- Research Library activities: assisted walk-ins (845 visitors) and researched email request (Alert: open Tuesdays through Fridays 10-5, now closed on Saturday – Monday, Saturdays now only available by appointment), purchased BookCat (Frankie and Linda, have started cataloging library collections; this will aide in researchers; just like card catalog in public library), step ladder, 3 bookshelves, bookends, flash drives (for sale) and supplies to get color printer working donated by Debbie Lewis, developed template emails and letterhead, developed mail handling procedure, Linda and Shelbia have developed beginnings of a research resource guide, started ground work in obtaining society's own State Surplus ID, Suzanne J. presented us a completed Index for our Slave Narrative Collection, Suzanne donated additional books for our library collection
- Involved in community activities: Senior Awareness Day, Art on the Ridge Arts Festival, Fairfield County Council, Fairfield Community Coordinating Council, SCGS quarterly meeting, Reunion of Upcountry Families, Frankie is now on Old English Tourism Commission and has presented them with new updated brochures to be placed in Welcome Centers and Chamber of Commerce locations, purchased 6-foot plastic table and clip boards to aide with work at booths

Jon gives an account of the Cemetery Committee's hard work identifying abandoned cemeteries later in this newsletter.

I would like to introduce the newly redesigned website of the Fairfield County Chapter of the South Carolina Genealogical Society. For various technical reasons, we decided to move our website off the South Carolina Genealogical Society's host and obtain our own hosting account and domain name. The new website is located at the web address listed above.

I would like to encourage everyone to visit the new website. The website has a new look and feel which I hope will provide an improved aesthetic experience. I did a lot of work behind the scenes to optimize the site - reducing the size of the code and files - to make it load faster and to make it easier to maintain in the future.

If you go to the old website, you will see a page informing you that the website has moved and providing a link for you to click to go to the new site. Please update your bookmarks or favorites to point to the new website at the url listed above.

External links (links to other websites) that were formerly on the main menu have been moved to "Other Resources" and renamed in some instances (e.g "Cemetery Finding" becomes "Find Cemeteries"). All external links should open in a new tab or window. That enables people to close the tab when finished and still be on our site in the first tab. This facilitates navigation, and makes use of the "Back" button unnecessary. If you find any that don't behave this way, let me know.

I have added a page on the Genealogy Library which was not on the original site.

Plans are to add a "Newsletters" page with a short excerpt from an article in the current newsletter and a link to the entire current newsletter. All older versions of the newsletter are archived in the Members-Only section and are searchable via a search-engine. The members-only section also includes records from Harden Funeral Home (1932-1957), Bible Records compiled by Miss Florence Feaster, and an index to Fairfield County Bonds and Mortgages (1785-1841). # A funny anecdote from "Edrington's History of Fairfield"

Old Bolin Wright came from Virginia and settled about a mile west of Liberty Church, where he died. He was a revolutionary soldier. The most notable of his children were William Wright, a Baptist preacher of the old school, and Uriah S. Wright, who was noted in his day and time as a "home doctor" and was called by nearly everyone, Dr. Wright. His practice was not confined to Fairfield, but Chester, Union and Newberry counties demanded and had his services. He was eccentric, erratic and generous. He was a great fox hunter and what he did not know about fox-hunting was left out of the spelling book.

In 1860, Major T. W. Woodward was a candidate for the Legislature, and stopped with a relative who lived near the "Corner", and on inquiring for the names of those living around, he was told to call on old Wright by all means. "Old Uriah is a fox-hunter, and I am sure you (the Major was a fox-hunter, too) can talk enough about dogs to secure his vote." "Well, give me some points about the pack," said the Major. "Ring Smith is his best strike and Jolly Wright his coldest trailer, and Molly Clowney his swiftest runner," he was told. The Major, having obtained a description of these

dogs, so there would be no difficulty in identifying them, made it convenient to call on old Uriah the next day about dinner time.

Old Uriah had just come in from ploughing as the Major rode up to the gate. "That is what Jonathan D. and the boys around here calls me."

