MARTIN - HOLLIS - KNIGHTON

I am researching my Martin and Hollis families. I am almost convinced my great grandmother was born a HOLLIS and raised as a KNIGHTON since she and all siblings carried HOLLIS as a middle name. Do you have any marriages of the HOLLIS and KNIGHTONS? The clans knew each other in VA, moving to SC, to same area. Where could I find any marriage information? Are there any books on early Fairfield Settlers?

For approximately 10 years (on at least work of mouth information), I was lead to believe MOSES KNIGHTON was my blood ancestor. Since then, information (papers from archive) has put that theory on hold. In 1830, one LYDIA HOLLIS had 4 or 5 children listed in census (as widow). A JOHN HOLLIS had a wife (woman) by name LYDIA. When did John die? A LYDIA (?) came to Randolph, Co., Georgia in early 1840 with MOSES KNIGHTON. Did they marry between 1830/40?

All the children Moses carried to Georgia had HOLLIS as middle names. The ages in 1840 census coincide with children had in 1830 census. Who was their Dad? Since I first heard, Moses was the Dad, in 1839 I had erroneously spread untruth unintentionally. Now I MUST correct as soon as I find the truth.

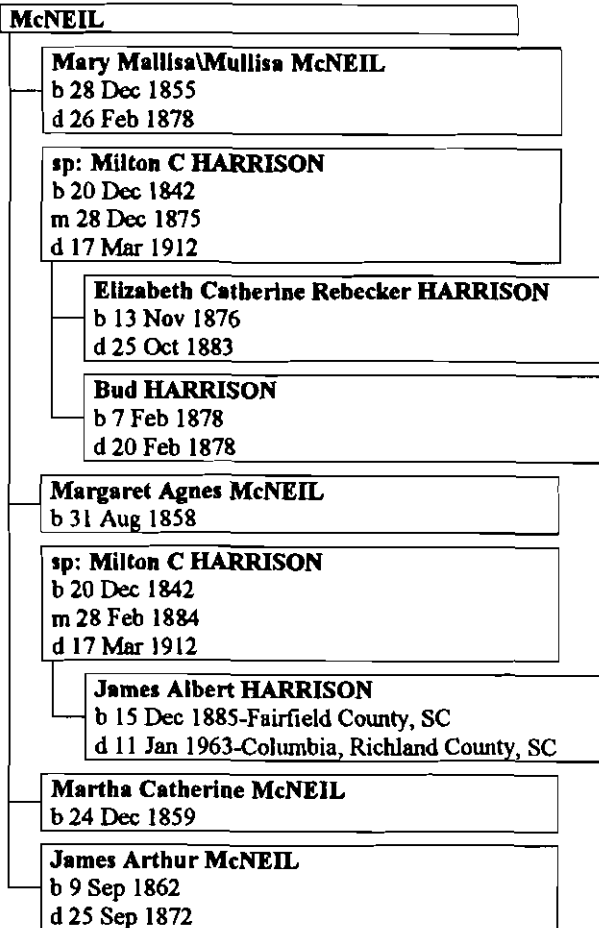

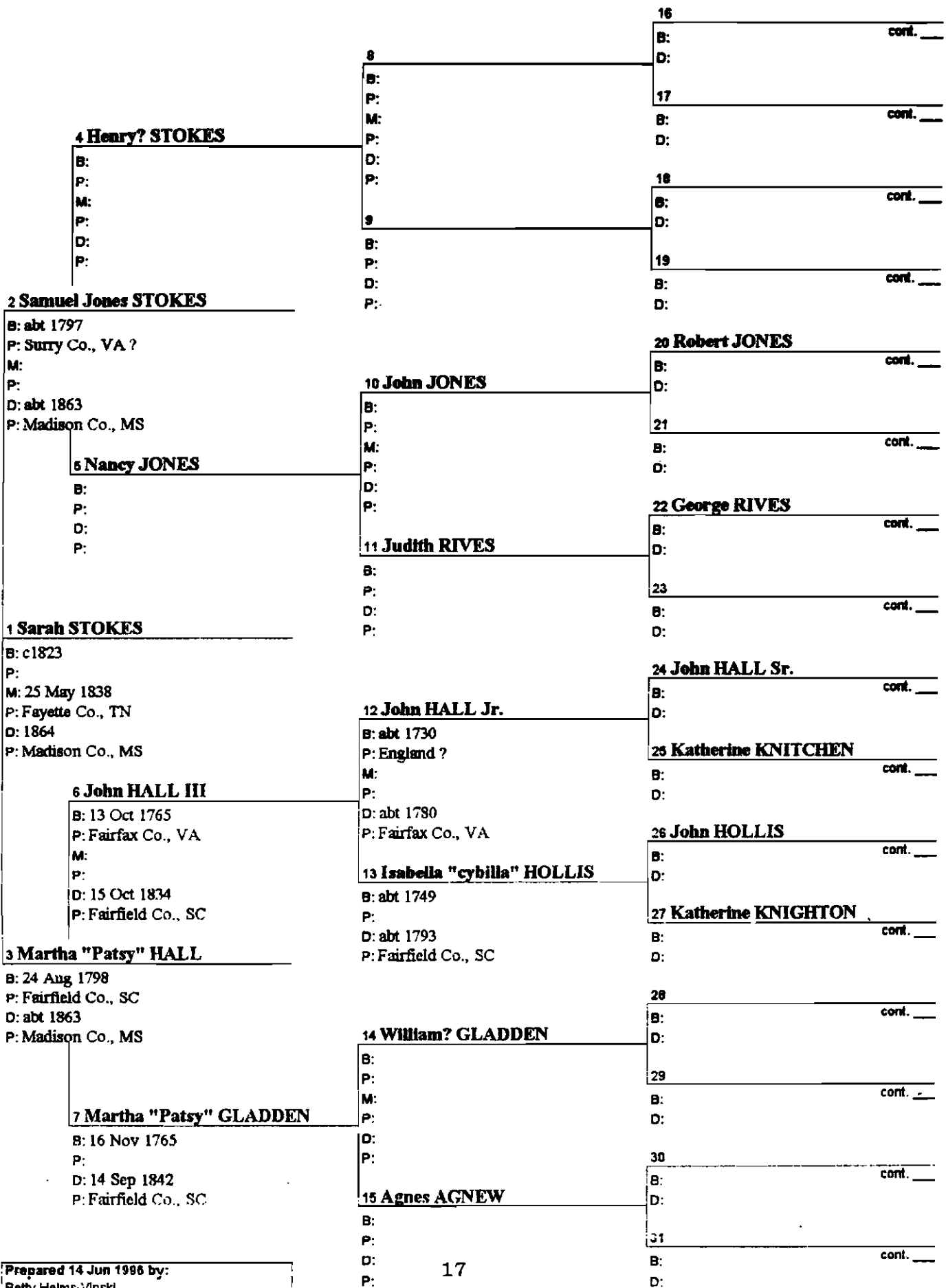

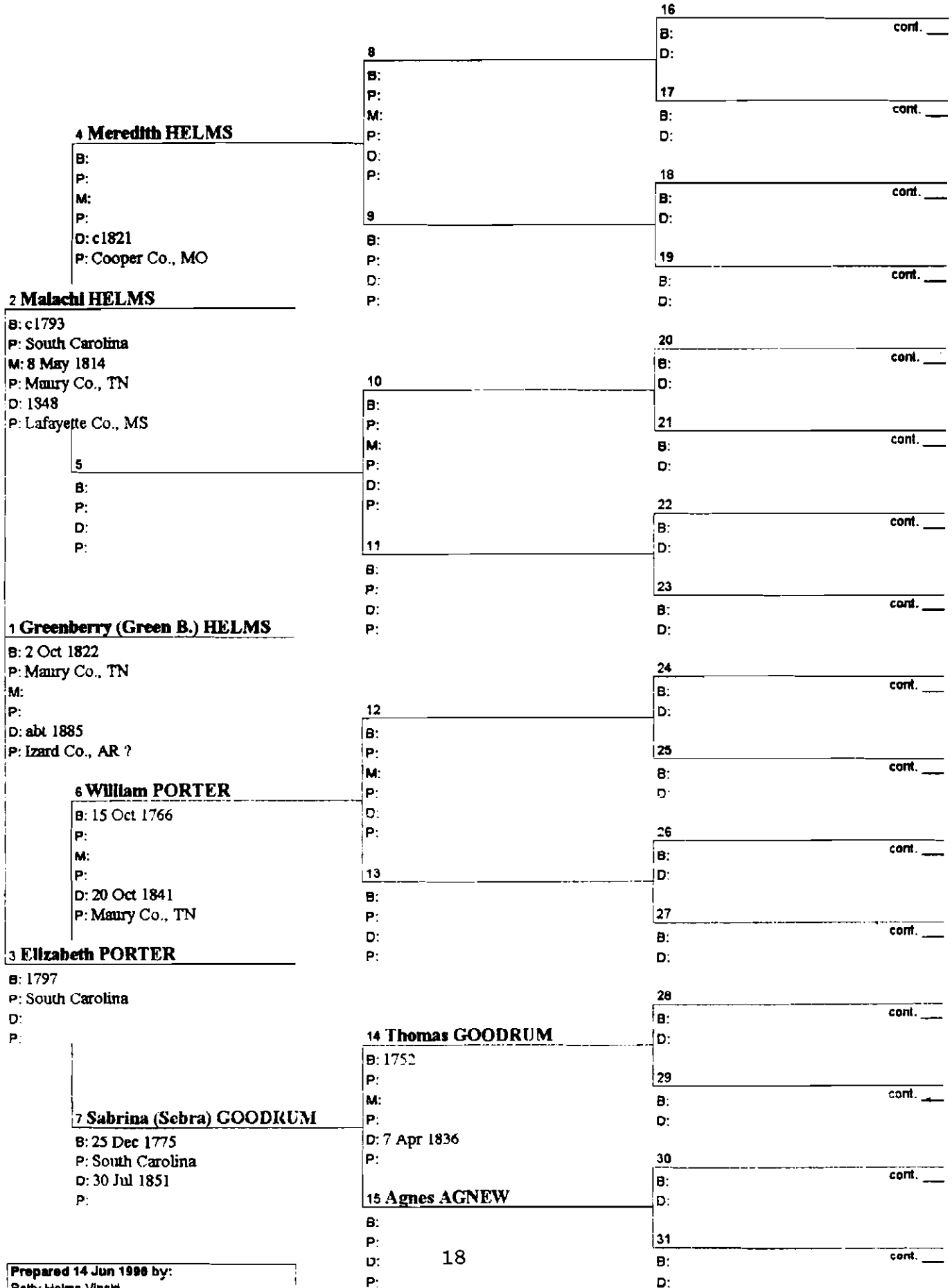

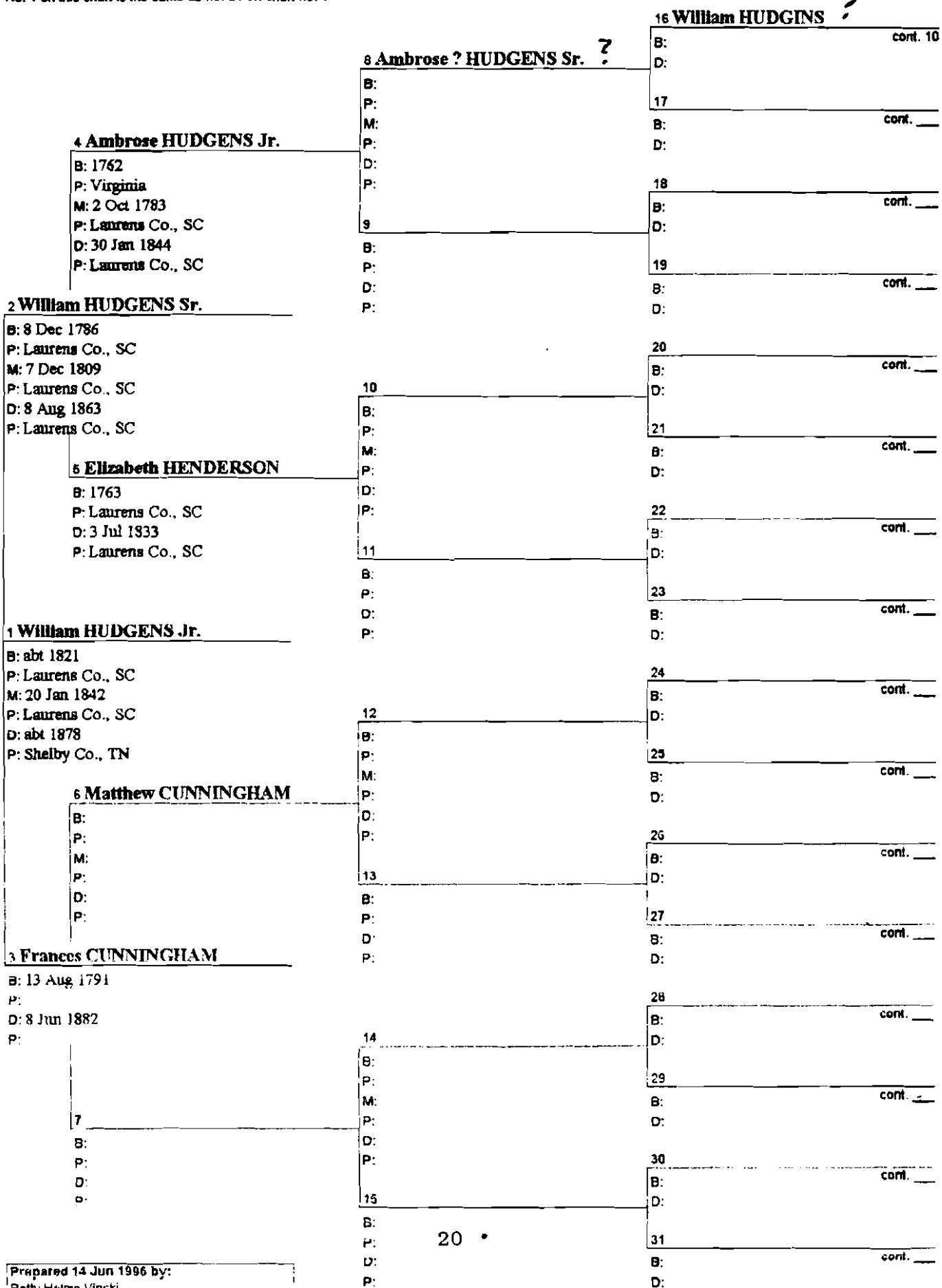

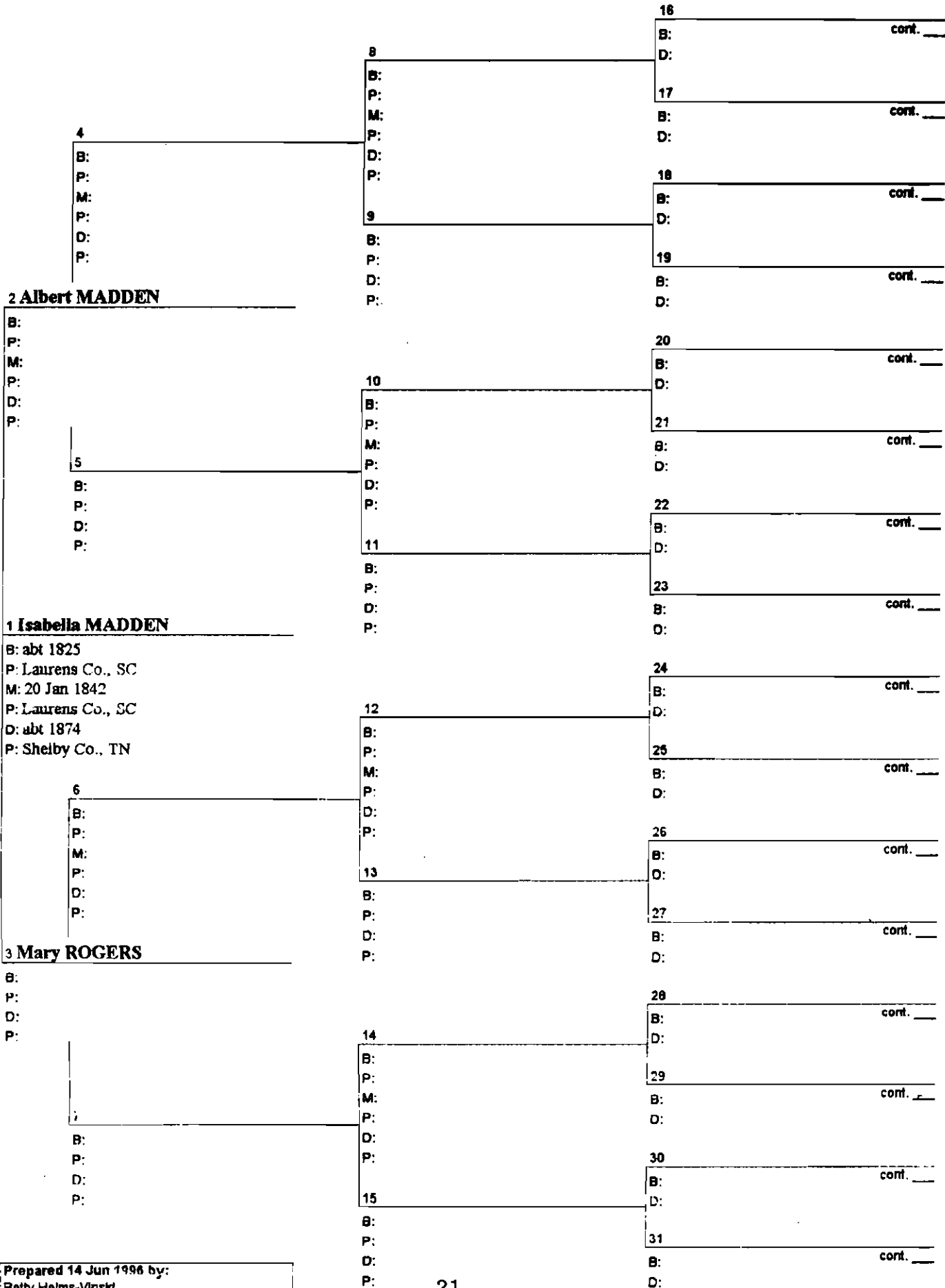

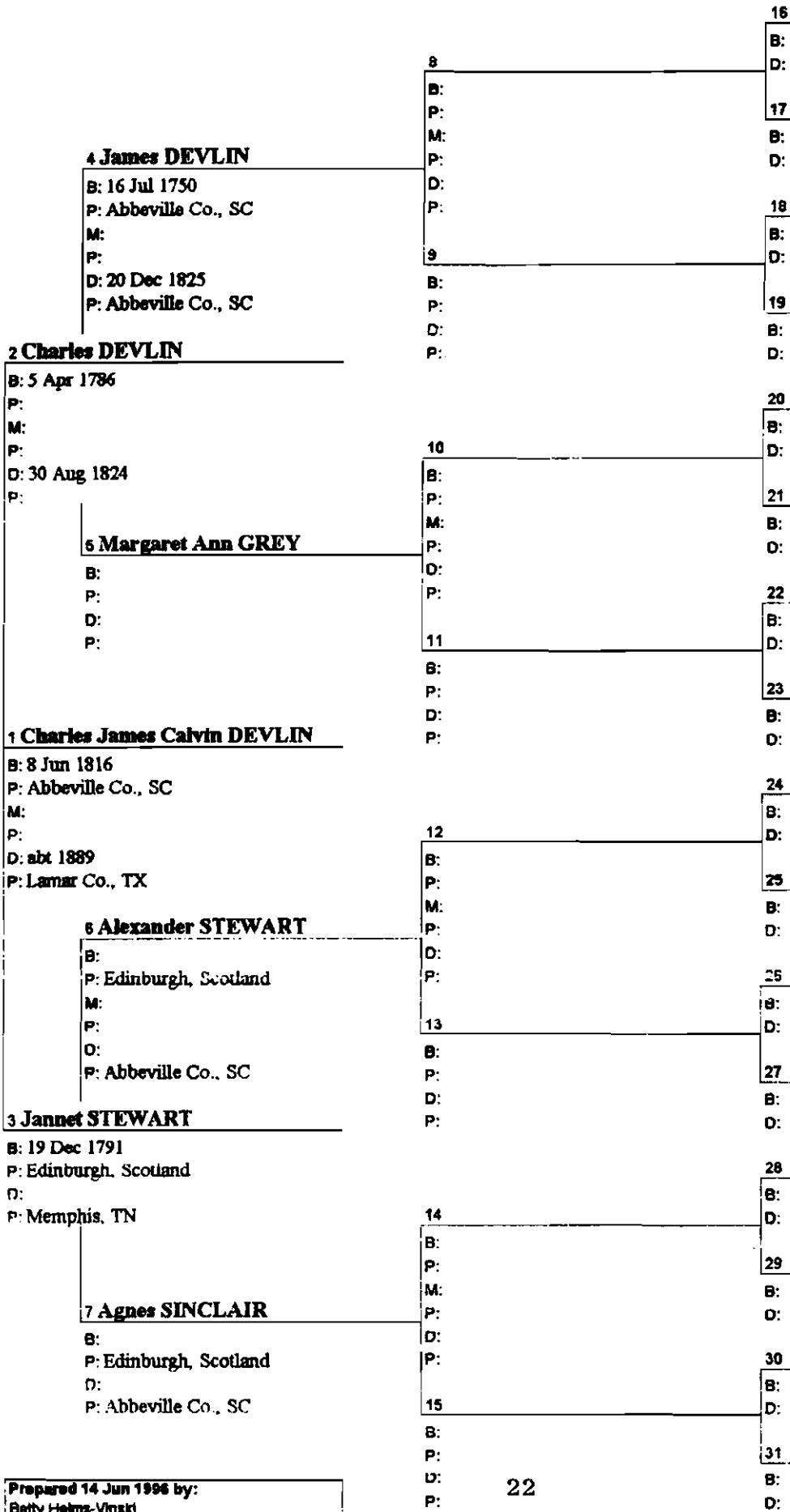

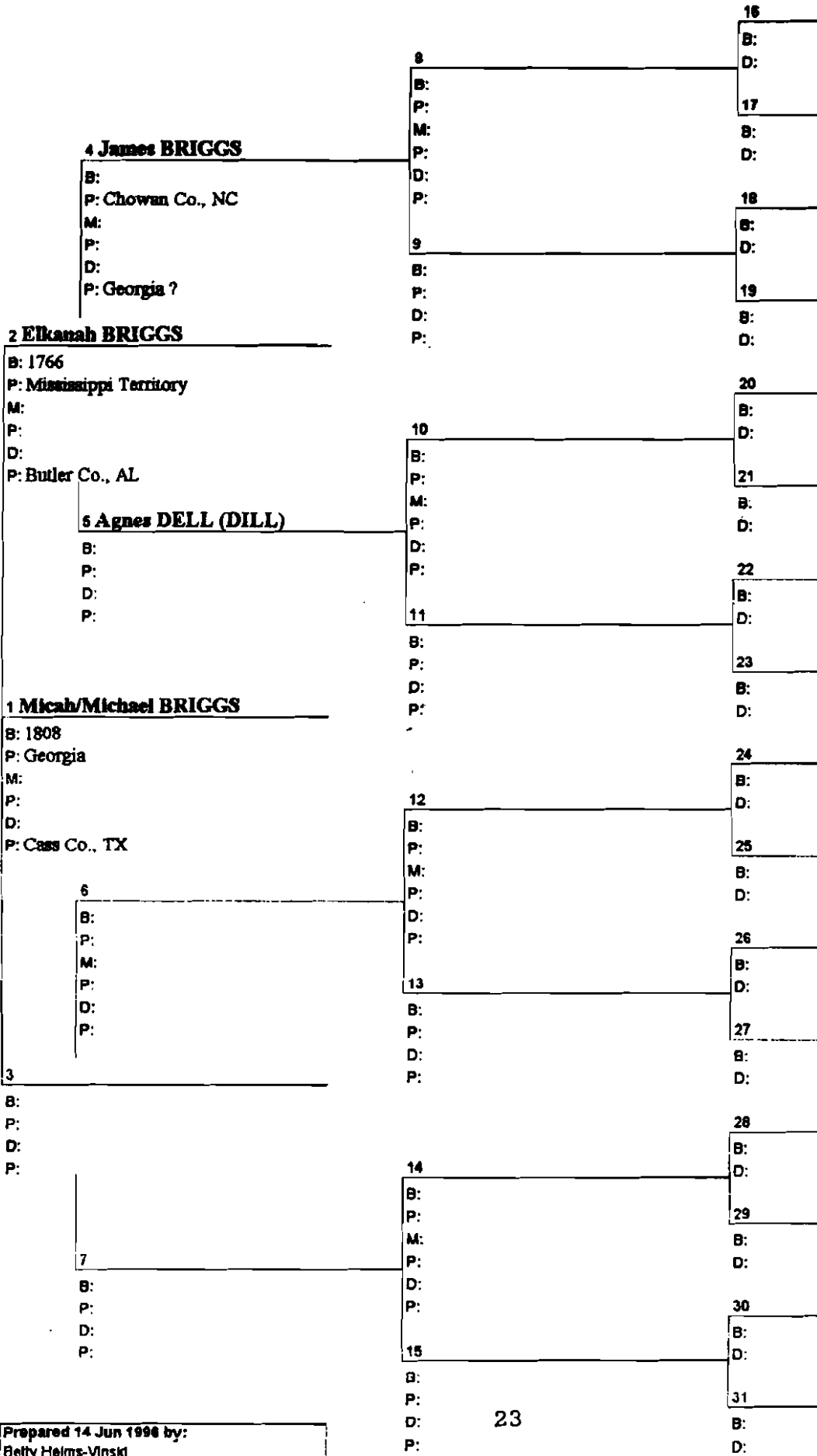

QUAKERS IN SOUTH CAROLINA

Quakers have been in South Carolina since the late 1600s. About two-thirds of the Quakers were located in the Carolina Piedmont region during the period from 1750 to 1820. In 1801 most Friends began to leave for the Midwest because of their opposition to slavery.

