## CONFEDERATE GENERALS OF FAIRFIELD COUNTY

There were 425 official Confederate generals. Eight attained the rank of full general, seventeen became lieutenant generals, seventy-two were major generals and the remaining 328 were brigadier generals. Forty-eight were born in South Carolina, twenty died in South Carolina and twenty-eight are buried in the state. \*

Brigadier General John Bratton is the only general buried in Fairfield County; born in Winnsboro in 1831 and died January 12, 1898. He is buried in St Johns Episcopal cemetery in Winnsboro. He was married to Elizabeth Porcher Dubose (1838-1875), daughter of Theodore Samuel Marion Dubose and Jane S. Porcher. Seven infant sons are buried nearby as well as William Dubose Bratton, MD (1860-1897) who became a surgeon in the United States Marine Corps.

Brigadier General Adley Hogan Gladden was born in Fairfield District in 1810. He died April 12, 1862 near Corinth, Mississippi six days after being wounded at Shiloh, Tn.
