#### **Cemetery Report**

With the coming of spring, critters stirring and the start of turkey season, the field search for cemeteries is over. This quarter we want to thank Sarah Sexton, Britt Cathcart and Jarvis Barnwell for showing us the location of several undocumented and documented cemeteries. We were shown the location of several cemeteries just before the hunting season opened that we will have to document next years. Here are some highlights of cemeteries that were documented the past two months.

#### **DURHAM CEMETERYIND**





This previously undocumented cemetery is east of Valencia Road just south of Dutchman's Creek. There are four marked graves in the cemetery; one of which is Capt. Charnel Durham, an Officer and Soldier of the American Revolution, Born July 2, 1754 and Died April 13, 1836. Along with him there are graves for Joel R. Durham, Nancy Durham-wife of Charnel, and Robert W. Durham.

#### **ARNETT CEMETERY**





This previously undocumented cemetery is just south of Minton Creek and north of Smalltown Road. There are four marked graves in the cemetery and several unmarked. Buried in the cemetery are Eleanor Arnett, wife of George Arnett, died December 28, 1826 at the age of 53 years, 2 months and 13 days; Elizabeth J. Arnett, daughter of G. W. & M. Arnett, died on October 3, 1836 at the age of 9 months and 6 days; George Arnett, died October 9, 1836 at the age of 65 years, 11, months and 22 days; and Eleanor Marshall, daughter of R. W. & J. S. Marshall born on October 6 and died October 10, 1836

#### JAMES ROBERTSON CEMETERY

This cemetery is located off of Highway 213 west of Winnsboro. There are eighteen marked graves and several unmarked graves in this cemetery. This cemetery was named for James Robertson, who was born on June 16, 1785 and died on January 9, 1856.



Special kudos this quarter goes to Sarah Sexton. She knew the location this cemetery, got permission from the land owners, led the cemetery team to the cemetery and assisted in picture taking. In addition to this cemetery she gave us the location of the Cork-Murphy Cemetery and the location of another cemetery that will have to wait until next year to document.

### **John Milling Cemetery**

This cemetery is off of Jackson Creek Road along the banks of Jackson Creek. The cemetery is named for John Milling, who was an Officer in the Revolutionary Army and died on May 5, 1788 at the age of 40 years, 3 months and 25 days. As can be seen, this once beautiful cemetery, as is true of most of the family cemeteries throughout Fairfield County, has fallen into a sad state. Fallen trees have knocked parts of the wall over, small trees, briers, shrubs and vines have all but claimed the cemetery.

Although field work for the committee is basically over until next winter, there is research that continues. Two examples of this are:

#### **JIM CEMETERY**



We were shown this small cemetery with only one tombstone, and several graves marked with field stones. It only has Jim, born June 23, 1847 and died April 23, 1848. Our first thought was that it was possibly a favorite slave, but since he was only 10 months of age, this is doubtful. We have started looking at land records to determine who owned the land in 1848 and hopefully determine who his family was. The cemetery is located about half a mile south of the Mobley Highway and about six tenth of a mile west of Highway 200. So far we have traced the land back to Gladys Patrick Grier who inherited three tracks of land from her father, Thomas G. Patrick. We are now trying to determine which of the three tracts the cemetery is on. These three tracts were called; Southern Part of the Bratton Tract, Pittman Place and Cummings.

#### **CORK-MURPHY CEMETERY**




This is a large cemetery, approximately 30-40 graves, but with only two headstones with information on them. These are Samuel Cork who died on August 31, 1847 at 81 years and John Murphy, a native of County Antrim, Ireland, died June 15, 1840 at 33 years. The cemetery is located about a quarter of a mile off of Scotts Crossing Road just before Landis Road. There is a stone with a "J. A." on it in the cemetery. We know that there were Alfords, Alstons, Ashfords and Andrews living in the area, and are trying to determine who owned the land in the 1840s.

#### MOLLY ALSTON CEMETERY MONUMENT







For the past few years, Jim and Kitty McKinstry from Georgia, Bob and Carol McKinstry from Florida, Don and Elsie McKinstry Vining from Georgia and Bobby Brown of Fairfield County have been working in restoring the cemetery. The Molly Alston Cemetery LLC was formed and restoration began. The cemetery was purchased, cleared and their efforts culminated on April 15<sup>th</sup> when the monument was installed.

The results of their efforts can be seen in the first picture, what was once a woods full of brush, briers and vines is now a beautiful cemetery. They plan to periodical return to cleanup and do more improvements to the cemetery.

