoths.

Elvira Margaret Hartness was the daughter of Richey Hartness and Lilly Mitchell. Richey was the son of Robert Hartness and Grandson of John Hartness who was the fifth Great Grandfather of the Chester Warmoths. Robert fought in the American Revolution. His Grandfather, John Hartness was born in 1725 and died in 1769. He came to America from England and served as a Col. soldier to SC. Hartness as a surname appears in Durham County England as early as year 825 A.D. This family furnished a number of soldiers for the South in the War between the States.

Fanny Belle Campbell, other of the Chester Warmoths, was the daughter of Joseph Campbell. She was born in 1894 and died in 1946. Her father, Joseph, was the son of Samuel Campbell who was born in 1790 and who was married to Jane Hill. They had seven children. Four of Samuels sons--John, James, Samuel and Thomas--fought for the Confederacy during the War Between the States. Family tradition says that Samuel was a Scotch farmer who once owned the site of Harmony Church and Cemetery and sold it to a family of Allens to pay mortgage. Samuel was the son of John Campbell, Great Great Grandfather of the Chester Warmoths, who came to America in 1772.

The Warmoths of Chester are proud of their heritage. Rich, Poor, Educated, or Uneducated they have been good citizens who have served their County in War and Peace from the American Revolution until today. They have produced Doctors, Ministers, Teachers, Soldiers, Farmers, Craftsmen, Bankers, Merchants, Salesmen, Nurses, Accountants—the list goes on—all hard working honest people.

BRATTON, JOHN (Mar. 7, 1831-Jan. 12, 1898) Confederate soldier, the son of Dr. William Bratton, Jr. and his second wife, Isabella Means, was born at Winnsboro, S. C. After preparation at Mt. Zion Academy he entered the S. C. College from which he was graduated in 1850. Three years later he received a "medical diploma" from the S. C. Medical College and shortly afterward began the practice of medicine in Fairfield County. In 1859 he married Elizabeth, daughter of Theodore S. DuBose. He continued in his profession with moderate success until the beginning of the Civil War when he entered the military service of S.C. as a private in the 6th Regiment of Volunteers. He was almost immediately promoted captain. Twice subsequently, however, he reenlisted as a private at the expiration of periods of enlistment when his regiment was reorganized. In 1862 he was elected colonel of the 6th Regiment which had become a part of Micah Jenkin's Brigade, Longstreet's Corps. After the death of Jenkins, during the Battle of the Wilderness, May 6, 1864, "Old Reliable," as Bratton was now known to his men, was appointed brigadier-general (June 27, 1864). was several times cited for gallantry and was twice wounded. On one occasion (Battle of Seven Pines, May 31, 1862) being wounded, he was taken prisoner and was held in Fortress Monroe until exchanged several months later. Of the brigades which composed the Army of Northern Virginia at Appomattox, his was the most completely manned and was the only one which left the field as an organized unit (Official Records, ser. I, passim).

After the war Bratton did not resume the practice of medicine but became a farmer and was soon drawn into active public life. He did not seek political office but was from time to time pressed into service as a member of the constitutional convention in 1865, as state senator (1865-66), and as congressman (1884-85). He was a delegate to all the Taxpayers' Conventions, was chairman of the delegates from S. C. to the national Democratic convention of 1876, was chairman of the state Democratic committee in 1880, and was elected by the legislature to fill the vacant office of state comptroller in 1881. In politics he adhered to the conservative party which under Wade Hampton [q.v.] delivered the state from Republican rule in 1876. Though a farmer he did not support the Farmer's Movement in S. C. His feeling against this "class movement", as he characterized was such that he was led to become a candidate for the governorship in 1890 in opposition to B. R. Tillman [q.v.], the Farmer's leader. His dignified campaign, conducted amidst all manner of political excess and extravagance, won the admiration of all classes but was at no time formidable. Like many conservatives, he retired from politics after the victory of the Tillmanites. He died at Winnsboro, Jan. 12, 1898.