Many of their membership which did not leave the South joined the Baptists and the Methodists which were enjoying a swell in membership during this same period. Many of their descendants do not have any idea that these families had roots in the Quaker movement.

More complete genealogical data on Quaker families may be found in Hinshaw's *Quaker Genealogy* (North Carolina volume) or in William F. Medlin's *Quaker Families of South Carolina and Georgia*.

Castle Fraser

Castle Fraser in Aberdeenshire, considered by many to be the most spectacular castle in an area famed for its castles, was opened to the public last year.

The President of the National Trust for Scotland, the Earl of Wemyss & March, paid tribute to the generosity of its former owners, Major and Mrs. Michael Smiley for "the immensely generous gift to the nation which they have made through the Trust in the shape of this magnificent building and the munificent endowment which they have given with it".

At the same time, they entered into a conservation agreement to secure for all time the amenities of the surroundings of the castle. In addition, Mrs. Smiley added a personal gift—the redecoration of the dining room.

Acceptance of the castle was facilitated by financial assistance from the Scottish Tourist Board, with grants towards the cost of capital works necessary to adapt the building to its new role, and the establishment of an exhibition telling the story of the 'Castles of Mar' from Norman times.

Castle Fraser was begun about 1575 and took nearly thirty years to complete, and was lived in by the Fraser family until 1921.

