Hello everyone!

Hope all is well with you and you have had many successes in finding your family genealogy and DNA roots over the holidays. We have had a great year (2015) and have enjoyed meeting and assisting our new and old genealogy research friends and members. Thanks for all the support and efforts of our board and other local members. Through their efforts, I believe we have met our mission and goals to bring success in growing each one's family trees and giving out a dose of old time, friendly Southern Hospitality this past year. I see nothing changing this year!

This year (2016) has started out very busy with our Board meeting in January and giving approval of our new objectives. With the purchase of our new scanners; one high speed 8½" by 17" scanner (does both sides at one pass, skipping blank pages) for creating searchable PDF documents from our Family Files; and one 13" by 19" scanner for creating searchable PDF documents from our documents like our scrapbooks. These new scanners have provided the means to concentrate on our new first and second quarter objectives of getting more of the collection digitized and available to our members on our web site, members only Family pages. We have been working as time permits and we will have success, but as you all know, walk-in visitors and researchers get priority over back office work like digitizing our collection. February through April we will focus on digitizing our collection and keeping up with email request and researcher demands.

In February, we are planning on recognizing African-American History month with a program later in the month; check the web site announcement pages for details. We hope to have an update on the indexing Freedmen's Bureau microfilm information. We have also featured an article in our newsletter this month for Webster Anderson, Medal of Honor recipient from Winnsboro, Fairfield County, South Carolina.

An overview of some of the statistics this past year (2015) for researchers coming to Fairfield County Resource Library & Archives for assistance: Fairfield County down 8.8% (936 to 854), in-State up 10.4% (562 to 627), out-of-State up 30.9% (166 to 240), overall up 3.4% (1664 to 1721). These stats show that our in-State and out-of-State demand for research assistance is up considerable this past year and maybe due to our web and FACEBOOK presence and the word continuing to get our about us. Even though the Fairfield County stats are slightly lower, I believe we are still getting just as many or maybe even more Fairfield County visitors for research assistance. Stats are down because they are familiar with our facility and are not signing the quest register as faithfully as out-of-County or out-of-State visitors or researchers. Another factor this year for the 4th Quarter was the record October, November and December rainfall and floods. Our faithful volunteers have helped us keep up with increasing demand in resolving 240 out of 250 email research request this past year (2015). Full researcher visit statistics and email request can be found later in this newsletter.

Please send us an email letting us know your feedback or items you would like us to discuss at Board meetings. Local members, please continue to come and give us a hand as you can.



(A special remembrance of one of our own)







Born and raised in Winnsboro, Anderson is one of only eight to receive the highest honor ever awarded to military service personnel, the Congressional Medal of Honor. On October 15, 1967, while serving as Staff Sergeant of Battery A, 2nd Battalion, 320th Artillery, 101st Airborne Infantry Division in Tam Ky, Vietnam, the North Vietnamese attacked his unit's position.

Anderson, manning a howitzer on an exposed parapet, was severely injured when two grenades exploded at his feet. While unable to stand, he managed to prop himself up on the parapet and continue firing. Another enemy grenade landed in a gun pit near his wounded crew. Anderson retrieved the grenade and threw it, losing his hand in the process.

At the end of his official citation, it reads:

Sergeant Anderson's conspicuous gallantry and extraordinary heroism at the risk of his own life above and beyond the call of duty are in the highest traditions of the military service and reflect credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army.

CEMETERY COMMITTEE REPORTS

Kudos this month goes to Mike and Mark Mills of Glenn Associates Surveying, Inc. They gave us locations of six cemeteries. Two cemeteries had been documented, but the location was unknown. Four cemeteries were unknown and undocumented. We have been fortunate to have folks like Mike and Mark who continue to give us cemetery locations.

So far we have been able to document 21 cemeteries this winter. Eight of these were previously unknown and three had been documented but their locations were unknown.


The eight unknown cemeteries are: Joel McMeekin, Suber, Ferguson, Fair-Gaston, Entzminger, Johnson-McCants, Old Friendship AME and Able-Johnson. The three known cemeteries that were found are: Haygood, Winn and Shivar.





This cemetery is on property of the SCE&G Nuclear Power Plant. The present Friendship Church is located approximately two miles north. There are 10 marked graves and numerous unmarked graves. The known graves are: Victoria Brown, April 15, 1882-April 24, 1922; Mary Davis, August 13, 1857-May 16, 1923; Hariet Harts, July 23, 1850-August 7, 1917; Thomas Heller, Jr, December 29, 1897-September 8, 1916; Thomas Heller, May 8, 1834-June 5, 1915; Jaulan March, Died January 28, 1925 at 90 years; Martha McKenney, November 11, 1887-February 15, 1926; Catherine Suber, 1853-March 18, 1925; Clara Thompson, died 1915, and Abbie Towns, March 17, 1915-October 18, 1918

DEATH CLAIMS NATHANIEL SHIVAR

Nathaniel Frank Shivar, well known as the founder and head of the Shivar Springs Company of Shelton, Fairfield County, died yesterday morning about 9:30 o'clock at the Columbia hospital, where he had been ill since Sunday.

Mr. Shivar suffered from and attack of influenza and bronchitis two years ago and never seemed to recover his entire strength. An attack of kidney trouble last Sunday brought him to Columbia for treatment. His death brings real grief to large numbers of people throughout the South, who knew and admired Mr. Shivar during his life of usefulness.

Mr. Shivar was 58 years of age. He was the founder of the Shivar Springs Company. He was formerly a traveling shoe salesman. He was also proprietor of the Star Shoe Store situated in what was known as the Post Office block of Columbia 20 years ago. He later sold out this business and moved to Spartanburg, where he opened another large shoe store.

Mr. Shivar suffered ill health in his younger days and was advised to try the Shivar Springs water. He gave up traveling and went to Shelton to drink the water and regain his health. So impressed was Mr. Shivar with the health giving value of this water that he developed a plant and began to market the water. He developed a business in water and also a bottling establishment, which became known throughout the entire South and other parts of the country. The products of this establishment were shipped to all parts of the United States and the news of the death of the originator of this business will be learned with sorrow throughout the entire country.