# THE FAMILY OF JOHN AND SARAH CHAMBERS WHERRY Submitted by Doris Jean Rowe 414 Swanson Avenue Placentia, Ca. 92670

John Wherry, the son of Samuel and Dorcas Coulter Wherry, born c. 1780/81, died 25 December, 1836. He is buried in the cemetery of Fishing Creek Presbyterian Church, Chester County, South Carolina. John Wherry married, about 1807, Sarah Chambers, the daughter of John and Elizabeth Neely Chambers. According to her tombstone, Sarah was born in Chester County, 27 September 1787. She died 12 August, 1866, and is buried in Bethesda Cemetery, Perry County, Alabama.

The tombstone of Sarah Blackburn in the cemetery of Mt. Zion Presbyterian Church, Perry County, bears the following inscription: "Daughter of John and Sally Werry, b. Mary 31, 1834, in Lester District, S.C., imagrated to Ala., 1837..." Apparently, the engraver could neither hear nor spell but this information does serve to identify the parents of the Perry County Wherrys.

Various Wherrys appear in census, marriage and court records of Perry County beginning in 1840. From these records and the absence of any senior Wherrys other than Sarah, the wife of John, the family of John and Sarah Chambers Wherry is reconstructed as follows:

- Samuel N. Wherry, 14 January 1808-16 June 1859. We believe his middle name was Neely because his grandfather was Samuel Neely. He was apparently unmarried and is buried adjacent to his brother, James M., in Bethesda Cemetery, Perry County.
- 2. Elizabeth Wherry, 3 January 1810-26 March 1859, married in Chester County, Joseph H. Hines (occasionally appears in S.C. as Haynes), 22 October 1801-11 August 1859. Both are buried adjacent to Thomas Wherry in Sardis Baptist Cemetery, Perry County. Elizabeth and Joseph had one daughter, Sarah S., who married James Madison Crews in 1851, the son of Peter Moody and (Mary Tubb?) Crews.
- Dorcas Wherry, 11 May 1812-5 November 1889, buried in Bethesda Cemetery, Perry County, adjacent to her probable grandaughter. No evidence exists of a marriage but almost certainly, she had a daughter, Mary. Mary, b. 7 February 1837-8 August, 1911, and married William Tubb.
- 4. Thomas Wherry, 11 September 1815-12 August 1851, married Martha Griffin who subsequently married Samuel Tubb. No issue. Both Thomas and Martha (she with her second husband) are buried in Sardis Baptist Cemetery, Perry County.
- 5. James M. Wherry, 20 March 1817-26 November 1869, married Martha Elizabeth Lagrone, daughter of David and Mary Lightsey Lagrone. They had two daughters, Harriet T. and Mary Eliza Jane. Martha married (2) James Timmerman. James Wherry is buried in Bethesda Cemetery, Perry County.
- 6. John Wherry, c. 1818-c.1864. No marriage on record. His burial place is unknown but he is presumed to have died in the Civil War.

- 7. Mary Wherry, 1819-d. 1859/60, married 21 December 1840, Thomas Fleming Clinton. Mary's burial place is unknown. Thomas Clinton married (2) Frances Elizabeth (Rinehart) Carter, daughter of Abram and Mary Catherine Shealy Rinehart. Thomas Clinton is not buried with his second wife and it is presumed he is buried with Mary Wherry. The Clintons had the following children: Thomas N., William, Cornelius, James W., Charles B., Susanna and Florence. Charles B. died before his tenth birthday. Florence was born in 1859 and was brain-damaged.
- 8. Sarah Wherry, 31 May 1824-9 January 1891, married 12 October 1846, John Jefferson Blackburn. Children: Thomas, Jonathan, James Monroe, Amos P., Rad?, Calhoun, Harriet Ann, twins Sidney Walker and Pinkney Walter, and an unnamed daughter, possibly others. Most of the above died young. Sarah and John Blackburn with several of their children are buried in Mt. Zion Presbyterian Cemetery, Perry County.