It is a credit to them, that not only do they have an interest in their ancestors but are willing to travel, invest their time and funds to honor their ancestors by beautifying the cemetery. It is a hope that other families will see what can be done and do the same to the numerous family cemeteries in the county.

Mary H. Cain	Q. Do you have any information on the Tidwell family in late 1700's and early 1800's A. We have several family books which I have attached to this email along with will of Robert Tidwell 1806. We also have family files with information. Attached Exerts from The Tidwell Family by Regina Dollison and Tidwells of England and America and Allied families by Howard Tidwell. We will be digitizing the family file information as time permits over the next several months. Emailed an article in one of our newsletters: "Wisteria", the Myers-Tidwell family home which stood just across from the Dixon home (still standing) in Longtown, is said to have been saved by Nicholas Peay Myers, an intrepid Confederate son of the Peay-Myers families of Longtown. Family tradition admits that Nick, a brave young man, acted as a spy for the southern cause: He is reputed to have saved many helpless woman and children, and to have even ambushed a few Yankees. He was wearing a Union captain's uniform and insignia when he ordered Yankee soldiers away from Wisteria and saved his home from the torch. It is said that there were Yankees skulls in the attic at Wisteria until Mrs. David William Tidwell (the former Mattie Myers) had them buried with the family and slaves at Bryant Hill Cemetery sometime before Wisteria was accidentally burned about 1935. Wisteria was one of the fine Longtown plantation houses full of history, Lore and tradition. There were grease spots on the walls and even the ceilings of some of the upstairs closets where the Tidwell's hid their hams and pork shoulders before Sherman's raid. These same bedrooms were papered with Confederate money, it having become valueless and paper being scarce.
Jack Andrews	Q. Andrews Genealogy Research, James Andrews, 1725—1798 and John Andrews, 1700—1742? We have formed a genealogy group, The Andrews Project, which traces our family back to the 1600s. James Andrews (17251798) and his father John Andrews (17001742) are the focal

point for our documentation. James lived and died in Fairfield County, S.C., however we think he was born in Fairfield county Conn .All of our records show that John was born and died in Conn. Also James received a land grant for bring people from the north to S.C.

Q. The attached files may explain the families a little better. I am especially interested in finding out if he had any patriotic service that would qualify him as a Patriot recognized by the DAR or SAR. They accept loyalty oaths, financial support or other patriotic service in addition to military service. The only 'match' I got for Arledge was a William Aldredge in Rowan Co, NC when I looked for military records. I have copies of Clement's will, and some census records for him and his son Clement (born 1777) who was one of Cyrus's brothers. There was a report in someone's family tree that John Featherston served with Marion's Men in the Rev. but no documentation and I have only found a Richard Featherston (Camden District Reg.) and William Featherston (SC  $6^{th}$ )- I think Richard may have been John's father's name, but this may be a brother. I would think John's father would be too old to have served in the military. Don't know about William. There weren't any men of either surname listed in the 2500 names that I saw online from the book about Marion's Men. I'd be grateful for any information that can add to my knowledge of these families, since I've just begun researching back this far on these branches. Haven't found Joseph Ephraim Bell's father or Sarah Shumate's, so don't know if those are possibilities. If you have other questions, please let me know. I don't want to waste the volunteers' time looking for things I may already have, but much of what I've found is from other family trees. Some seem better documented than others. Athens, AL at their Archives. Found some info on Featherston's that leads back to SC. One thing was a transcript of the will of Lucey F. Will book1 pg 11, Chester Co. Follow-up by Mary Morgan These are some of the documents I found in Limestone Co. in Athens, AL. I think Lucey Featherston, whose will was written in 1797 (and probated in1799), was the mother of John Featherston, Sr. (as he was called in John, Jr's will) who married Willie or Willey Colston. Lucey would be the grandmother of their son, John Featherston, Jr., whose will was probated in 1811. She was apparently widowed when she died, but there is no evidence of a will by her husband. The SC Archives reports only these two wills. John, Jr mentions his mother, Willey, in his will. As far as I can tell, this John Featherston, Jr. wasn't married and had no children. His parents were still living when his will was written. These wills were both probated in Chester Co, so I don't know if you would have any information about their tombstones in your files. I was wondering if there is indication of Lucey's maiden name, or her husband's name, and it might help if there were tombstones for them. From the Featherston Family File in Athens, I found the attached information which seems to indicate his name was also John Featherston, which would make "John, Jr" actually "John the III", at least. John, Jr's will mentions his sister, Lucy [Featherston] Arledge, [married to Cyrus]. Their daughter, Ann M. Arledge married Matthew Bell, who is mentioned in the information you sent me. Matthew sold slaves to his father-in-law, Cyrus Arledge, in 1839. This is listed as part of the will of Matthew Bell, Limestone Co, AL, but I believe it is actually a Deed of Sale in Limestone Co. Some information says Matthew died in 1847 in Limestone Co, and Ann and several of their children, including my great-grandmother, Angeline McWilliams Bell. moved to the area near Crockett in Houston Co, TX sometime after 1850. Ann (Arledge) Bell and the children were in the 1850 census in Limestone Co. AL without Matthew, and Ann sold property there in her own name. Angeline married my great grandfather, Leonidas Ruffin Stroud, in Crockett, Houston Co, TX in 1855. Leonidas (age 21) was born in TN and was found in Newton, MS in the 1850 census with his parents, Ruffin (Brown) Stroud and Priscilla (Ellis DeBerry) Stroud. Ruffin and Leonidas moved to TX in 1853, probably after Priscilla died in MS, though I have no proof of her death location. Ruffin remarried (Jane Denson) in Crockett about the same time Leonidas married

