Directions to WHITE OAK CONFERENCE CENTER from

COLUMBIA - TWO WAYS:

- I-77 Travel North towards Charlotte. Get off at exit 46 (SC 20) and take a left at stop sign. Travel approximately 3 miles and come to stop sign. Go straight for another 5 miles. White Oak Conference Center will be on your right.
- Highway 321 Take 321 By-pass around Winnsboro. Travel North on 321 for approximately 8 miles until you see White Oak community sign. Turn right just beyond this sign. Travel 3/10 mile and turn onto Mobley Hwy. White Oak Conference Center is 1/2 mile on left.

ROCK HILL/CHARLOTTE:

I-77 toward Columbia. Take exit number 48 (Hwy 200.) Turn right onto Hwy 200. Travel 3.7 miles and turn onto Mobley Hwy. Travel 5 miles to conference center. White Oak Conference Center will be on your right.

UPSTATE (ANDERSON/GREENVILLE/SPARTANBURG):

Take I-26 East toward Newberry. Get off at exit 74 (SC 34) and take a left at stop sign. Go approximately 35 miles to Winnsboro (US 321.) Turn left onto 321 and travel about 6 miles to White Oak. Turn right at sign and continue approximately 3/10 mile and turn right onto Mobley Hwy. White Oak Conference Center is 1/2 mile on left.


ALTERNATE ROUTE FROM SPARTANBURG/UNION AREA: Take Hwy 9 to Chester. Travel South on Hwy 321 from Chester toward Winnsboro about 18 miles until you see the White Oak community sign. Look for gray-rock church on your right. Turn left immediately after you pass this church. Travel 3/10 mile and turn right onto Mobley Hwy. White Oak Conference 18 1/2 mile on left.

CHARLESTON:

Travel I-26 to Columbia. Turn onto I-20 East toward Florence. Turn North onto I-77 toward Charlotte. Get off at exit 46 (SC 20) and take a left at stop sign. Travel approximately 3 miles and come to stop sign. Go straight for another 5 miles. White Oak Conference Center will be on your right.








Things You Should Know

GREGG - MARTIN - POOL

...I have several connections in Fairfield County. Enclosed are some of my Ancestor Charts: The GREGG chart is on my husband's side of the family. I wrote a book "The Chinaberry Tree Revisited" for my portion - Gregg family - and my co-author did the Collier portion. The information is back to Edward Gregg who acquired land in Fairfield District in 1752 but did not occupy it so Egerton Leigh had claimed the same land. Then Edward Gregg bought the land from Leigh and did settle there in 1759. I have nothing on his parents unless in Virginia, there is a John Gregg who had 2 sons - one John & the other Edward. John Gray Gregg's brother, James Gregg's notice of death, etc., was published at Mount Bethel Meeting house - Winnsborough, SC, July 16th, 1815. John was oldest, another brother Edward & a young brother Henry. Are there records of the Mt. Bethel MH?

Also, my Martin family settled first in Fairfield County when they arrived from Ireland in 1768. John was 12 at the time with 3 brothers and 1 sister and parents James & Jane. Need John's wives!

I believe my John Pool had uncles Adam & Walter Pool and Aunts Mary Mabry, Jane Cleaton (Clayton), & Elizabeth Watson all living in Fairfield Co., 1790. I need entire children of Adam Sr., & Walter Pool Sr., if could be found. My John Pool joined the Rev., in Newberry Dist., & was with Isaac Mitchell - later naming a son Mitchell and another Isaac Mitchell.

My wife and I briefly visited your facility in February and the volunteer ladies were very helpful but were unable to really give us any concrete information about her ancestor, JEREMIAH WALKER (c1780-1852). We had previously visited the CHESTER DIST. GEN. SOC. headquarters in RICH-BURG with similar discouraging results. We were specifically looking for any sort of lead which would definitely prove the parentage of JEREMIAH WALKER.

