

DEATH OF FORMER FAIRFIELD PASTOR

Rev. Joseph Rhea Millard, of Ruby, S. C., died February 20, at the home of his son in Andrews, S. C. Mr. Millard was born in Bluff City, Tenn., January 24, 1856. He secured his collegiate training at King College, Bristol, Tenn., and Southwestern Presbyterian University and his theological training in Union Theological Seminary, in Virginia. Licensed by Holston Presbytery May 5, 1888, he was ordained by Charleston Presbytery in October of the same year. During his many years of service in the Gospel ministry he supplied, either as pastor or stated supply, the following churches: Pastor of Richland and Fort Motte churches, in Charleston Presbytery 1889; pastor, Tirzah, Waxhaw and Beulah, 1890-1891; pastor, Richburg and Fishing Creek, 1892-1895; stated supply, Fishing Creek and Oakland, 1896-1898; pastor, Kings Mountain and Long Creek churches, in North Carolina; 1899-1902; stated supply of Bessemer City church, 1900-1902; pastor of the Salem, Lebanon and Union churches, 1903-1910; stated supply of White Oak, Ruby and Chesterfield churches, in Pee Dee Presbytery, 1911-1915. In 1915 he became pastor of these churches, remaining with the group until his retirement several years ago because of advancing years. He is survived by his wife and one son, Mr. Jas. Millard, of Andrews, S. C. His was a long and faithful ministry, and he was greatly beloved in every community in which he served.

He was 80 years of age. He is also survived by two brothers, Rev. M. A. Millard, Bethesda, Tenn., Mr. J. A. Millard, Richmond, Va., and two sisters, Mrs. George Fleenor and Miss Nancy Millard, Bluff City, Tenn.

Funeral services were held at Chesterfield Presbyterian church, February 21, at 4 p. m., conducted by Rev. J. A. McIntyre, pastor of Chesterfield and Ruby churches.

Mr. Millard was loved and honored by his friends of the Salem, Lebanon and Union sections of this county and by all that knew him. He resided in the Lebanon community at the manse for seven years.

J. J. McMAHAN DIES AT BLAIRS

Passes Away at Home of Friend Where He Was Visiting. Funeral Was Held Monday Morning.

John J. McMahan, of Columbia, died at 1:30 p. m. Saturday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. D. B. Crowder, near Blairs, where he had been a visitor since a few days before Christmas.

Funeral services were held at Rock Creek Baptist church, in Fairfield county at 11 a. m., Monday and was conducted by the Rev. William Heynesworth, of Sumter, a cousin of Mr. McMahan, assisted by the Rev. J. P. Isenhower, of Winnsboro, a member of the house of representatives.

Mr. McMahan went to visit the Crowders a few days before Christmas and December 23, 1935 he was 70 years of age. December 24, he suffered a stroke and addressing Mrs. Crowder by her Christian name he said: "Gussie, yesterday I was exalting in my strength. Today I am an old man"

He rallied for a while, spoke to his friends cheerfully and seemed to improve. He began sinking a day or so before his death.

Years ago, Mr. McMahan was a professor at the University of South Carolina; he served as state superintendent of education and also as state insurance commissioner and was long in the public eye, offering for several political offices and making campaigns over the state.

For a time he published a newspaper in Columbia and was widely known. Of gentle kindly manner, but he was at the same time fearless and outspoken.

His death removes from the state a man who long had been a close student of its affairs and who loved it devotedly.

Mr. McMahan, the last of his immediate family, lived in Columbia for many years with his sisters, the Misses Annie and Lilly McMahan, who died a few years ago. Since that time he had made his home alone at the residence the three had occupied. He was the son of Dr. John J. McMahan, a well known physician and Sarah Haynesworth. His father died in 1865, a few months before Mr. McMahan's birth. The handsome old McMahan home in Fairfield burned a few years ago.

Mr. McMahan was a man of brilliant mind. He was superintendent of education before he was 30 years of age. He was offered the presidency of more than one higher institution of learning. He was a man of scholarly bent, and spent much time in reading. He was an attorney but devoted very little of his life to that profession. He was a member of the Kosmos club of Columbia.

There are many to regret Mr. McMahan's death.