Angeline, and he had several more children with Jane. This may or may not be information that will be pertinent to anyone else looking for Arledge, Featherston, Bell, or even Stroud ancestors, but thought I'd include it for what it's worth. Q. I have a question for you about the Winnsboro News and Herald that is in Chronicling America. There seems to be a gap after November 1902. I was tracking T.C. Wylie who after 1870 lived in Longtown and farmed until around 1900 when he moved to Columbia where the census shows him at age 67 with most of his family working in the Col cotton mill. The Nov.12 1902 issue image 4 notes that his brother J. T. Wylie of Blackstock got a telegram that T. C. was very sick. But there is nothing after that because there is a gap in the newspaper. I am not sure I tried Find A grave. I have never found his parent's William and Matilda Gibson Wylie 's graves. The father died before 1860 and the mother was still in the census in Fairfield in 1880. T.C. Was a Confederate vet of Co. E 15th SCV. The T stands for Tillman. Is there a local newspaper that picks up soon after Nov. 1902? Are there issues that aren't in CA. Any ideas of places for me to search? A. We are not able to find William Wylie and Matilda Gibson Wylie graves either. Local County Library in Winnsboro has on microfilm: News and Herald, 1871 - 1982 (47 rolls), The Fairfield independent, 1979 - 1982 (3 rolls), Herald independent, 1982 - 2011 (33 rolls)\* \*They may have them through 2015 now, I was told they get one every year. You might also check out the 1910 special edition with write ups of where Fairfield County Confederate Soldiers are today; Tillman may be listed. We have a copy in the archives upstairs, but Suzanne and Pelham are both out this week and I am not aware where it is kept in the archives. I will check with Suzanne when she returns. I have attached an article about the Wylie Plantation (ca 1790), just in case you have not seen it. Also an article on Wylie's in the Fairfield County Family Histories (red book). We have

some information donated (only write ups, no real proof) for our Wylie Family File that states that Tillman had an uncle Tillman Gibson; so he may be his namesake. It also states that Tillman Wylie may have been married to a Mary Stewart. Also, that Tillman Wylie was an Engineer for the Railroad and that he was found guilty of Assault & Battery, November 7, 1867. You probably have these also: John Tyler Wylie's tombstone Hopewell ARP in Chester County near Blackstock Martha J Wylie first wife of John T Wylie's tombstone Bethel ARP in Winnsboro Fairfield County Malinda M Wylie second wife of John T Wylie's tombstone Hopewell ARP in Chester County near Blackstock. Also sent information from Fairfield Families "Red" Book for Hilliard Wylie, Joseph Wylie, and Preliminary Information Sheet for Historic Properties in South Carolina to Determine Eligibility for the National Registry of Historic Places. Newspapers after November 1902 are very few for years 1907-1910 and 1911-1915. The Fairfield County Library in Winnsboro has on microfilm: \*They may have them through 2015 now, I was told they get one every year.

Q. You gave me a couple of bits that are new to me. I was especially happy to discover Wylands. I search the web and found a modern photo etc. a descendants appear to live there and maybe built a new house near the old in the 1990's. Do you know the owners David Hall Wright and Mary Jane Wylie Wright? If you do, are they approachable and do you have an address. There was an address on the web 181 Eagle Drive. The old house is on the Rocky Mount Rd. 2.5 miles northeast of Winnsboro.

