Columbia, Sept. 9 James W. Smith, 29, originally of Winnsboro, but a concrete inspect for W. S. Riding with him at the time of the accident was Miss Muriel Rossa, 17, Glenora, N. Y., who was also killed. Mr. Smith had been living at Glenora since leaving Columbia and was still connected with the Barstow corporation. The couple were out riding when in some way the automobile left the road and hit a tree beside the highway.

Mr. Smith left Winnsboro about six years ago and worked for about twelve months at Rock Hill with the Ratteree Drug company.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Susan Smith, of Clifton Forge, Va.; four sisters, Mrs. Emma Bailey of Columbia, Mrs. J. G. Johnson of Clifton Forge, Mrs. H. K.