It has been presumed that the Mary Wherry who is buried adjacent to John Wherry at Fishing Creek was the daughter of John and Sarah Chambers Wherry. However, new information indicates that this Mary Wherry was actually Mary Ashcraft Wherry, the wife of Samuel Neely Wherry, whose estate was administered by her husband on January 17, 1837. Certainly she would have died in 1836 which is the date on the tombstone in Fishing Creek Cemetery.

Only one record exists in Perry County, Alabama, other than the 1850 census, for the Samuel N., son of John and Sarah Wherry. He made a deed of gift in 1855 to Thomas N. Clinton, the eleven year old son of Mary and Thomas Clinton. The deed identifies the property conveyed as a "Bay horse with left eye out supposed to be about fifteen years old."

John Wherry, Jr.'s, estate was settled in 1864. The heirs named were Dorcas Wherry, Sarah Blackburn, Sarah Crews [daughter of Elizabeth Wherry who died 1859], Harriet and Eliza Wherry [daughters of James], and the surviving six children of Mary Wherry, Thomas N., William, Cornelius, James W., Susanna and Florence Clinton. Each received over \$1300 which, in the 1860's, would have seemed a rather substantial sum. The settlement does not indicate whether they received this amount singly or as family units.

The Wherry folder in the vertical files at Marion Library, Perry County, Alabama, contains only two old letters. Both were written to Dorcas Wherry. The latest letter, written in May 1864, begins, "Dear Sister" and says, "Dorca, I wrote mother they 19." Although the signature is missing, it was probably written by John Wherry. The letter was written at Etowah Station, Georgia, and describes the battle at Dalton, Georgia. He mentions various people from the neighborhood and adds that he has "seen Jeferson...and Pink." These were likely John Jefferson and Thomas Pinkney Blackburn, the first of whom married Sarah Wherry in 1846.

The earliest letter, written by Silas Wherry and dated July, 1843, was addressed "To Cousin Dorcas Wherry, The State of Tennessee, Shelby County." Across one end is written, "By Leonard," an indication the letter was hand-delivered. Silas' letter was written to offer condolences for the "loss of your loved one." He also asked that Dorcas give his "compliments to your aunt and your little daughter."

Printed cemetery records of Shelby County, Tn., reveal the 1842 death of S.A.P., (believed to be Silas Alexander Pagan) Wherry, the son of Thomas Wherry. Therefore, the Silas who wrote the letter would have been the son of Andrew Wherry. The only Dorcas Wherry in that time and place would have been his sister Dorcas. That circumstance and the presence of the letter in Perry County files seems to indicate the letter surely must have been written to Dorcas, the daughter of John and Sarah, who was then living in Shelby County. Given that and the discovery of other evidence in Perry County, Alabama, we may conclude that Dorcas, the daughter of John and Sarah Wherry, was the mother of one child.

The 1850 census record of Perry County shows the following household in Old Town Beat:

Mary Roberson 60 Samuel Wherry 41 Dorcas 37 Mary Robinson 14 b. Tn. Joseph Hines 50 b. SC Elizabeth 39 Sarah 18

This was probably the household of Joseph Hines and his wife, Elizabeth Wherry, who married by 183\$ in Chester County, S.C. and were present by 1840 in Perry County. Next door to this household, also in 1850, are Sarah Wherry, 62, James, 34, and John, 29. A dozen or so households away are those of Thomas and Mary Clinton, Thomas and Martha Wherry. Also present in Thomas Wherry's household are Rebecca Key [Kee?], age 22, and Martha J. Key, age 2.

