HURT IN ACCIDENT W. M. WILKES DIES

W. M. Wilkes, 70, of 1014 Pickens street, Columbia, who was injured May 21 when struck by an automobile at Gervais and Pickens streets, died at 9:35 Sunday night at the Columbia hospital. After a conference with members of Mr. Wilkes' family, Coroner John A. Sargeant, who investigated the case, said that an inquest into the accident would not be held. This was the ninth fatal automobile accident in Richland county in 1936. Mr. Wilkes was struck at 8:15 at night while crossing the street. The car was driven by S. M. Russel of Colonial Heights. He halted and rendered all aid possible. Mr. Wilkes was formerly of Chester and Fairfield counties, but for a number of years was a progressive farmer of Sumter county. He was an upright man of many fine qualities and there are many to regret his death. He is survived by his widow, two daughters, Miss Elsie Wilkes and Miss Julia Mae Wilkes; three sons Jack, Wilkes, Horace Wilkes and Thomas Wilkes; three brothers, R. W. Wilkes, J. Y. Wilkes, and B. Wilkes, all of Fairfield county and two sisters, Mrs. Frank Suber of Blair and Mrs. Cleveland Meadow of Vidalia, Go.

J. C. WOLLING, JR., IS CLAIMED BY DEATH

John George Wolling Jr., 63, former prominent merchant, operating general mercantile establishments at Leeds, Carlisle and Shelton, died Sunday morning at Shelton, following a cerebral hemorrhage, which he had suffered Sunday morning. He had been in poor health for some time. However, his unexpected death came as a great shock to his friends. Mr. Wolling was a native of the Shelton section, being a son of Mr. and Mrs. John George Wolling, Sr. He was educated in the schools of this section and took a business course at an Augusta (Ga.) business college.

Mr. Wolling was engaged in business with his father in the three places named. They enjoyed a wide measure of success in their mercantile business. His father died in 1932. Mr. Wolling retired from his mercantile business in 1931. As did his father, he always took a wide interest in religious activities, politics in Fairfield county, civic affairs, agricultural works, patriotic causes and all worthy movements. His father was for a number of years a members of the South Carolina house of representatives from Fairfield county. He and his father were partly instrumental in launching the Antioch Methodist church. He was for many years a steward of the church. Mr. Wolling was a W. O. W. He was always interested in the school work of his community. He was interested in athletics and in his early days a good baseball player.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Kate Coleman Wolling; by three sons and two daughters: James Willia mWolling, the Veteran's hospital, Augusta, Ga.; Mrs. Joe F. Edmunds, Winnsboro; Sam Coleman Wolling; Anderson; Mrs. James Edward Davis and Jesse Gladden Wolling, both of Shelton. Four sisters likewise survive: Mrs. Emmie Clowney, Columbia; Mrs. Harry D. Coleman, Shelton; Mrs. Josh Fletcher, Hamlet, N. C., and Mrs. Galloway Fletcher, McColl; by 13 grandchildren.

Two brothers, both merchants, Treas Wolling and M. Wolling, both of McColl, died some years ago. Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock from the family home at Shelton.