A. I spoke with David Hall Wright and the older 1832 plantation house (Wylands=Wylie's Lands) still exist yards from their new home. The Wylie's settle there in 1787 and the original two-chimney house site is still by the creek and is still recognizable. He and his wife (Mary Jane Wylie Wright) would be glad for you to visit and tour both sites. I expect she is Descended from John Wylie ,Jr. where I have been working on the descendants of his older brother William and his sister Rachel Wylie Gibson. Both William and Rachel married brother and sister, Gibsons.

Q. Is there a citation for the Tillman Wylie 1867 assault and battery case? There doesn't seem to be a newspaper for 7 Nov. 1867.

A. The Fairfield County Library in Winnsboro has most if not all of the local papers on microfilm. Q. From reading the 19th century Winnsboro newspapers there is at least one complication in that there is a black Henry Gibson and A black Daniel Tillman Gibson. I do find a court case later in Camden that I would like to research more. I will follow up on the 1868 case too. I am pretty sure I found that T.C. Wylie went to Columbia by 1900 and was working with most of his family at the Columbia Cotton Mill. They lived on Elmwood and are buried in that cemetery. Which I found in a three volume description of the graves there. I Found it on ancestry. His wife was a Stewart from Longtown as you thought. One of Tillman's sons worked on the railroad and it is possible that T.C. Had Worked on it too. As you know 1865 to 1900 was a very dicey time filled with strife and economic hardship for most. Most of our Gibson family children of John Wylie's youngest daughter who came to Chester lived within walking distance to the Springsteen mill and the Chester southern railroad station on Lancaster Street. Some of the grandchildren worked on the Seaboard across town. But the main Chester freight shipment was supported by a big warehouse area west of the station on Gadsden street westward the city almost to Aiken street. They are all torn down now. What would you say are the best books on Sherman's march through Winnsboro? I would like to review the published works. Although I heard the program on the burning of Columbia aired on CSpann with some really spacey women speaking with whom I

couldn't relate. I know you spoke about the march through Fairfield at the anniversary last year. I want to go back through the published literature before I go back to the Sherman papers again. My question is what intelligence did the Federal have that affected their decisions as to what and who to go after etc. I had always thought it was random in part in anger at the New York newspaper critical response to the burning of Columbia. I read all the Fairfield slave narratives at LC and these were totally sanitizer, but who would open up to W.W. Dixon and tell him anything that they didn't think he would want to hear. Then if they were so brazen, I doubt Dixon would have heard it or recorded it. I wondered about the Freedmen's bureau records for Fairfield, but I couldn't figure out how to approach it. I think the national archives is doing some crowd sourcing indexing or description, I have never looked at the U of Maryland published volumes. I assume these are mostly post war. Back to Feb. 1865. I assume some blacks would have been giving information to the Federals on people as well as geography. Do you know if anyone has done a list of memories of soldiers on the March from Columbia to North Carolina? Hampton is probably the wild card in this for the CSA. Wrote my dissertation on Peter Force whose son Manning was one of Sherman's General who took his troops from Columbia on the eastern route though Florence, If I recall correctly. At least Manning Force didn't come through Fairfield. Gen. Slocum I think headquartered at Mount Olivet. I have been reading the Wade Hampton accounts in the new biography of a few years ago and some in the News and Herald. The Hampton accounts are based on the OR and family papers. I read the OR and some of the Sherman papers in LC years ago. I interviewed a cousin the youngest son of the Gibson family back in the 1970s about her father and grandfather's activities and I got the impression that lots happened that people talked about obliquely. Because direct talk was dangerous. Some of it jives with physical evidence and some of the published reports. I was always hard to get my arms around the fact that my great grandmother was right in. The path of that out of control army. Pretty terrifying. A. We have probably over 10 books about first-hand accounts of the War in SC.

They appear in the 1820 Ohio census in Butler County Ohio but listed under his mother's name as Nancy. She writes her will in 1827 and then dies s in that time frame. I know the father is alive from approx. 1805 to around 1818 because she lists her sons with their name Little in her will. Their names are James, Robert as that is the name listed on my Roberts death info in 1892 from Butler county Ohio. Can't check the Ohio 1810 census for the family. It was lost due to a fire. The church records according to a local Butler county historian where she most likely attended church have been lost. Can't find her burial site either. They may have not had the money for a stone. Attached you Thomas, David and Samuel. I know nothing about the father or his name possibly might be will find Little family. In this information is the Will that you said would be helpful plus some additional information. I am sure I need to update some of this info as this is from several years ago but should be helpful for you.



