Native of Fairfield Passes At Her Home On Monday Afternoon. Funeral Services Are Held At Salem Church.

Mrs. Sallie Frances Crawford, 76, died at her home, 2701 Duncan street, at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon. Mrs. Crawford was a native of Fairfield county and was a daughter of the late W. J. and Jemima Dye Crowder. She had lived in Columbia for eight years.

Mrs. Crawford had been in declining health for two years. She was a member of Salem Presbyterian church at Salem Crossroads in Fairfield county.

Surviving are her husband, Samuel R. Crawford; four daughters, Mrs. Lillie M. Edrington and Mrs. J. E. Wylie, both of Winnsboro, and Miss Belle Crawford and Miss Mary Helen Crawford of Columbia; five sons, J. D. Crawford, and W. D. Crawford of Winnsboro, Ernest B. Crawford of Strother, T. P. Crawford of Columbia and Charles R. Crawford of Camden; two sisters, Mrs. John T. Pressly of Chester and Mrs. Jesse Hill of Shelton; two brothers, Charles E. Crowder of Newberry, B. D. Crowder of Blairs and 15 grandchildren.

Prayer services were conducted at the residence at 3:45 by the Rev. Dr. Timmons, pastor of Eau Claire Presbyterian church.

David P. Crosby Dies At Chester

David Pierce Crosby, 42, manager and one of the owners of Hotel Chester, died at 6:25 Wednesday evening at the hotel following a stroke of paralysis which he suffered earlier in the afternoon. One of Chester's most prominent and popular citizens, his death came as a great shock to his host of friends.

Mr. Crosby was born January 20, 1896, in Fairfield county, the son of the late David Pierce Crosby and Mrs. Fanny Crosby. He was educated at Chester high school and Bailey Military institute of Greenwood. He first engaged in farming in northern Fairfield county at his home. After successfully farming some years he went to Haines City, Fla. where he engaged in the lumber business.

Owing to the illness of his brother, Claud David Crosby, he disposed of the Florida interests and came to Chester to take over the management of his business. He operated this large business up until about a year ago, when he and several associates purchased Hotel Chester and began the operation of it. Mr. Crosby was a member of Knights of Pythias, a Mason and a member of the First Baptist church.

He married Miss Pearl Myers of Chester and from this union two children survive: Miss Sara Frances Crosby and Miss Lucille Myers Crosby of Chester, and four sisters, Mrs. John Simpson Stone, Sr., of Fairfield county, Mrs. J. I. Collins of Chester, Mrs. Philip M. Deit of Hendersonville, N. C., and Mrs. William K. Gunter of Gaffney.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon at First Baptist church with the pastor, the Rev. J. E. Rawlinson, officiating, with interment in Evergreen cemetery.

ROBERT COLEMAN In Loving Memory of My Mother DIES IN MIAMI

During his residence in South Carolina Mr. Brown was interested in the erection of modern school buildings at various points in the state.

He planned and caused to be built new churches at Liberty Hill, Heath Springs, and Seneca. He was deeply interested in Sabbath school work and served for nearly fifty years as a Presbyterian Sabbath school superintendent. He was active in rural communities and was instrumental in the re-opening and re-organization of a number of weak mission churches.

His death was a great loss to the affection of a host of friends whose hearts are deeply touched by this sad Providence.
