MCCARLEY/MACKORELL

This concerning my research of my McCarley and Mackorell ancestors. These individuals include:

Robert McCarley, "Planter." Born Ireland, 1820. Husband of Margaret McCarley. Born Ireland, 1920. They would have immigrated during the period 1841 and 1844, and were living in Fairfield District by the year 1850. Daughter <u>Jane Beard McCarley</u> was their first child, born in Ireland in 1840. Their son <u>John McCarley</u> was born in 1845 in Fairfield District, followed by daughter <u>Susannah</u> in 1848 in Fairfield.

John C. Mackorell, "Grocer and Dry Goods Merchant." Born Ireland, ca. 1830. Husband of Jane Beard McCarley Mackorell (see above); son Robert J. b. 1860; daughters Annie (or Amy) b. 1864; Margaret b. 1866; Martha b. 1868; and Susan b. 1870. The children were born in South Carolina. The family had settled in Fairfield District (Winnsboro?) by the year 1870. They were active members of Concord Presbyterian Church, at least by 1880. Deacon John and Jane are buried at Concord. I have recently written to the Historical Foundation at Montreat regarding those church records.

The present mystery focuses on the year of immigration and imminent locale of John C. Mackorell and the whereabouts of John and Jane in the first few years of their marriage. Apparently, John immigrated with two (younger brothers?) no earlier than 1851. I have no earthly idea how John and Jane would have been introduced to each other! While they would have married about the year 1858, there is no enumeration of John, Jane and son Robert in the 1860 Fairfield census.

My inquiry regards any existing information relating to this era of Fairfield County history, including published research, local archives and the local newspaper archives. Can I find naturalization papers at the courthouse? There are no estate papers for John or Jane filed with the Fairfield County Probate Department.

His name was **Philip A. Odell**, Co. B 4th Tenn Cav. According to a letter from the Co. physician, he was struck by a bullet at the home of a Mrs. Weldon of Winnsboro with a Mr. R.F. Milles or Miller volunteering to look in on him.

Philip died five days later and a letter from Mrs. Weldon indicated he was buried at a cemetery beside a church near her home. Instructions given the family regarding a route to her place was via Morganton & Shelby, NC and then to Chester, SC. Supposedly, the Weldon home was on the "Augusta-Winnsboro road" five miles from Winnsboro. I hope you can put me in touch with someone who can help. I would like to visit his grave.



History of the Town Clock



The most familiar landmark in old Winnsboro is the TOWN CLOCK. The building is truly in the very heart of the community, being located in the town square near the courthouse. It was primarily built to house the public market, but because of the fact that its tower housed the clock and belfry, it soon became known to the citizens as the "Clock" instead of the "Market".

As early as 1785 there was a public market in Winnsboro. It was a square, wooden building with a tower at one end to house the bell which was used as an alarm for fires, danger, curfew, special announcements, and last but not least, "butchering days" - to let the inhabitants of the village know that fresh meat was available. An old anecdote abut this is still told in Winnsboro. In the olden times when the town bell would ring, the dogs from all over the countryside would make a dash to market for their share of the bones and

scrapes. This old building was located on the corner of Washington Street.

During the 1820's Robert Cathcart purchased the old market building and with the deal donated his duck pond and some land in the center of Washington Street for the new market. The Town Council then petitioned the Legislature for authority to erect a new building which would house a town clock. The petition was granted on one condition, that being, "provided the building be no more than thirty feet in width."

The new building was erected in 1833, and colonel William McCreight, Intendant, ordered the works for the new clock in 1837 from Alsace, France. They were landed in Charleston and hauled to Winnsboro in wagons. It took 50 wagons and three weeks to make the trip to Charleston and back. The works are of superior quality for the clock has run continuously for more than 150 years and proudly holds the record of having been in constant use longer than any other town clock in the United States.

The bell was made in France, with silver in its composition. It was used until 1895 when during a fire it was rung so vigorously that it was cracked and had to be sent to Philadelphia for repairs. When it was finally returned, the tone was so changed that it is doubtful whether or not this is the original bell. The cord of the bell still hangs over the stairway, but the bell is only rung on very special occasions.

The clock had very heavy iron weights and was wound by a windlass with large wire cables, the pendulum is said to be copper; however, it has the appearance of iron. The clock was wired to run electrically several years ago as no one wanted the chore of climbing the steps to the tower to wind it.