Mr. Shivar is survived by his widow, Mrs. Ida S. Shivar, and one adopted daughter, Miss Eva Grace Sharpe, both of whom were at his bedside when the end came.

The funeral service will be held at Shelton this afternoon at 2 o'clock. The Rev. W. T. Derieux, D. D., and the Rev. A. J. Foster, both of Columbia and the Rev. C. W. Salter, pastor of the Shelton Baptist Church, of which Mr. Shivar was a member, will conduct the service. Interment will be in the family burial ground at Shelton.

Joel McMeekin Cemetery



Winnsboro – Joel McMeekin, a highly respected citizen of this community, was burned to death when his residence, near Strothers, was destroyed by fire. He is supposed to have become overcome by the smoke and found himself unable to leave the burning dwelling. Mr. McMeekin was 80 years of age. The origin of the fire is unknown.

This cemetery is located in the Jenkinsville Section of the county. The following graves were found:

DNA COMMITTEE REPORTS

EARLY SCOTS-IRISH FAMILIES IN BACK COUNTRY SC Compiled by Pelham Lyles

In conjunction with the March 17 celebration of St. Patrick's Day, I have drawn the facts in this article from sources in the Fairfield County Museum files, public pages of the web, and other resources. The man known as St. Patrick began life in the late 4th Century as the son of a Roman/Britton officer in either Scotland or England who, as a teenager, was kidnapped and sold into slavery in Ireland where his Christianization evolved from his prayers and dream visions. He became the patron saint of Ireland.

Likewise, many of America's waves of colonial period settlers called Scots-Irish came from the ports of England and Ireland where they had been displaced or banished by the English overlords who were intolerant of their "Dissenting" religious beliefs. A great number of these people were Dissenter and Covenanter families who had been transplanted to the Irish province of Ulster from northern England, the border counties, and Scotland. Smaller numbers of emigrants to Ireland also had come from Wales and the southeast of England, while others joining them in their move to America were Protestant religious refugees of other European groups adhering to Calvinist religious tenets.

This article pinpoints a small settlement group who came to SC from Antrim County, Ulster Province in the early 1770s. Many of these "Scots-Irish" in Fairfield County have descendants whose family names are still known in our area today, as will be seen in the lists below. Ulster/Antrim immigrants sought refuge in America in frontier settlements of Presbyterian congregations, either led or accompanied by their pastor. A Covenanting minister of the town of Kellswater, Rev. William Martin, came to South Carolina in 1772, bringing with him five shiploads of settlers who settled widely in the surrounding counties of Upcountry South Carolina, a large number of these families forming congregations in the eastern corner of Chester and the eastern part of Fairfield around Fishing Creek and Rocky Creek. The majority of them were probably from the vicinity of the villages of Ballymoney, Ballymena, Kellswater, Ballymena, Larne, Carrickfergus, Bushmills and Vow in County Antrim.

In 1750 Presbyterians from Octoraro, Virginia, and North Carolina, had already come to South Carolina and settled at Rocky Creek. By 1755, other Irish immigrants, many of them Covenanters, began arriving. Various Presbyterian splinter groups (Associate, Covenanter, Burgher, Anti-Burgher, Seceders) formed the "Catholic" (meaning a union of various groups of Presbyterians) church on Rocky Mount Road, 15 miles southeast of Chester. In 1770 Covenanters began holding society meetings and wrote to Ireland for a minister. Reverend William Martin answered the call in 1772, bringing around 1000 new settlers with him. He preached many times at Catholic Church which is still standing near the Fairfield and Chester County line. In this context, a Catholic church means a church made up by a union of various groups of Presbyterians. In 1774 the Covenanter/Seceders, under the leadership of Reverend Martin, withdrew from the Catholic congregation and built their own meeting house, a log building on the same road as the Catholic church, and two miles east of it.

The following information comes from the Journals of the South Carolina Council. The names are spelled as they were in the Council Journal, so no attempt was made to correct or interpret misspellings. The location noted is the modern day county that the land was probably located in, based on the description in the land surveys. Since the major distinguishing geographic feature in these land surveys was the river, stream, or creek that the land was located on, the modern county that that stream goes through is listed. This means that in many cases multiple counties are listed since the streams often cross through more than one county. In some cases no county is given, generally because the stream identified in the survey cannot be identified today, probably because the name has changed since 1772. The land in

America was to cost five pounds, and the acreage was determined by family size. If the immigrant had no money the land was free. Since, these were Scotsman and thrifty with their money, the book says that not too many of them could come up with the five pounds.

The lists are also exhibited in Jean Stephenson's book, Scotch-Irish Migration to SC, 1772 (Rev. William Martin and His Five Shiploads of Settlers), Clearfield Company (Washington, DC) 1971; reprinted by Genealogical Publishing Co. (Baltimore, MD) 2008. We have a copy of this book in our Fairfield County Museum genealogy collection and it is also accessible online as a Google book. The lists below show first name and surname, acreage of land grant, location, and size of family. The question mark indicates that the geographic location of the property could not be determined.