The 1860 census lists the younger Mary Robinson as M. E. Wherry. The 1880 census shows Dorcas and the senior Mary Robinson living in the household of William and Mary E. Tubb. In the latter census, the senior Mary is in her 80's and is listed as "aunt." Dorcas is listed as "mother-in-law." In 1867, the older Mary Robinson deeded her land to "my neace, Dorcas Wherry, and to Mary and William Tubb, [who have maintained] me as a mother." The deed makes no reference to her relationship to the younger Mary.

The marriage record for young Mary names her as a Robinson as does her tombstone inscription. The compiler of the cemetery records for Sardis Baptist, where she is buried, has included the name "Perry." A visual inspection of the tombstone shows Perry is not on the stone. Apparently the compiler remembered Wherry as Perry. Regardless of her records under the name of Robinson, the other evidence and censuses seem to clearly indicate the younger Mary Robinson is the "little daughter" of Silas' letter.

A footnote to the mystery of the younger Mary "Robinson" can be found in Bethesda Cemetery where Dorcas is buried next to Anna D. Horn, the daughter of the younger Mary, and Anna's husband. Next to the Horns is the grave of "Mrs. Mary, wife of Samuel Roberson, born 31 December 1791-died 6 October 1880, aged 89 yrs. 9 mos. 6 days."


The 1840 Shelby County, Tn. census lists a Samuel Roberson. She, the senior Mary Robinson, would certainly have been Mary Chambers, the sister to Sarah Chambers Wherry.

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#### CHESTER COUNTY ANCESTORS IN FRANCE

Paula and I also visited two towns in south France in the foothills of the Pyrenees, reportedly the ancestral homes of the Chester County Gaston family. Foix (pronounced fwa) is a beautiful little town surrounding a small castle perched high on hill. Carcassone is a larger city with the old walled fortress town on a hill and the less ancient town adjacent in a river valley. According to Gaston family books including "Gaston of Chester" by Dr. Chalmers Gaston Davidson and various "Bulletin" articles the Gastons were French Huegenots who fled first from France to the Ayrshire area of Scotland and later to County Antrim in Ulster. In France they had been members of the aristocracy according to writings brought to South Carolina; by Rev. Hugh Gaston in 1766 during a visit to his brother John Gaston and his sister Mary (Gaston) McClure (Paula's ancestor). The various accounts describing the lineage in France prior to fleeing to Scotland in the 1650-85 period are somewhat confusing. I located two books with charts in the library at Carcasonne which present a clear line from the Comtes de Carcasonne in the year 812 to 1012 when Bernar-Roger became both the Comte de Carcasonne and the Comte de Foix. His son Pierre continued as the Comte de Foix through several more generations including Gaston I (1239-1343), Gaston II (1308-11343 and Gaston III Phebus (1331-1391). The task for the future would be to research the period described by early Gastons when the ancestors were titled Count of Renti-Duke of Orleans and Gaston de Foix de Nemours (1489). Orleans and Nemours are south of Paris. I must add that some of the present tourist literature for Foix mentions Gaston III Phebus. The attached charts run in sequence with Roger III the last on the Carcasonne/Foix chart and the first on the later Foix chart.

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
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#### CHESTER COUNTY ANCESTORS IN SCOTLAND

Paula and I visited Ayr and Largs in the Ayrshire the area along the west coast of Scotland, south of Glasgow. All of Paula's ancestors from Northern Ireland including the Gill, Mills, Kelso, Wylie, Gaston and Mclure families are thought to have originated in the Ayrshire. The battle of Largs in 1263 in which the Scots defeated the Norwegian Vikings is celebrated here each year. Members of the Kelso family were in that battle. Both the Brisbanes and Kelso's were prominent connected families. A short history of Largs available to tourists states:

"In 1671 the Brisbanes acquired Kelsoland, changing its name to Brisbane and the mansion house . . . to Brisbane House. . . The Kelsos were an old Norman family who had held land in Brisbane Glen since the thirteenth century. Sir Thomas Brisbane, for whom Brisbane, Australia was named was born in the Brisbane House."