Since our visit, we have been doing quite a lot of searching on my wife's CHESTER/FAIRFIELD WALKER line and have come up with some facts which we did not have in February or at least, did not share with the ladies at the time. I would like to bring them to your attention at this time so that, perhaps in the future, they may possibly be of some value to another researcher since these records do not seem to be common knowledge in the CHESTER/FAIRFIELD area.

FACT:

My wife's ancestor, JEREMIAH WALKER, was b.c1780, probably in FAIRFIELD CO. He married ELIZABETH DELASHMET around 1800. We found him listed in the 1800 FAIRFIELD census, living next to an ANDREW WALKER, age 26-45. The census taker listed both JEREMIAH and his wife's ages as 10-16. This was in error since he lived until 1852 and the 1850 SUMTER CO., <u>GA</u> census listed his age as 70. ELIZABETH died 16 June 1842. Her place of burial is not known.

JEREMIAH lived almost exactly where BLACKSTOCK stands. We found the deed where he sold 465 acres, more or less, to DAVID HEMPHILL in DEC.1838. (CHESTER CO. DBk.BB p.457, rec. Feb 1839). He was living in GEORGIA at that time and petitioned the SC court to allow him to sell his land in absentia since neither he or his wife could come to SC without suffering great inconvenience. The transaction was completed in Jan 1839.

FACT:

In the 1810 FAIRFIELD census, JEREMIAH was listed next to ANDREW McCLUR-KIN. In 1820 and 1830, he was listed in CHESTER CO. He left BLACKSTOCK some time around 1835-6 as the SUMTER CO. GA. records indicate that in 1839 he purchased a tract of land next to property he already owned. (These latter records are apparently lost). His daughter, ELIZABETH, married REUBIN TUCKER in 1839. TUCKER was known to be already living in GEORGIA prior to that time.

FACT:

ELIZABETH DELASHMET was the daughter of SELAH DELASHMET and sister of MORDECAI, ELIJAH and SARAH DELASHMET. SARAH married a FARIS (or some varient spelling of the name). This information was obtained from ELIJAH DELASHMET'S will, probated in 1852 in GIBSON CO., TN (WB-D-p.404) and in a land transaction of MORDECAI in 1799 where he declared himself "heir to SELAH DELASHMET" (FAIRFIELD DB N, p352, 27 NOV 1799). This is probably the same SELAH DELASHMET who witnessed two land transactions of HANS WAGGONER in 1772. (Office of Mesne Conveyance, CHARLESTON, book C-4-205 and C-4-210). This family all moved to TN and MS in the 1830's.

FACT:

JEREMIAH and ELIZABETH named their first-born son ANDREW WAGGONER WALKER (b. c1805, d.1881 no issue). ANDREW W. owned property next to his father in CHESTER CO. in the BLACKSTOCK area. He married MARY GRAFTON, sister of DANIEL GRAFTON. GRAFTON moved to HENRY CO., GA in the mid-1830s and ANDREW moved there some time prior to 1840. Both men were listed in HEN-RY CO. GA in the 1840 census. ANDREW did not sell all his CHESTER CO. holdings until 1852.

We think JEREMIAH'S father was possibly named ANDREW due to the constant recurring of the name in close association with him. Here are some facts which we have uncovered which substantiate our assumption.

1 - ANDREW WALKER, the elder, had a daughter, MARGARET, who married JOHN McCLURKIN and had two sons by him, ANDREW, b. c1787 (63 in 1850 SC census) and JAMES, b. c1790 (moved to TIPTON CO TN. after 1836). JOHN McCLURKIN died in NOV - DEC 1792 and named ANDREW as his father-in-law and coexecutor of his estate. In SEPT 1792, JOHN McCLURKIN and MARGARET, his wife, sold a tract of land to ANDREW WALKER which was part of a grant McCLURKIN obtained in 1787 (CHESTER CO. DB D, ppg.399 and 401, rec.APR. 1795). In 1797, ANDREW sold this same tract to MARY LOWRIE (DB F, p.136, rec. Jan 1798). The McCLURKIN land was in the same vicinity as JEREMIAH'S land.