"My name is Woodward, and I am a candidate for the Legislature, and being a young man on my first political legs, I am going to see and be seen, if not by everybody, certainly by the most prominent and influential citizens of each section."

"Git down, you a monstrous likely man, and I'll take you to see Pinkey (his wife), and we will see what she has to say about it."

The Major descended and was going into the house to see "Pinkey", the while discussing the crops with old Uriah, when he paused a moment and, turning in the direction of some hounds who were lying around in the shade, he said, "Dr. Wright, I am a very peculiar man. I love the ladies dearly, it is true, and yet, I hope, sir, you will pardon my weakness, - - a fine hound dog comes nearer perfection in my eye than any earthly object."

"And what do you know about dogs?" asked old Uriah, turning from the house and following the Major who had gone in the direction of the dogs and was already seated at the foot of a large white oak, with the whole pack around him. He had little difficulty in selecting the dogs of note from the description given him the night before, and after some general comments on dogs he said, "What is the name of this dog?.... Ah, Ring Smith you say? An uncommonly fine dog he seems to be - if there any truth in signs, he ought to be a might strike."

"Good strike, did you say? If there were four thousand dogs here, I would bet a million dollars that Ring Smith would open three miles ahead of the best hunter in the bunch, and you might go before a magistrate and swear that it was a fox when he opened," was old Uriah's reply.

The Major was now intently examining a large pale black and tan dog which filled the description of Jolly Wright - the coldest dog - feeling his nose and walking around, he eyed him intently. "Dr. Wright," said he at last, "I think this is one of the most remarkable dogs I have ever seen, just look at that head and feel his nose; I honestly believe this is the coldest dog I have ever seen."

"Coldest, did you say? Why, he can smell 'em when they have been gone three and four weeks, and if the fur ain't good he won't open on 'em then."

Molly Clowney had been easily recognized and now came in for her turn.

"Here ought to be the very apple of your eye," said the Major, "for if I do not know anything about dogs, this is unquestionably the fleetest footed animal I have ever met. Tell me now, truthfully, can't she out-run anything in these parts?

"Run, did you say? No, she can't run a bit; but there ain't a crow, nor a turkey-buzzard that ever crossed 'the corner' that can hold a light to her a-flyin. I have seen her treed against many of 'em. Dinner is about ready, and I want Pinkey to meet you."

The Major was taken into the house and introduced to Mrs. Wright. "Ain't he likely, Pinkey? Just look at him!" and the old man led him around the house like a fine horse at a fair. "And smart! Why, he has forgot more than all the other candidates ever knowed. I am sure he must close kin to old preacher Billy Woodward, for I heard my daddy say he was the smartest man in the world, and he knowed what he was talking about."

After dinner, the Major having promised to introduce a bill for the benefit of tired dogs, providing that no fence should be over five rails high, was in the act of leaving when "Old Uriah" called Pinkey to bring his fiddle, saying, "Hold on 'til I

play "The Devil's Dream" for you." When he finished his piece, "One good turn deserves another," said the Major, "I'll play a tune for you before I go," and taking up the fiddle, he rendered "Hell Broke Loose in Georgia" with such spirit and skill that "Old Uriah" jumped up, hugged Pinkey, and cut the pigeon wing all over the room.

It is needless to say that the Major got "Old Uriah's" vote.

# SLAVE NARRATIVES FROM FAIRFIELD COUNTY

Born in Slavery Slave Narratives from the Federal Writer's Project, 1936-1938

Suzanne Johnson presents Eddie Killian with copy of all of her hard work indexing the Fairfield Narratives.

*Born in Slavery: Slave Narratives from the Federal Writers' Project, 1936-1938* was compiled and indexed by Suzanne Parfitt Johnson in April of 013 on behalf of the Fairfield County Chapter, South Carolina Genealogical Society. This notebook includes the sixty-five narratives conducted by interviewer W.W. Dixon of former slaves living in Fairfield County, South Carolina, as well as other interviews of African Americans who were former slaves from Fairfield County, though not living there when the interviews were conducted.