Her parent's names were Spencer and Mary Jones. They were owned by Elisha Jones who is married to Judith Jones. I believe Elisha's parents were Ralph and Mary Jones. Any info on Elisha Jones would be much appreciated.
	Here is some info that we found on Elisha Jones: He left a will that was dated December 16, 1843, so he probably died in 1844 His wife was Judith and he had two daughters: Dorcas who married William E. Hall and Jamima who married Allen R. Crankfield. In his will he left the following slaves; Spencer and his wife Mary and their children were left to his wife Judith Margaret about 12 and George about 10 were left to his grandson Elisha Hall Cynthia about 8 or 9 was left to his granddaughter Judith Hall John about 3 and Robinson about 1 was left to his grandson John Thomas Hall Ralph Jones left a will that was dated June 27, 1811 and proved on February 12, 1817 His wife was Mary His children were: Elisha, William, John, Elijah, Sarah who married a Pearson, Mary who married a Willingham, Phebe who married a McGraw and Catherine who married a Meredith The only item that Elisha was left was a Negro boy named March
Green, Pam	I recently reviewed the will of Anthony Raines (husband of Elizabeth Wilson) from Fairfield County SC who died in 1853. He left to his son James a slave named Chancy. My 3rd great grandfather named James Raines died in Louisiana in 1859 and he had at that time two slaves. A 60 yr old woman named Jude and a 14 year old girl named Chancy. My ggg-grandfather is listed on the 1850 & 60 census as coming from SC. He married Kezanna Duke (daughter of John D. Duke) in 1833 in Perry County AL, the same place that Anthony Raines's daughter Margaret Raines Coleman lived. I see several connections between the Raines, Wilson and Duke families, however, everything that I see online lists James Raines, son of Anthony, with a birth year of 1828. This obviously could not be correct for my James Raines if he married in 1833. Do you have any info on the actual birth date of Anthony's son James Raines? I was hoping that you might have something that would shed some light on this Raines family puzzle.
	Equity Court Records were used to settle estates that were in dispute usually because there was no will. In the Fairfield County Equity Court Records, Bill 1828-2 is the following:
	-Elizabeth Turner was the daughter of James & Sarah Young Turner and granddaughter of Hugh YoungShe married John Dukes -She was the sister of William, Alexander, John, Nancy who married James Gladney and Peggy who married James Martin
	Hugh Young left a will that was dated January 27, 1804 and Recorded on April 8, 1805. His wife was Margaret and he lists the following children: Sarah Young who married James Turner, Elizabeth Young who married John McDonald, Agnes Young who married Alexander Robison, Mary Young who married Patrick Gladney, Jane Young who married James Rosborough, Margaret Young who married John Neal, James

Young and Hugh Young.

In Equity Record 1828-2, it shows the same as above but stated that both James and Sarah Young Turner were dead as well as John and Elizabeth Young McDaniel.

Do **photos** of Fairfield County UCV (United Confederate Veterans) reunions exist, dated about 1900-1920? In particular, I am looking for photos of UCV Camp Raines, #698, of Winnsboro, SC, 1900-1920.

Sometimes newspapers photographed UCV reunions, and published the photographs. If any still exist, where might they be archived?

I have attached the 1910 News & Herald edition of the CV Reunion in Winnsboro and a

couple of photos we have.

As for the UCV reunion photo, I'm fairly certain I know which one is my grt-grandfather, Thomas G. Yarborough, Jr. (1846-1920). He was living when that photo was taken, was active in the local UCV camp (chapter), lived near Winnsboro, and he had very distinctive facial features. One of the veterans in the photo had the same distinctive facial features, though very faint in the photo. The pixels break up when I enlarge the photo for just the one face - but I'm 95% certain it's him.

Someday, I'd like to view the original. I believe I'd be able to confirm his identity, if I could use a magnifying glass to see the fine details, and verify it's the same distinctive feature - a vertical scar or deep vertical crease from under his eye, almost to his chin on his left cheek. This feature is faintly visible in the photo, matching other portraits we have of him when he was some years older. (He had been wounded in the head at Petersburg, VA).

I was able to find the 1910 News and Herald edition that has photos of some of the veterans (but not of T. G. Yarborough). As a longer-term project, it may be possible to match up the people in the group photo in front of the Courthouse with the portraits in the 1910 News & Herald edition, to identify most people in that group photo.

I do have a few additional questions. Some regarding general research topics and others on specific families. What books/ resources would you recommend I access for general information about the Saxe-Gotha Township? I have looked at the Wikipedia articles on-line, which provide a bare-bones overview on that subject. I was wondering if there are any more in-depth sources that might be recommended. No need to send copied pages, just the titles & authors of the books that you'd recommend, and I'll attempt to find them in the libraries in my corner of the country. As for more specific family info, does your Library, and/or an affiliate Library in a neighboring County have any research on the following families:

1) **Swicord** (also variously spelled: Swygert, Swikard, etc., etc.) They were early settlers in the Saxe-Gotha Township.

- 2) **Metz** (also spelled: Mitts, etc., etc.) Another early settler family in the Saxe-Gotha Township.
- 3) **McGraw** (descendants of Edward McGraw, Sr.) He was an early settler, and large property holder with a large number of children and descendants. Anything in your files on his family? And descendants?
- 4) Andrews (James, & his son, John) Anything in your files on this family?

We have very little on the Swicord (Swygert) and the Metz, you can onto our Web Site and find some info at other societies.

We do not have a lot on the McGraws; my wife was a descendant of Edward McGraw Sr. Her line is Edward Sr.; Edward Jr., Arthur, Rachel Caroline who married William Boyd; Barbara Ann Boyd who married Nathan D. Roberts; Fannie Roberts who married Albert Brown; Grover Brown and then my wife.

I have been working on her line and have some additional info on some of the other children of Edward Sr. It seems that most of the McGraws left Fairfield County by the mid 1850. We have a copy of the Letters and Some Personal Papers of Rev. Marshall McGraw (1792-1889). He was the son of Edward McGraw Jr. and Rhoda Starnes. There is a little info on the McGraw's in the records of Little River Baptist Church. Let us know which McGraw you are researching and we can be more precise.

We have a little on the James and John Andrews. We have a copy of the Bible records from an Andrews Bible. It appears to be the Bible of Edward Andrews, Jr. (1804-1877). We also have some ancestry charts on Edward Andrews, son of James, but nothing on John.

We have film of probate and land records for Fairfield County from 1785 to the late 1800's. There are wills for a James Andrews (recorded in 1798) and John Andrews (recorded in 1799), and numerous land records.

There is a book "The South Carolina Regulators" by Richard Maxwell Brown that has some interesting info on both the McGraw and Andrews Families.

Delleney, Jr., F. Greg

Information for **John Delleny**, Fairfield County.