In that year it was sold with its contents to Viscount Cowdray; his second son, The Hon. Clive Parson, father of Mrs. Smiley, did much towards its restoration. Of late years only the two low wings have been inhabited, but the main block has been maintained in excellent condition. Major and Mrs. Smiley will continue to live in the home they have created in the Establishment Stables.

Some years ago, a piece of cloth with a tartan pattern in two shades of brown was found in a jar of coins in Bell's Meadow, Falkirk. It was dated at about 245 A.D. and is believed to be the oldest piece of true tartan cloth in existence. This ties in with contemporary writings from the Roman occupiers of Britain in which mention is made of "Caledonians" wearing loth with coloured horizontal and vertical lines in various patterns.

New Books from **HERITAGE BOOKS, INC.**

Cartwrights of the Southern United States - Connie Cartwright Kwasha. Genealogies are always enhanced by thorough documentation, scholarly research, well-organized information, lucid writing and creative speculation, but rarely does one find all of these qualities tied up in one package. Ms. Kwasha's outstanding new book would certainly qualify as one of the valuable exceptions.

Providing a wide overview of the Cartwrights who were present in the areas of Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina and Tennessee during the early years of North American colonization, Ms. Kwasha has divided this book into two parts. The first deals with the Cartwrights of Maryland as descended from Matthew Cartwright, born c.1634 in Holland. The second deals with the Cartwrights of Princess Anne County, VA, and Pasquotank County, NC, as descended from John Cartwright, born c.1600. Both lines are followed to seven generations.

Each part begins with a genealogical outline, which serves the reader as a point of reference for individuals covered in later chapters. Many relevant documents and records, including several wills never before published, have been transcribed. Among these records, as elsewhere throughout the text, Ms. Kwasha adds her own parenthetical

observations about the significance or implications of the information being recorded. Drawing from many varied sources, the author's careful analysis has eliminated many errors from works of previous researchers, and the result is a more comprehensive single volume of Cartwright genealogy than is available elsewhere. This broad, easy to read compilation of data should be an enormous help to anyone who is interested in the vast maze of Cartwrights or their allied lines, such as Albertson, Burroughs, Davidson, Jones, Rogers and Tippet.