The index, which follows the narratives, in addition to all interviewees (indicated by bold type) and others mentioned individually, includes a number of subjects, among which are Churches, the Earthquake of 1886, Patrollers, Plantations, Families, Emancipation, Red Shirts, Sherman's Troops in Fairfield County and the Tornado of 1880.

Researchers will find a large number of white and African-Americans mentioned in the Slave Narratives.



# SHIELD HISTORY

The Fundamental Constitution, that body of laws composed by the philosopher John Locke, under with which the Lords Proprietors governed-or misgoverned their province of Carolina, established America's only native hereditary nobility. The title of Landgrave and the lesser title of Cacique were awarded, along with enormous tracts of land, to deserving English gentlemen, some of whom actually immigrated to Carolina and remained here. It was necessary, of course, to maintain records of births,

deaths, marriages, and genealogies, since the titles were inalienable and were intended to exist in perpetuity. This responsibility fell to an officer whose duties were much like those of a member of the English College of Arms. He was to register and grant coat armor in Carolina, he was to maintain genealogical records, and he was called "the Carolina Herald". To distinguish Carolina heraldry from that of England, the shields were centered upon a sunburst, with its straight and wavy rays symbolizing both heat and light.

Time passed, and with it, the Lords Proprietors, the Fundamental Constitution and the Carolina Herald himself. In 1670 Carolinians were much too busy securing their toe-hold on this continent to be concerned with genealogy and heraldry; and so the Carolina Herald was ignored, then forgotten. We of the South Carolina Genealogical Society see ourselves as his successors, in a sense, and so it is in his honor that we have named our publication The Carolina Herald, and have taken as an indentifying symbol a shield, centered upon a sunburst, with a (family) tree displayed upon the shield.

# June 20 – Photographing your ancestor's grave stone and putting it on "Find A Grave" site.

Fairfield local historians and genealogists have transcribed inscription information concerning their ancestor's lives and burials for generations. Many of these handwritten and typewritten efforts are now being entered into databases, some of which are available online. The latest innovation is the use of photography to create a photographic record of both the inscription and the carvings on your ancestor's tombstones. By inserting a picture of the headstone as part of the database, you are able to see what actually appears on the stone including both the epitaph and the artistic carving. It is a record of what the cemetery marker looks like before further damage occurs or the stone disappears.

The Fairfield Genealogical Society is pleased to offer a short workshop on photographing one's ancestor's grave and possibly recording it on a national data base site, **Find A Grave**.

Jon Davis and Debbie Van Sant will conduct this 11:00 a.m. workshop on June 20, 2013. Jon will start at the Sion Presbyterian Cemetery on the corner of Washington and Garden Street in Winnsboro. This cemetery was chosen because of the easy access to some very old tombstones. Persons attending are asked to park along Garden Street near the entrance to the graveyard.

Jon will be covering things that you can do to get better pictures of your ancestor's tombstones. Some of the items Jon will discuss are:

things you may need to take with you the best time of year to take pictures best time of the day to take pictures methods that will improve your results (such as rubbing, chalk and using a mirror) do and don't while taking these pictures.

After a short session in the cemetery, all will be asked to go to the Christ Central Community Center at 235 Congress Street in Winnsboro to finish Jon's session with additional informative photos and to hear Debbie Van Sant talk about her experience with the national database program, **Find A Grave.** She will also talk about how one becomes a contributor for this on-line database program.

Instead of traveling to your homeland, cemeteries, research libraries, etc., you can now search thousands of records online. Ancestry.com just finished uploading U.S Census records for 1790-1930. You can search Ellis Island immigration lists from home – and more records are added each day.

You always start with knowns and go piece by piece. A family pedigree chart is an excellent start. Census records are a valuable source that shows clues such as age, occupation, the year your ancestors immigrated and much more.

Some web sites are free such as FamilySearch.org while others are fee-based.