In Fairfield County Equity Court Records, Petitions 1850-6, 1850-7 and 1851-1 and in Bill 1852-25:

John Delleny died in 1844

Catherine died in 1845, she was the daughter of James Nelson and sister of John, Jesse, Daniel and Harriet who married William Shedd

John and Catherine had two sons – John and Jesse

In 1850 Daniel Nelson was appointed the guardian of his nephew, Jesse who was 18 In 1850 Jesse T. Owens was appointed the guardian of John W. Delleney, aged 14, then in 1851 Daniel Nelson was appointed John's guardian.

Both John and Catherine died without a will; their estate papers do not indicate any relatives. In Bill 1831-1: William, Mary, Isabella and Elizabeth Delleney were siblings. In 1838 Isabella left a will and left everything to Mary and Elizabeth. John Delleney was the executor of her estate and Wm. Delleney was a witness. How these Delleneys relate to each other is unknown. There are several records of William Delleney buying and selling land, but we could not find any connection with John. Withrow, I am researching the Goings family in the American Revolution for a chapter in a book Scott on the Goins/Goings/Gowan/Gowen/Goyne family. The name was spelled any number of ways; some persons related even though their names were spelled differently, some not. One of the persons I am researching is Drury/Drewery Going, who lived in Chester County (Camden District); it appears near the confluence of Turkey Creek and Broad River. Someone with the Gowen Research Foundation wrote that he served under Francis Marion. I checked his Stub Indent, and see no indication of his being under Marion. (It may be a family story) Since he was from Chester County it appears he more likely served under Thomas Sumter. He lived not far from Fishdam Ford. According to records, he did at one time serve under Winn. I believe there were Colonels John Winn and William Winn, and General Richard Winn (sometimes referred to as Colonel Winn). I think likely he served under John Winn, but I am not sure. But, I wonder if Col. Winn and his men were ever placed with Marion, say at the Battle of Eutaw Springs? (See the 2 attachments on Drury Going.) Besides the fact that Drury Going fought under Winn there were other Fairfield Connections. James Goyne served in the South Carolina Militia, and according to on researcher for the Gowen Research Foundation, lived in Fairfield County. (3 attachments) I don't have it in front of me, but I believe I read of other Goings in Fairfield, perhaps Daniel Going(s). Dr. Bobby Moss, in his Roster of South Carolina Patriots in the American Revolution, lists (page 392) Drury Goins as Groins, Drury and states "He served in the militia during 1781 and 1782 under Col. Winn. A. A. 22924; 098." Dr. Moss states for James Goyne: "b. 30 My 1755, in Meckelenburg County, Va. While residing in Camden District, he was drafted during 1776 and served under Lt. William Daugherty, Capt. John smith, and Col. John Winn of the militia....... I don't whether Drury Going and James Goyne were related, despite the different spelling of their names. Both lived for a time in Chester County before James Goyne apparently moved to Fairfield, and both fought under Winn? I have much of the Gowen Research Foundation information Please find attached a (50 pages) PDF file with all of the Going, Goings, Goin, Goins, Gowen information found in our collection. Hunter. Check with lodge on George Ross Hunter's Mason Service Record William C. Check with Lee's in getting land owner's name for Ferguson Cemetery Check with owner and get permission for your visit in October

The Mason guys could not find anything. They said 1877 forward that a fire destroyed prior records. They said if 1877 forward, that they would find it and email a copy to us. I spoke with Rodney Lee's son and he said he would get a message to his dad. He sounded as if it would not be a problem. I told him about the Ferguson Reunion and that you would like to go back to the cemetery during this time, October 24th. We were able to go to cemetery during Ferguson Reunion, got GPS readings, check for other tombstones (none) and took new pictures. Does anyone know where Major George Ross Hunter is buried? His obituary does not mention where he is buried. His wife is buried at St. Stephen's. Tupper, My grandfather was from Fairfield County. His name was Joel Ashford Smith. He was Carolyn the son of Joel Ashford Smith (of Fairfield) and grandson of William Smith (I believe born in Spartanburg District, a son of William Smith from Pennsylvania) who moved to Fairfield District). William Smith married a Miss Ashford (possibly Mary, daughter of George Ashford, Jr. and Jemima Rabb?) of Fairfield District. In addition to Smith and Ashford, other Fairfield County ancestors include, Bookman (Marion Margaret - my great grandmother - wife of Joel Ashford Smith, Sr; daughter of Jacob Bookman and ??), Goodwyn, Chappell, Souter, Lever, Hamiter, Hendrix, Leitner and Turnipseed (I think), etc. Although some of the latter are from Northern Richland County. I have been able to gather quite a bit of information on my family via internet, several books, and North of the Broad River through USC's digital collection. I hate for you to spend time on information which I have already found, however, if you are able to validate what I have found that would be reassuring! Will it be possible for me to visit your library and meet with you when my number comes up? There are still many gaps in my family lines. Would also appreciate some guidance finding answers to several specific questions involving property and wills as I would love to chase down some family "lore." In addition, I have some things to share. A page from a family bible with the first entry dating back to Catherine Barbary Souter's birth on April the 17th 1788. Also a Souvenir Album that belonged to Maggie Bookman containing many signatures from friends at Laurensville Female College circa 1860. And a book of Extractions that belonged to Octavia Maud Smith Black. Carolyn came into resource library and we enjoyed her visit and were able to help her with her questions. Dunn, Tim First, let me say that the Dunn family article in your newsletter was great and that this is certainly a closely related Dunn family. I can tell both in the names and locations but also in the DNA results which are conclusive. I didn't see contact information for Stephen M. Dunn (the author of the article) but if you could provide me with a way to contact him I'd very much appreciate it. On the document(s) I'm looking for, my earliest known ancestor, Jesse Dunn (born in 1764 or before, place unknown, in SC by 1780 or before, died probably in Warren County, KY in 1823) appears in the estate papers of a Robert Gill. Jesse Dunn is among

those who are listed as owing money to Gill's estate. I'd like to get a copy of the papers showing all those who owed Robert Gill's estate. The previous researcher I worked with there--a lady whose name I can't recall--I think, told me that she had found Gill's estate papers at the Camden courthouse. Gill died in 1786 in Chester County. I've pasted below some information that talks about this same Robert Gill FYI. Thank you so much for your help. I would be happy to pay for this information so just let me know what you think. Because this may point to my Jesse Dunn having been in Chester County prior to Fairfield is very important and may link Jesse to the Dunns living in Chester County.