The market house was built to specifications in width with one large room on the ground floor, two small rooms with one on each side of the front entrance, which were used as Guard Houses, where breakers of the law were restrained. The public market occupied the long room on the ground floor. The second floor served as a Town Hall.

The walls of the building are 8, 12, and 18 inches thick, and the tower 18 and 14 inches in width. The molding around the top of the rooms is part of the original plastered walls. There are 12 windows on the main floor with 12 over 12 panes. The original mantle still adorns the fireplace. Christian doors are used, and the lower floor had double half-doors with large circular panels of glass above them. The front entrance door also has the fan shaped panel of glass overhead, as seen in many of the old homes in Fairfield county.

The "S" shaped irons on each side near the top of the ground floor are iron braced or brackets that hold the heavy earthquake rods that can be seen from the side.

The steps and landing of the building are made from granite quarried in Fairfield County.

The clock tower was repaired in 1875 and the present tower was erected. The carpentry was done by John Smart, a Winnsboro Negro carpenter. In spite of the cracked bell and repairs to the tower, the old clock has run continuously for over 150 years.

The grand old building has been home to Fairfield County Chamber of Commerce since 1945. The large meeting room on the ground floor is used for many events and is one of the voting precincts for the County and Town of Winnsboro.

My desire is to secure data about <u>RADAMANTHAS M. BOATWRIGHT</u> (my line comes through him) (B ca. 1818-1822 in TN). His unknown father died during or before 1829 as his mother, MARY ANN, was listed in Wilkes Co., Georgia records as "WIDOW BOATWRIGHT, mother of RADAMANTHAS, CHESLEY AND JAMES, who was now ISAAC HOPKINS' wife" (married on 4 July 1827 in Wilkes CO., GA.). RADAMANTHAS may have had two other siblings: MARY (who married BENJAMIN DUNAWAY) and PHOEBE (who married ZADOCK SMITH).

RADAMANTHAS married twice: 1. MARGARETTE G. SEALE (sister to NANCY who married JOSEPH SHEPHERD) on 25 Feb. 1841 in Wilkes Co., GA. She died ca. 29 Feb 1860. (My line comes through her). 2. MARY E. SHORT on 12 April 1864 in Wilkes Co., GA. She died 1 Nov 1906. RADAMANTHAS died on 22 October 1889 and is buried at Sardis Baptist Church in Rayle, Wilkes Co., GA.



FINDING YOUR ANCESTORS IN PLACES WHERE YOU NEVER THOUGHT TO LOOK

After a certain period of time in your genealogical odyssey you will feel that you have exhausted all the usual avenues of inquiry in trying to unravel a particular family line, the usual ones being Census Records; State Birth, Marriage, and Death records; County Probate Records; Military Records. All to no avail.

Then it is that genealogy becomes a real challenge, and then it is that you need to exercise your ingenuity. Where to go? What to do? Is there hope? As many old-timers know, it is at this stage that our tendency is to turn to another line and work there for awhile. Therefore, this stage may last for quite a few months - years, it may well be.

But, we are invariably drawn back to our "problem" line. We are thinking . . . Where do we go? Here we will list some places. These are only a few ideas. With a little imagination, you may expand the list.

Birth Records: Cities and Counties sometime kept these records long before states

began to do so.

Death Records: Some Cities recorded deaths many years before states. Large city

cemeteries with sextons often kept a record with cause of death

and family connection.

City Directories: Households were listed by streets and usually listed separately

each person who was employed, including boarders. They were printed every year and are good references between federal census listings. They are more accurate as to neighbors, and give specific.

house addresses.

Census Goodies: Look more carefully at the detailed information given in the

Federal Census, especially 1880 and after. There are some good

clues here.

Land Records: Land sale records can be most useful, especially in the absence of

Will and Estate Settlement Records, or in the case of "lost" ones.

Some delicious genealogical tidbits can be found here!

Military Records: Information may be given in Pension Application records that is

not available any where else. Even if you know about the military service, do not fail to read what great-grandma had to say

about grandpa's service and her connection with him.

Family Memorabilia: Make yourself a worry-wart about this. Get this stuff copied before

some first cousin twice removed dumps it in the trash. Diaries and Datebooks may have rich materials with valuable clues.

Old Newspapers: Items that would never make it today, were found of reader

interest years ago. Do not neglect the Classifieds!