As previously mentioned, ANDREW McCLURKIN was shown living next to JERE-MIAH WALKER in 1810. To me, this seems to be much more than purely circumstantial but we have as yet been unable to make a positive connection between JEREMIAH WALKER and the McCLURKIN family.

2 - There was a DRURY WALKER, b.1766-d.1846, who is buried in AIM-WELL ARP cemetery in northern FAIRFIELD CO. In his will, he named all of his 11 children. One of them was named ANDREW (b. c1800, d. aft.1846). We found evidence where DRURY WALKER witnessed the land transaction with MARY LOWRIE which ANDREW WALKER made in 1797 (see above ref). This would suggest that DRURY and ANDREW were possibly brothers or at least cousins. Other land deals involved DRURY with JOSEPH FARIS (husb. SARAH DELASH-MET?? - FAIRFIELD DB HH p517, 1828) and JAMES McCLURKIN, son of MARGARET WALKER MCCLURKIN (FAIRFIELD DB MM p.257, 1836). As you can see, there were several WALKERS who lived in the general area of BLACKSTOCK around 1780 - 1830. Almost none of them left wills which were recorded and have survived. Our job is trying to fit these individuals into a family unit as, from similar Christian names and all the circumstantial evidence, these persons seem to be related.

The biggest mystery right now is who was the progenitor and where did he come from. Our present thinking is that these WALKERS came down from either VIRGINIA or PENNSYLVANIA along with the very first settlers in the area. Were these men part of PHILIP (the miller) WALKER'S family or were they associated with an entirely different set of WALKERS. At some point I recall hearing a story, possibly when we visited with your volunteers in FEB, that there was an old JEREMIAH WALKER who was nearly 100 who, along with one of his sons, was murdered by Indians about the time of the REVOLUTION. Have you ever heard this story? Perhaps this is where the seat of our mystery lies.

Another big question - How were the LANCASTER CO. WALKERS related to the CHESTER and FAIRFIELD WALKERS. They seem to share the same Christian names; what was their relationship?? There never seems to be an end to all of the questions one could ask about all of these long-gone families who lived up to their name and "walked on" leaving little or no record of their sojourn.

Thank you for bearing with me. I just felt like there was so much unknown about these people and SC state records are such a mess that we should try to make it easier for some future researcher to possibly find out about one of their ancestors.

I would be most appreciative if you could let me know your thoughts about our research. Possibly something I have included may jog someone's memory to the point where we can prove beyond doubt that ANDREW WALKER was the father of JEREMIAH WALKER (1780-1852).





THE ORIGINAL PHILADELPHIA LAWYER

<u>Philadelphia lawyer</u> is a term used to describe a legal trickster specializing in loopholes and fat fees. The term has a history behind it, which goes back to before the American Revolution.

The original Philadelphia lawyer, a man maligned by our language, was Andrew Hamilton (born in Scotland, date of birth unknown and brought to America at an early age), who died in 1751 in his seventies.

In 1743 John Peter Zenger (1697-1746), a printer of the New York City Weekly Journal, was charged with libel not for writing but for printing articles that exposed the corruption of the colonial governor. The charge was probably brought against Zenger instead of against the writer because Zenger's print shop could be attached for damages, whereas the writer probably owned no more than his quill and inkwell.

British law did not recognize truth as a defense in an action for libel. "The greater the truth," one jurist had declared, "the greater the libel." It seemed certain that Zenger would be found guilty and assessed a fine that would ruin him.

Then Andrew Hamilton of Philadelphia came out of retirement to defend Zenger, and argued so eloquently for freedom of the press that Zenger was acquitted, that finding establishing a precedent in American law, and causing a sensation in the colonies, in which it was commonly said, "If you are innocent, trust in God; if you are guilty, get a Philadelphia lawyer."

In repetitions of the story, Hamilton's coup was put forth as a triumph of legal trickery, whence the present sense of the idiom. This connotation certainly libels a distinguished American, for Hamilton not only defended Zenger on principle and without fee, but even paid his own expenses for travel and for housing himself in New York City.