4. Robert Harvey Gill, Jr. born 1754 Lancaster, PA, died 9 or 24 Sept. 1786 Chester Co., SC, married Elizabeth Kelsey in 1771, who was alive in 1828.(ibid) He was a blacksmith. In Fishing Ck. Presbyterian Ch. Graveyard: Robert H. Gill died 24 Sept. 1786 in his 33rd year (b.1754). Mrs. Ellett states that this Robert was captured with his brother Thomas & taken to Camden, SC where Robert Gill died in 1780 (FOC, but see Accounts Audited records below). Records indicate that he married Elizabeth Kelsey in 1771. Hendleman states (p174) that he believes Robert Gill 1753-1787 buried at Fishing Ck. is a cousin. (Andrea record #13) Robert Gill 1775 land memorial brother to John Gill son of Robert. During 1779, Robert Harvey Gill served as a Sergeant under Capt. Whitesides and from 12 July 1780 served under Capt.s Alexander Pagan, John Mills, & Gen. Sumter. On 18 Aug. 1780 he lost a horse in action. He made swords for Sumpter's brigade & was taken prisoner at Black River while attempting to deliver the weapons (AA2832). (Mrs. Crowder) His wife states in her claim for compensation for swords made for Revolutionary forces that he left 5 children. Mrs. Crowder states: "Mrs. Ellett, Vol. III, p278, says that Robert was taken prisoner during the Revolution and died in Camden Gaol, but this is an error as see below." Robert Gill AA2632 SC Archives:

In 1784 this Robert Gill gave his order to Capt. John Mills authorizing him to collect his indent pay. This file has records of two different Robert Gills.

(Andrea record #75) Robert Gill Accounts Audited (SCDAH) #2632 and in 1784 Robert Gill gives an order to Capt. John Mills to collect his indent pay (FOC: not clear which Robert Gill should be assigned this record).

(Mrs. Hicks p11) Chester Co. Deed L-108 lists sons Thomas & John.

Mrs. Hicks p11 without listing source: Robert H. Gill died 24 Sept. 1786 in his 33rd year (reads like a tombstone inscription).

1787 Estate of Robert Gill (in Kershaw Co., SC) adm. by John Gill, Jr., and John Mills. Mr. Robert Gill, blacksmith. See 1828. Those owing the estate include: John Gill, Sr., John Gill, John Gill, Jr., Thomas Gill, George Gill, Sr., George Gill, Jr., Archibald Gill, **Hugh Gill** (and I thought the name Hugh never appeared among Chester Gills! -FOC) 1799 August 5 Elizabeth Gill received a State Land Grant in Pinckney Dist. for 31 acres, State Land Grant Index, Volume 45 page 383.

1828 Accounts Audited (SCDAH) #2632: 28 Nov. 1828 Mrs. Elizabeth Gill states that she is a widow of the late Robert Gill who was a blacksmith who died *after the war* leaving her a widow with five small and fatherless orphan children, and that while he was in the service he lost a horse at Sumter's Defeat. He was captured by the British at Camden Town and languished for a time in the Gaol there and this hurt his health. He and several of his brothers and cousins shed their blood for the cause of liberty (Andrea: there are more than 20 papers in this file for Robert Gill and I have condensed them much). Mrs. Margaret Morrow, his sister, (Andrea #8) has a statement on file stating she knew Robert Gill and that he was a blacksmith and that

General Sumter asked him to make swords for use of the men in his Army. Mrs. Mary Mills (his sister) makes a statement that the good blacksmith was commissioned by Gen. Sumter to make swords and that he had completed a load of swords and while taking them to Sumter was captured and the swords were seized by the British and that he never was paid for the swords and that his widow, Elizabeth should now be paid by the state. Thomas Gill, Robert Gill, and James Gill also make statements in similar vein. Peter Wylie, Wm. McMurthy or McGurthey, & George Gill also make statements about the load of swords captured and that the late Robert Gill received no pay for them. Robert and James Gill make statements about the horse lost at the battle of Camden and ask that the pay for the horse be given to Thomas Gill, son of the late Robert Gill, for his father had promised the horse to his son Thomas. "One widow, Elizabeth Gill (Mrs. Crowder: "and see her records in Chester -there seems little doubt that she is the widow of the Robert whose estate file is above {Chester Co. File 31-337} and whose deeds are on the succeeding page") makes a statement in this file to the effect that her husband the late Robert Gill was a blacksmith - that he died after the War leaving her a widow with five fatherless children ... small and dependent. That while he was in the service he lost a horse at Sumter's defeat and that he was captured at the defeat of Camden Town and was imprisoned by the British at the gaol there. That his long imprisonment injured his health. Mrs. Margaret Morrow makes statement that she knew Robert Gill. He was a blacksmith, that he was commissioned by Gen. Sumter to make swords for his men. Mrs. Mary Mills states that Robert Gill made a load of swords for Sumter's men, that he was carrying the swords to Camden when he and the swords were seized by the British and that Gill never received payment for the swords. Thomas Gill, Robert Gill, James Gill all made similar statements.

Robert Gill & James Gill state that the dec'd Robert Gill lost a horse at the Battle of Camden and ask that pay for the horse be given to Thomas Gill, son of dec'd, who had been promised the horse by his father. The widow asks payment for the swords. "There are many many papers in this file, and all seem to point to the Robert Gill with widow Elizabeth as being the son of Robert Gill, Sr. His estate file is probably in the early Camden, SC records 1780-1788, where one finds the estate files and wills of Chester at that era."