Q. Looking for direction in researching my Revolutionary War ancestor's family. Jacob Barker born Fairfield 1764 served at Ft 96 & Eutaw Springs. Told his father was Seth Barker but no



family. I do have photos of gravesite where my Rev War ancestor is buried if you wish for your records. I have been to Fort 96, SC where I was given some info on Pvt Barker under a Major Pearson. I did learn that SC has a grant to work on Eutaw Springs, the other battle, where my ancestor was wounded. I descend from Jacob's eldest son, James Thomas Barker from Jacob's 2nd marriage to Mary Price m 1800 ca. One would assume his wives were related since his 1st wife was Rachel Price. Tradition is adult children from 1st wife remained in SC after Jacob & 2nd wife 1st went to Ky (bounty?) then to southern Illinois. 1790 census hints at that as there was a Jacob Jr. listed. I know nothing about the Price family, other than it, originally, was Welsh. I would like to know if anything recorded as to that family. Also, if records tax, etc tell us where in Fairfield Co. Jacob lived & marriage records if available. I was told by late, distant relative Jacob's father was Seth & family, originally, from near Andover, Mass. Absolutely, no documentation along with that info, though. Also, James Thomas Barker married Eunice Franklin after leaving SC. I wouldn't even mention that except long standing tradition in family that Franklin's moved south from Mass very early along with Barker's & that they were related to Benjamin Franklin's father, Josiah. Just unlikely there Franklin's in same area. Birth Date for Jacob Barker is 1764. A. We found this in our family loose files but were unable to figure out who supplied us this info.

Kathryn Lake Hogan - who will talk on researching Canadian ancestors


Christine Woodcock who will talk on researching Scottish ancestors

Woodard Footprint is an approximate 450 page family history, memoir, and genealogy, tracing Woodards from the Vikings to the Normans to the English in Standish and Shevinton, England, to the settlement in Jamestown, Virginia, and subsequent migration into South Carolina and Alabama. It is available in soft cover at Luli.com for \$36.50. It includes historical summaries, timelines, chronologies, estate and administration papers of key descendants, photos, and genealogical summaries from the first Virginia settler, Christopher Woodard, (1594–1650) to his thirteenth generation descendants. The Alabama segment focuses on the writer's (Merle W. Woodard Safford) great grandfather, James Polk Woodard, who migrated with his family from South Carolina to Alabama and died a soldier in the Civil War.

The work is a culmination of over 40 years of searching courthouses, cemeteries, recording oral histories, compiling data from family members, and included research trips to England and Normandy. Merle Safford passed away a year ago (by coincidence this very week), unable to complete the work. My promise to her as daughter, on her deathbed, was to complete and publish the work.

Written by Merle Woodard Safford, compiled and edited by Deana Safford Wilson.

"Woodard Footprints" is a compilation of data collected from family members, courthouses, cemeteries, and oral histories. Merle Safford passed away, unable to see her research published. My deathbed promise to her, as daughter, was to finish compiling the massive date, edit, and see her dream to fruition.

The Odyssey begins, "James Polk Woodard, whose absence in the family graveyard in northwest Alabama led me on a search and the cause of his death in the Civil War." Merle recalls visiting the cemetery with her family in the heat of an Alabama summer day, when only four years old. There were six souls sleeping there, including the cold Tommy, and she wondered about an empty grave that just might hold the remains of her long searched for great-great-grandfather. And where was James Polk buried? That night I dreamed of little Tommy who lay in the graveyard. He was killed in a fall from an ox cart when he was only seven, and there were three babies' graves; all these impressions were entered into the encyclopedia of my mind and have remained there." And so, through her memories presented in the book as letters to her children and grandchildren, through her recounting of research trips and interviews, she unveils a family history and genealogy that also serves as lessons in history and migrations, of times of peace and great wars, of generations following footprints of the past and creating new ones.

# Jewish Historical Society of South Carolina (JHSSC)

The seeds of the Jewish Historical Society of South Carolina (JHSSC) were sown in 1993 at a panel discussion sponsored by the Jewish Studies Program at the College of Charleston. The topic under consideration was Jewish life in small towns across South Carolina, and panelists spoke with a sense of urgency about the decline of the communities where they grew up and, more generally, about the disappearance of the small-town Jew. The only way to preserve living memories of this once vigorous element of the Jewish Diaspora was to start recording oral history interviews immediately.
