### W. C. ARIAIL DIES IN CHARLOTTE

Husband of Former Miss Amaryllis Sitgreaves, Of Winnsboro, Passes Wednesday. Was Prominent In Business, Educational & Religious Life of the Carolinas.

William Coke Ariail, 54, prominent business man of 539 Hawthorne Lane, died Wednesday night Feb. 9th, in a Charlotte hospital after an illness of several months.

Mr. Ariail was active in the business, educational and religious life of the two Carolinas. He was born June 26, 1883, in Heath Springs, S. C., son of the Rev. W. H. Ariail, of the South Carolina Methodist Conference, and Mrs. Ariail. He was graduated from Wofford college in the class of 1904 and was engaged for about ten years in educational work, acting as superintendent of several schools in North and South Carolina.

For the past fifteen years, since his arrival in Charlotte, Mr. Ariail had been field representative in Western North Carolina for the American Seating Co. He was a trustee of Hawthorne Lane Methodist church and superintendent of the Sunday school. Always active in church work, he had served in the capacity of steward, Sunday school superintendent and organist in various churches in North and South Carolina.

Mr. Ariail is survived by his wife who was Amaryllis Sitgreaves, of Winnsboro; two daughters, Mrs. J. Harold Mayer of Aiken, S. C., and Miss Marjorie Ariail of Charlotte; three sons, W. C. Jr., Robert and Allen Ariail; his stepmother, Mrs. W. H. Ariail; one brother, D. M. Ariail of Spartanburg, S. C.; and the following sisters: Mrs. R. E. Truesdale, Mt. Holly, N. C.; Mrs. C. L. ### MAN JUMPS FROM BRIDGE

The Rev. W. D. Bratton of Memphis Leaps into Mississippi River.

Memphis, Tenn.—The homicide captain, Frank Glisson, said that "without a doubt" the Rev. William D. Bratton, son of the Episcopal bishop, had leaped into the Mississippi river Monday morning and disappeared.

Police found his sedan parked midway across the Harahan bridge. In it were articles of clothing identified by persons as those of the rector. A wallet contained his driver's license.

Four persons on and near the bridge reported to Captain Glisson they had seen a man leap from the south railing.

"Without a doubt, the Rev. Mr. Bratton leaped into the river," Glisson said after an investigation.

Mr. Bratton was rector of Grace Episcopal church, Memphis, the son of Bishop Theodore DuBose Bratton, Jackson, Miss., bishop of Mississippi and chancellor of the University of the South at Sewanee, Tenn. He was about 48.

J. I. Rhyne, truck line operator, who said he had followed the Bratton car onto the bridge, described what happened:

"The driver leaped out. He was bareheaded. He ran around the front of his car, peeling off his overcoat and top coat. He grabbed the rail, boosted himself up and went over head first. It happened inside of 30 seconds."

Mr. Bratton did not preach Sunday. Instead a missionary addressed the congregation. Monday morning, his wife said, he had left in the family automobile to take his youngest son, John, to a private school. He did not return. Mrs. Bratton said her husband had been "despondent."

A graduate of Millsaps college, Jackson, Mr. Bratton had served churches at several points in the South. He had been rector of churches at Demopolis, Ala., Houston and Wichita Falls, Texas.

Survivors include his widow, four children and three sisters, Mrs. Marion Brister, Yazoo City, Miss.; Mrs. Isabel Bridges, Jackson, Miss.; Mrs. Robert Connor, Houston, Texas, and one brother, John Bratton of Raleigh, N. C.

Last August another son, Randolph, was found shot to death at Winnsboro, S. C. He had received treatment for several years at the Veterans' hospital in Columbia, S. C., for complications resulting from World war wounds.

### W. M. Bratton, York, Passes Saturday

York, Jan. 15.—William Louis Bratton, 83, lifelong resident of York, died suddenly at an early hour this morning at his home here. Funeral services will be conducted tomorrow afternoon and interment will be in the Methodist cemetery on Jefferson street, where several members of his immediate family are buried.

Mr. Bratton's parents were Dr. J. Rufus Bratton and Mrs. Mary Rebecca Massey Bratton.

Surviving are three brothers, J. B. Bratton and Dr. R. A. Bratton of York; and Col. T. S. Bratton of Atlanta, Ga., and one sister, Mrs. R. B. Hanahan of Winnsboro.