Robert's will dated 5 Sept 1785. Estate settled 1791 at Rocky Creek, Chester Dist., SC Here's a copy of my notes on Jesse Dunn (with many other Dunns and other families mentioned) for your Dunn family files there. This is clearly not a completed work. In some cases I've not included the references but in many cases I have. I hope it's helpful. If I find anything else that might be useful, I'll pass it along for your consideration as well.

John Dunn that came from Ireland to Charleston, SC to Salisbury, NC. In case you might be interested, I have attached a PDF file of his information found In the History of Rowan County, NC.

I really appreciate it. It's interesting that John Dunn's mother was an Erskine. One

Scots clan book I saw once said there was a Dunn family that was a Sept of Clan Erskine. It's also interesting that DNA testing has shown there is a common ancestor between the Erskine's and the Dunns. I would add that DNA has also shown that there is not just one Dunn family but at least three--and probably more who do not share a common ancestor. Seems more than one family took that name when family names were required. There are a distinct Dunn family in southeast England, one in Ireland and at least one in the border area between Scotland and Ireland. Is there anything on finding the estate documents on Robert Gill? Robert Gill was born in 1755 and lived most of his life in Chester County, SC. The researcher there at your library back some years ago wrote me that my Jesse Dunn's name was listed as one owing his estate. She said she found the document at the courthouse. She sent the page on which my Jesse Dunn was listed--but I have lost it. It was only about 10 years later that I realized how important this was. From this Gill family genealogy reference below that I've copied in, it might help you sort out where it is. "1787 Estate of Robert Gill (in Kershaw Co., SC) adm. by John Gill, Jr., and John Mills. Mr. Robert Gill, blacksmith. See 1828. Those owing the estate include: John Gill, Sr., John Gill, John Gill, Jr., Thomas Gill, George Gill, Sr., George Gill, Jr., Archibald Gill, Hugh Gill." Note that there were many others who owed the estate including my ancestor. I think he died in 1786 in Chester County but for some reason it's listed in Kershaw. If I need to pay a researcher to find this for me, let me know. Finding the estate docs for Robert Gill--and in particular--the entire list of who owes his estate--is very important for me. It may help me show that my Jesse Dunn was in Chester County prior to Fairfield County where he is first documented in 1786. I found some more information on Jesse Dunn attached, however, you probably already know about this information being from Ancestry.com. This is very helpful. I'd like to track down who built this genealogy and talk to them but I'm having trouble identifying contact information for who put it together. In looking at his estate papers, it appears that he remarried after Mary died to someone with Robinson as a last name. She had a daughter named Sarah Robinson, according to his estate papers. Do you know anything about this or about a Robinson family who lived in the area? Then, James B. Blair's wife was named Isabella Roberson or Robertson. She had a sister named "Julanna" according to the 1880 MS census where she was living in the household with James B. Blair. I think her name might really be Julianna, Julia Ann, or something similar. Her last name might have been Roberson or Robertson. There was a George and Nancy Robertson family living in Fairfield Co. in 1850 with a daughter of the right age named Julia Anna —a lot of similarities to the one with my Blair family. There was also a small child in the George Robertson household who was 6 years old and named Isabella. This may all be a coincidence or they might be Isabella Roberson/Robertson Blair's family. Did they attend the Salem church? Or do you know how I can look at other churches of that day? Or find any records on this George Robertson family?
	Thanks for any help you can give me with this! The only other piece of information I have is David Blair's father, Adam Blair, who came to SC by ship. I have the passenger list where he was named, but it's not saved to this computer. Marjorie McLean, also a member and I are working on the Blair family. Our Blair family isn't the same one as Dru Blair is researching, but we wonder if there is a connection since both families lived in Fairfield.
	I am sorry to report that we are unable to find anything on George Robertson's family other than what you probably already have from FindAGrave.com and Ancestry.com. Eddie says at Feasterville Academy there is a giant Blair family pedigree on the wall. He will check it soon as he can get out there and see if Isabella Blair Robertson is listed and perhaps more George Robertson family information.
	I was mostly just hunting around for something to connect Isabella Roberson/Robertson Blair to a family who was in Fairfield Co., SC in the early 1800's. The only place I have her name is on census records after 1850. And the only clue I have to her maiden name is that her unmarried sister (Julanna Roberson) was living in the household with her husband (James B. Blair) and grown son (George L. Blair) in Chickasaw Co., MS in 1880. This was shortly after Isabella had died. James B. Blair was the third generation of Blair's to have lived in Fairfield Co. And the family lived there for several years after their marriage before moving to AL with other siblings from the Blair family. Later, James B. moved his branch of the family to MS.

The Robertson family census in Fairfield Co. had a couple of clues that I thought might connect them to Isabella and Julianna/Julanna (census taker spelling). I'd appreciate hearing from you if you ever run upon anything about this family.

Does anyone know about the Robertson – Blair connection?

Who are **General Edward Taylor's** (Fairfield ca 1814-1896) **parents**, a 20+ year old question?

I mentioned to you back in the July/August time frame that many of us are interested in finding out General Edward Taylor's parents and his family line. I had asked Nancy Hoy for her assistance in researching his line for me. My line goes: grandmother Mary Isabell Taylor, her father Edward Tapley Taylor, his father Edward Miles Taylor, his father General Edward Taylor. Nancy is doing a great job tracking down information. I have copied her to give her credit and so that she can correct where I have made mistakes in what I have understood so far. Thank you, thank you, Nancy!

Nancy Hoy: Found another deed for Edward Meador Senior transaction to Britton Chapman and others. Has a plat of the division. I have Sarah Beam as wife of Edward Senior, but she is wife of Edward Meador Junior. This deed states that Edward gave the property to Taylor.

I looked at next three deeds also; interesting with mention of a Major Edge. One of the daughters married a William "Bill" Edge.