Finding Your Roots – The Family History Center in Salt Lake City is a genealogy buff's Mecca, but the center also runs 4,000 branch libraries around the world. The local centers are staffed by volunteers, including the subscription-only Ancestry.com database. A small fee covers photocopies, printouts or copying and postage if you want microfiche sent from the Utah headquarters.





# Extra! Extra! Chronicling America Reaches Six Million Pages!

As of Monday, March 18, 2013, the team at the Library of Congress has made some enormous improvements to *Chronicling America: Historic American Newspapers*. Adding over 800,000 new pages to the database, the site now holds over 6 million pages of freely available and full-text searchable historic newspapers from 1836-1922! This update includes new content from states already represented on the site, papers from new states (Indiana and North Dakota), and newspapers in French and Spanish from Louisiana, Arizona, and New Mexico. The update contains around 33,000 new pages from South Carolina, including some additions to titles already on the site as well as some brand new titles. It also includes the first content from the South Carolina to predate 1860,

Edgefield Advertiser (Edgefield, S.C.), 1836-1863 This expands upon the run of the Edgefield Advertiser that was already available on Chronicling America from 1863 to 1922.

The upgrade to *Chronicling America* also brings about some enhancements to the layout and functions of the website. Two noticeable changes can be seen when looking at a single newspaper page. The viewer now has a thumbnail of the newspaper page in the upper right hand corner; when zooming in and out on a page, this thumbnail image helps provide further navigation. Beneath the image, a full citation for that particular page is listed, including the page's persistent link.

Many other changes were put into place including additional support for viewing the site on iPhones and iPads as well as lots of upgrades behind the scenes. Working with a major genealogy company, OBA aims to create a platform where African American researchers will be able to, view and download copies of records with the click of a button. The service is provided free of charge and there is no limit to the numbers of pages/records that can be digitized; the more the better.

Use these sites to find obituaries, cemeteries and other traces of your departed ancestors.

# American Battle Monuments Commission

If you have military ancestors buried in US cemeteries abroad, this is the place to find them. The site covers 24 overseas military cemeteries with almost 125,000 American war dead, plus Tables of the Missing that memorialize more than 94,000 US servicemen and women.

# Ancient Faces \$

This collection of nearly 50,000 old family photos also offers family stories and recipes, plus Family Spaces Web pages on which to share them (starting at \$29.95 a year).

# Cemetery Surveys

View nearly 240,000 burial records, many with photos of the actual headstones; the site is richest in coverage for the southeastern United States. You can even import your finds into Google Earth

# DeadFred \$.

A longtime favorite, this genealogy photo archive has helped more than 1,400 people reunite with pictures of their ancestors. It's free to search the archive of more than 92,000 records representing more than 16,000 surnames. Paying members (\$19.95 a year) get customization options and enhanced photo posting.

# Find a Grave

This simple-yet-powerful cemetery database has grown to more than 31 million grave transcriptions. You can search by name (with options for maiden names and partial surnames), birth date, death date or cemetery location, or browse a cemetery for people you think might be your ancestors. There's also a surname index and the Social Security Death Index.

#### Interment.net

Though smaller than Find a Grave, Interment.net is likewise worth a look—its user-submitted gravestone records cover cemeteries that no longer exist, along with graveyards beyond the United States. Special collections cover veterans' cemeteries, flooded cemeteries, California mission graveyards and Woodmen of the World burials.

#### Mortality Schedules.com

Don't you just hate it when you find an inconsiderate ancestor who died right before the next census? Now you can track him or her with the help of this site: It provides free transcriptions of the 1850, 1860, 1870 and 1880 census mortality schedules, in which enumerators recorded information on all people who perished within the 12 months preceding the census.

# Nationwide Gravesite Locator

This Department of Veterans Affairs Web site—a domestic counterpart to the aforementioned American Battle Monuments Commission site—searches burial locations of veterans and their family members in VA National Cemeteries, state veterans cemeteries and various other military and Department of Interior cemeteries. It also includes veterans buried in private cemeteries where the grave is marked with a government grave marker.