In another book of Scots-Irish Links I noted the following"

"KELSO, Donald. Instrument of Sasine narrating that John Kelso of Nether Kelsoland gave sasine to Donald Kelso, Captain of the Isle of Rathry in Ireland, of the rents of the lands of Nether Kelsoland - 1576

KELSO, John, in Bangor, formerly a merchant in Ayr - 1689.

The telephone directory of Glascow and the Ayrshire area there are 230 Cooper, 10 Lemon, 31 Hemphill, 60 Kelso, 16 Gaston, 60 Gill, 45 Lilley, Lilly, or Lillie, 80 McClure, McLure, 200 Porter, 120 Mills, 800 Walker, 350 Wylie, Wyllie and 28 Hawthorne listings, all Chester County names.

### The saga of the BATTLE OF LARGS 1263

Late in the summer of 1263 King Haakon IV of Norway sailed into the Firth of Clyde in his great ship with its gilded dragon's head. He ruled over all the Scottish islands and had come, with a huge fleet, to add Bute and the Cumbraes to his kingdom. The Norwegian ships anchored in the sheltered channel between the Great Cumbrae and Largs. As winter drew near there were fierce storms. Several ships were blown ashore and on 2nd October a Norwegian force was landed to cover attempts to refloat them. The Scots resisted and eventually forced the Norwegians back to their ships. Haakon's fleet, damaged by the storms, sailed home to the Orkneys.

The Battle of Largs was the last Norse raid on the mainland of Scotland. Their victory allowed the Scots to regain control of the western islands. Enmity between Scotland and Norway was ended by a royal marriage as a result of which Haakon's great-grand-daughter succeeded to the Scottish Crown in 1286. The child is known in Scottish history as the Maid of Norway and her untimely death caused the disputed succession which led to the War of Scottish Independence.

#### MARY LIF BARNES 917 LANE #3 ATHENS, TEXAS 75751

In the book, The Mackeys and Allied Families by Beatrice Mackey Doughtie, 1957(p. 735) is proof that Alexander Douglas had another land grant. "John Makky(sic): Pursuant to a Wt by John Winn, Esq. Commsr. of Locations in Camden Dist.dated 15 Mch 1785, I have admeasured and laid out to Alex Douglass a plantation of 640 a. situate lying and being on both sides of Camp Crk. on N.E. side of Catawba River bounded on NW by Mary Douglass and John Makky's land and vacant land; NE by Robt. Carnahan's and James Adams land & vacant land and SE by vacant land. Certified Mch 1785 (S.C Archv: Land Plats) This land was bought by Thomas Mackey, Sr. 29 June 1807." But Thos.Mackey did not buy but 100 acres at this time. (See Deed, p. 107)

Also quoting from same source, p. 782-83: The will of John T. Mackey (son of Thomas) is recorded in Lancaster Co(A-308) and was sg. 18 Sept 1882 pr. 2 Dec 1882, naming following heirs:


w: Mary, "100 a. wheron I now reside known as a part of the Alex Douglass 1ds & a prt of the Twitty lads commencing at a line between my 1d.& 1ds.of Col. T. F. Clyburn on a branch called Kater br. running in NE direction & in Sw direction dividing the Twitty 1ds.from the Douglass 1ds. following the Twitty line in a S.Easterly direction to the road leading from my home to Camden Road; running a straight line from thence to the ford of Camp Crk. near my house thence down the sd Crk to the beginning corner where my 1d. and T.F. Clyburns joins."

This gives then a description of the land and can be more definitely pinpointed. Mrs Doughtie further states that the plantation that John T. Mackey inherited was between White Oak Branch and Camp Creek. When that homestead burned, he built another about one-third mile from the old home site which is standing today. (1957) and that John T. and his w. are buried in Mt Carmel Methodist Church Cemetery on the Mackey plantation in Lancaster Co., S.C.