An update on Nancy's research on our Edward Taylor line by DNA, probate and Deed records so far indicate (not completely proven yet):

Edward may have been named after Edward Meador who seems to play highly in the family through the Chapman's and Edward's mother may also have been a Chapman. Edward's wife also being Nancy Chapman.

Taylor's dad may have been Goodwyn (maybe named after an Uncle) Taylor. Goodwyn's father may have been Cantey Taylor and that they are related (cousins) to the Columbia Colonel Thomas Taylor family. There is a record in a book "Battle of Mobley's Meeting House", that says that the Taylor's and Hampton's of Columbia hunted in this area of Fairfield County along the Broad River. Cantey's father may have been James. There is a Virginia probate record of Goodwyn and brothers James, John and Thomas. Early land grants along the Broad River where granted to James, John and Thomas Taylor's which may have included the Island. A Hoopaw (later Hooper) appears to have owned the Island prior to Goodwyn (deed). His father Cantey or grandfather James may have sold Island to Hoopaw.

Goodwyn receiving land along the Broad River including an Island and later went to Mississippi? or Alabama? and died. Edward Taylor (had received Broad River land and Island from Goodwyn); he being born here what was called the "River Place" and lived his entire life along the Broad River near Taylor Island, present day Shelton Island. Edward assisted with will of his brother in-law in Mississippi? or Alabama? and appears Edward had at least two sisters living there.

Edward's land after he died (court record) indicates some of the family members or connections were able to receive and/or acquire (buy) some of the land. Mary, Edward's wife lived along the Broad River near Taylor's Island on Edward's land after his death until her death.

After the depression for tax reasons, most of Edward's remaining original land along the Broad River in this area became government land, now U.S. Forestry preserve.

Just wanted to let you know research is still going on. Hope I got most of this right?

Nancy Hoy: Corrections and clarifications:

Edward Taylor was probably the son of John Goodwin Taylor and Lucy Meador, daughter of Edward Meador. Equity court records for Edward Meador indicate that Lucy Meador married first to John Goodwin Taylor then before 1830 to Green B Roberts who was her husband at the time of the dispute in 1851. It seems to indicate she had 7 children, not named, but Edward Taylor was a witness on some of the documents in the Equity records. John Goodwin Taylor likely died between 1820 (when I can find him on the census in Chester with two sons under 10) and 1830 by which time Lucy had married Roberts. Green and Lucy Roberts migrated to Pontotoc, MS in the 1840s along with a large group of Chester residents. They have a son, William Roberts, shown in 1850 census. Lucy died in 1870 in Winston Co, MS. There is also a Meredith Taylor born 1817 SC in Pontotoc who I believe to be a brother of Edward. I have access to DNA matches for 2 descendants of this Meredith and they have some matches to the correct Taylor families and to the Meadors.

John Goodwin Taylor is probably the son of a James Taylor of Ogelthorpe, GA, per deed, who purchased the island and another tract of land on the Broad River in 1806. He has ownership of the right property at the right time for John Goodwin Taylor to meet and marry Lucy Meador and Edward to be born on the property. He is my best guess at this time.

I believe John Goodwin Taylor to be a descendant (probably great grandson) of Thomas Taylor who died in 1772 in Mecklenburg Co, VA. He was married to a woman name Penelope Goodwin and in his will leaves property on Broad River in SC to 6 of his sons. This property mentions an island on Broad River. The neighboring plats mention land belonging to Thomas Taylor deceased during this time frame. All of Thomas's children seem to have either stayed in VA or gone to KY. The main one I cannot find information on is his son John. No one seems to know what became of him and he is our best bet to have come to SC.

Hope this clarifies. I will try to get some of these documents scanned and sent to you also.

Thought I would pass this table along.

By putting the Goodwyn & Taylor families in a table, it gets interesting.

Nancy Hoy: B. Simmons, would your ancestry username be obbieba1948?? If so you are matching one of the two people who allowed me to view their matches. I believe their ancestor to have been the brother of your Edward Taylor. I have researched Edward Taylor's children some and did some more yesterday on your Mabry's. I only found the first wife and sons for your Thomas but I had his middle initial as R. I knew

there was a daughter as I saw it in an obituary at findagrave. I have copied the rest of his family from your tree.

I am going to ask the two DNA subjects to add parents for their Meredith Taylor and maternal grandfather. I am hoping to generate matches to Edward Meador and create a circle so we can see other people who may match on the same segment. I have also asked them to upload to GEDmatch, but have not heard back from them regarding whether they have done this. I would recommend that you also upload your results to GEDmatch and to FTDNA when they start taking transfers again. If you need help, let me know.

I am going to recommend that all three of you add the following information to your trees and then the trees should match up.

Father and mother of Edward Taylor, John Goodwin Taylor born bef 1794 died bef 1830 Fairfield, SC wife Lucinda Lucy Meador born 1797 Fairfield County, SC died 1870 Winston, MS. Add Meredith Taylor born 1817 as Edward's brother.

Lucy Meador was the daughter of Edward Meador born 1761 died 1836 Fairfield, SC and Rebecca unknown.

If you both add this information, you should get a new green leaf for lwp1863. Hope you have time to do this. I would also appreciate an invitation to view your matches and see what I can figure out from them.

I uploaded a gedcom and started a tree at Ancestry and wikitree. The wikitree has not gone through their process yet, but should be up soon. I am adding documents to the one at ancestry. I do not know how long they will allow you to use old Ancestry, but it does not display the documents on the timeline in new Ancestry so you need to view it in the OLD version. I want to send you an invitation to this tree. Do you want me to send it to this address or another? I am also going to invite B. Simmons and the two descendants of Meredith Taylor so they have access to these documents.

Once I get the one at wikitree up we need to upload a gedcom for you or your father and connect with your Taylor branch. We also need to add your DNA tests to it. Let me know what address to use.

This address will be fine.

I do not have a personal account.

I have added the information from your email to B. Simmons to J. Taylor + tree. Thanks for all your doing.

Nancy Hoy: attached three Taylor Deeds from Chester County.

