Mr. McKeown had planned to attend the funeral of a relative, J. Thomas McDonald, Sr., and had been waiting for an automobile when he started walking. Another car driven by his brother-in-law, Stormant B. McDonald, which was to have taken Mr. McKeown to the funeral came along, having just passed over a hill on which the highway curved and side-swiped him. Both legs were badly broken, along with other injuries and he lost a large amount of blood. He was rushed to the hospital and died about four hours later.

Prominent Citizen Who Served As Fairfield's Sheriff For 17 Years, Passes Early Monday Morning. Final Rites Held Tuesday.

James Macfie, 72, died at his home in Winnsboro Monday morning at 6 o'clock, after an illness of ten days.

Mr. Macfie, who was born December 7th, 1865, was the son of Captain James P. and Agnes Rice Macfie, and was a life long resident of Winnsboro and Fairfield county. His wife, who was Miss Lorena Milling, preceded him to the grave 17 months ago. Mr. and Mrs. Macfie had lived in Winnsboro since 1903, and for 17 years he served as Fairfield's popular sheriff. In the service of his county he received a wound from which he never recovered.

Surviving are two sons, James of Winnsboro, and Palmer of DeLand, Fla.; two granddaughters, Betty of Winnsboro, and Lorena, of DeLand, Fla., and two brothers, R. R. Macfie of Winnsboro and Spencer M. Macfie of Brevard, N. C.

Funeral services were conducted from the Presbyterian church Tuesday morning by Dr. G. G. Mayes, assisted by Rev. Charles Harris and Dr. Oliver Johnson. Interment was in the family plot at Millings Cross Roads.