"Alexander Douglas vs. Geo Curry et al. Roll 10 Court Common Pleas: George Curry, William Curry and William Carnahan were attached to answer to Alexander Douglas in a plea wherefore with force and arms and so forth, the said George Curry William Curry and William Carnahan did break and enter the close or plantation of him the said Alexander Douglas Situate on the waters of Camp Creek on the East side of the Catawba River in the District aforesaid and him the said Alexander from the same did eject and hold out and other wrongs and enormities to him did whereupon the said Alexander by Samuel Mathis, his attorney complains and says that the said ...... This was filed 1 January 1788 and the suit was countered by the defendants that they were not quilty. Daniel Brown... attorney. Alexander asked for Twenty pounds Sterling for damage done against the peace of the said state and five hundreds pounds Sterling for

his damage. It seems that George Curry was claiming some of Douglas' land, and a resurvey was ordered in 1793. This went on until 1794 when the three named by Douglas were judged guilty by the jury and were to pay Alexander Douglas all the cost and charges aforesaid.

#### JAMES DOUGLASS OF CRAVEN COUNTY, SC.

JAMES DOUGLASS ARRIVED ABOARD THE SNOW, JAMES & MARY, 12 JAN 1768 FROM U, NORTH IRELAND. His age is listed as 40 years, and he was accompanied by his wife Agnes age 50? and children: Mary age 14, Alex age 14 and Isabell age 12. On the same vessel was also a James Douglass age 34, wife Rose age 32, and their children: Mary 8, Robert 11, , James 4, By 1775 James and Rose Douglas and family were located in what is now Chester County, SC near Fishing Creek. It is likely the two James are related to each other as well as to the James who arrived 1773. Cemetery Records of this family appeared in Chester County Genealogical Society Bulletin in December 1991.

James and Agnes Douglass appear to have settled in Craven County in that part which was later Lancaster Co. and Kershaw Co. On 12 Sept 1768 James received a grant of 300 acres in Craven Co., SC, East of the Catawba on both sides of Beaver Creek. James wrote his will in 1790 naming his children: Martha, (born after 1768?) Mary and Alexander. Isabell was not named nor Agnes, indicating their death prior to 1790. (this researcher has doubts that Agnes was 50 years old or if she was, was not the wife of James, but a sister). The will was probated in Kershaw County; the husband of Martha was William Mounce who was named Administrator because Martha who was named executor refused? But Probate Records have not been found. He left Alexander only his wearing apparel.

In the Names of God Amen I James Douglass of South Carolina Lancaster County Beaver Creek, Being through the abundant mercy & goodness of god, the weak in body yet of a sound mind and perfect understanding and memory, doth constitute this my last Last and devise it may be received by all as such I will first a that all Lands whereon I now Live and all the lands join them altho., of different tracts Excepting fifty acres with all my goods and Chattels & Stock Except Cloathing or Cloaths unto my loving daughter Martha. Next I will unto my loving daughter Marey the above Excepted fifty acres of land on that side Next John Creightn Lands during her life or while she is pleast to live thereon. Likewise i will unto sd Daughter Marey one Hundred Acres of Land Lying on a branch of Hanging rock joying hangind rock plantation having no power to dispose or Morgage said Lands without the consent of her sister Martha, next I will unto my loving son Alexander all my clothing this is my wearing apperral i doth live (sc) my Daughter Martha Exectrix. of this my last will and testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this fourtheenth Day of October one thousand seven hundred and Ninty----

This family is almost certain to be related to the Alexander Douglass Family of Lancaster Co., SC. In 1819 Alexander wrote to his son, Ebenezer, in Butler Co., Oh and indicated that Ebenezer was visiting his cousin, James, and James' father. It is likely that John Douglass is the father of cousin James Douglass. Ebenezer was married in Preble Co., Oh and several of his children were born there. Some of the children of this James Douglass also relocated to Preble Co., Oh. and were members of the Hopewell ARP Church.