Wow! John G. Taylor, Lucinda Lucy Taylor, Edward Taylor, ?.P. Meador all mentioned.

Nancy Hoy: Two different deeds. John Goodwin's dated 1825 so proves he was alive then. The property was bought by a Thomas I or J Taylor who sold to John Davis who sold it to John Goodwin Taylor. I have not found the earlier deed to or from this Thomas Taylor.

Looks like it's under a lot of brush and we couldn't find it. But I thought it might be one that Jon would like to try to find and document. I'm attaching a screenshot of the location. Let me know if you guys decide to try to track it down.
	Jon is aware of this cemetery and has some old pictures that are not to his satisfaction. He plans to go back out to the cemetery within a month and get some much better pictures. When he gets these pictures, I will put them under the Ashford family tombstones web page.
Nuckolls, Stephen W.	The society has put together a wonderful website with lots of information that is very helpful. I found much of what I was looking for over the weekend, but do have two additional questions I am hoping you or someone may help me answer. Do the early (1785-1815) county court records exist? (I am looking for mentions of my GGGGGrandfater William Durphey/Dufphey who purchased lots from John Winn in 1785, served as the county's sheriiff around 1788/1789, and died in 1790.) There was evidently some dispute arising from his estate as his widow (Prudence Carson [Durphey] [Gamble]) and I believe her brother Hugh Carson, who served as executors and had to pay 72 pounds to a Walter Ackins as part of the estate of John Milling in 1798. The lots he purchased were 133, 71, and 70. Are there any old graveyards in the downtown area where he might be buried? I have attached the section of my tree that shows the descendants of Capt. William Durfphy, my 5G (or possibly 4G) grandfather, who died in Fairfield County, SC in 1790. Several deeds show that he served as sheriff of the county in 1788 and 1789. The deeds indicate he was from Rowan County, NC and moved to Fairfield County in about 1785. (I don't know the source of the Capt. title that was listed in the estate papers as I have found no revolutionary war paperwork.) My entire tree along with all the sources is on Ancestry.com and is public and I am happy to send you more if you wish. Please understand that the tree is subject to change and I have made the research request to help solve a mystery involving the Sheriff's son and grandson. Some think there is only one person, a son, but a recently located reference in an estate file in Greene County, Alabama from 1829 points to perhaps a son and grandson. My research is ongoing; therefore, the tree subject to change. I did join your society and found the links, deeds, and other information very helpful. Thank you again for all you and the other researchers do and I plan to make additional contributions in the future. Here

owned 11 slaves. From Deed records, William purchased some lots in Winnsboro in 1785 from John Winn; Book A, page 1 and Book A, page 3. His only son William L. Durphey sold the property in 1809, Book S, page 149 and in 1812, Book V, page 48. He was living in Rowan County, N. C. at the time. In the "Rowan County, N. C. Heritage" Book" "On August 8, 1782, Administration on the estate of Alexander Love deceased ordered to issue to Samuel Love, security William Durphey in the sum of 600 specie." We do not have any record of any Durphey's graves in Winnsboro or the county. There are several old Gamble's buried in some church cemeteries in Winnsboro, but did not find one for Prudence. This information is very helpful. Thank you and your volunteers for researching and compiling it. I did find some additional reference over the weekend involving the administration of his estate in NC that references John Winn and provides some more information about his father and his military experience. Just let me know if you would like a copy. In addition, do any of the early Fairfield County court records still exist? (i.e. pre 1820) Yes, mostly on microfilm. Sung, Carolyn	I have a question for you about the Winnsboro News and Herald that is in Chronicling America. There seems to be a gap after November 1902. I was tracking T.C. Wylie who after 1870 lived in Longtown and farmed until around 1900 when he moved to Columbia where the census shows him at age 67 with most of his family working in the Col cotton mill. The Nov.12 1902 issue image 4 notes that his brother J. T. Wylie of Blackstock got a telegram that T. C. was very sick. But there is nothing after that because there is a gap in the newspaper. I am not sure I tried Find A grave. I have never found his parent's William and Matilda Gibson Wylie's graves. The father died before 1860 and the mother was still in the census in Fairfield in 1880. T.C. Was a Confederate vet of Co. E 15th SCV. The T stands for Tillman. Is there a local newspaper that picks up soon after Nov. 1902? Are there issues that aren't in CA. Any ideas of places for me to search?
Wilson, Elizabeth "Betty" Ferrell	"IBA Estelle Cook (Taylor), Mecklenburg City, VA." Can you give us a little more information? Actually, I would probably want more input on my grandfather, William (Willie) Thomas Ferrell born January 23, 1865 born in Virginia (probably Charlotte Co). He had a twin sister, Jenny. He was the son of James. A. Farrell and Susan J. Tharpe (Bacon area in Charlotte Co.) He also had a sister Julia A. Ferrell born in 1866 and a brother John Ferrell born in 1868. I did learn from one cousin that my grandfather said at one time that his grandfather came from Ireland. My grandparents lived most of their married life in South Hill, VA. I have never been able to find any descendants or grave sites of any of his family. I would really like this grandparent's name put out there for others to see.

I have copies of Clemment's (Arledge) will, and some census records for him and his son Clement (born 1777) who was one of Cyrus's brothers. There was a report in someone's family tree that John Featherston served with Marion's Men in the Rev. but no documentation and I have only found a Richard Featherston (Camden District Reg.) and William Featherston (SC 6 th)- I think

	Richard may have been John's father's name, but this may be a brother. I would think John's father would be too old to have served in the military. Don't know about William. There weren't any men of either surname listed in the 2500 names that I saw online from the book about Marion's Men. I'd be grateful for any information that can add to my knowledge of these families, since I've just begun researching back this far on these branches. Haven't found Joseph Ephraim Bell's father or Sarah Shumate's, so don't know if those are possibilities. If you have other questions, please let me know. I don't want to waste the volunteers' time looking for things I may already have, but much of what I've found is from other family trees. Some seem better documented than others.
