Talmadge Boulware Is Killed In Wreck

Pierec McLane and Gene Martin Are Injured When Car Gets Out of Control At Salem Cross Roads. 1939

Talmadge Boulware, 37, was killed in an automobile wreck about 6:30 o'clock Saturday evening on Highway 215 at Salem Cross Roads. The accident occurred on a straight stretch when Mr. Boulware evidently lost control of the car. The automobile turned over several times and was completely demolished. All of the tires had blown out and it was thought that a blowout may have caused the accident.

In the car with Mr. Boulware, who was driving, were Pierce McLane and Gene Martin. All three occupants were of the Salem-Strother neighborhood.

Messrs. McLane and Martin were rushed to the John Buchanan hospital in Winnsboro immediately after the accident. Mr. McLane was dismissed from the hospital Tuesday morning; Mr. Martin, whose injuries were painful but not serious, is reported much improved, but he is still confined.

Four Killed When Car Hits Bridge

Rion Residents Die In Crash En Route To Pawley's Island. Mrs. A. A. Brooks, Lone Survivor, Is Critically Injured. 7/1939

Sudden death came to three Fairfield people Friday evening about 11:30 o'clock when the car in which they were riding crashed into a bridge railing over Johnson swamp between Kingstree and Andrews. Those who died almost instantly were Aubrey Addison Brooks, 38, his four-year-old son, Harry Trapp (Buddy) Brooks and Miss Nell Humphries, all of Rion. Miss Humphries died as she was being rushed to a Lake City hospital. Miss Thelma Sitton died Monday morning at two o'clock in the Lake City infirmary. The fifth occupant of the car, Mrs. A. A. Brooks lies critically ill in the Lake City infirmary.

Mr. and Mrs. Brooks and party left their home at Rion Friday afternoon about 5:30 o'clock for a week-end at Pawley's Island. According to passing motorists, the car in which they were riding apparently left the pavement about fifty feet before striking the bridge railing. It is thought likely that a blow-out caused the car to get out of control. All five were thought to have been knocked unconscious by the force of the impact. Persons who stopped to give first aid to the injured said that another car, apparently unable to see the wreck, crashed into the wrecked car as the stricken people were being removed, causing further damage.

The injured were rushed to the hospital but Miss Humphries died en route.

A pall of sadness fell upon the community of Rion, and all of the county, when news of this quadruple tragedy was learned. It was perhaps the worse automobile accident in which Fairfield people have figured.

Mr. Brooks was foreman of the Brooks Granite Company, of Rion, a company owned by his brother, Ray Brooks. Miss Humphries was secretary to the company, and she was also the Rion correspondent for The News and Herald. Miss Sitton held a position with the Phillips Granite Company. All were well known in Rion, Winnsboro and in the county.

Funeral services were conducted at 5 p. m. Sunday at the Greenbrier Methodist church by the Revs. J. H. Brown and Walter Johnson. She is survived by her mother, Mrs. Annie Humphries, and two brothers, Jack and Jim Humphries, all of Rion.

Active pallbearers were Lester Robinson, Okey Triplette, Bill Estes, Charles Beam, of Chester, E. V. Lewis and Bratton Hall. Interment was in the Greenbrier cemetery.

MRS. A. W. BROWN CLAIMED BY DEATH

Winnsboro Woman Passes Thursday Evening After Lingering Illness. Funeral Services For Life-Long Resident of Fairfield Are Held Saturday. 1939

Mrs. Maggie Gladden Brown, 76, died at her home in Winnsboro Thursday evening, March 2, at 11:45 o'clock, after an illness of months. She had been in declining health for a number of years.

Mrs. Brown, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John G. Gladden was born near Blythewood, then a part of Fairfield County, November 2, 1861. She was a descendent of the Williams, Hagoods and Kinslers, old established Richland County families.

More than half century ago she married the late A. Walker Brown, of Winnsboro, and since that time, she and her family have lived in Winnsboro making their home in the house, once the residence of the late Rev. J. R. McAlpine, near the Mt. Zion campus. Here all of the children except the eldest were born.

Quiet, retiring and unassuming, Mrs. Brown was nonetheless a faithful member of the Winnsboro Methodist Church, an active worker and a regular attendant at all church services up to only a short time ago when her failing health kept her at home.

She is survived by five sons, O. Ross Brown, of Bennettsville, Harold W. Brown, of Birmingham, Alabama, Kinsler W. Brown, of Dallas, Texas, Otis Brown, of Winnsboro, and Marion G. Brown, co-editor of The News and Herald, Winnsboro. She is also survived by three grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

A sister, Mrs. J. G. Halliburton, of Knoxville, Tenn., and a brother, J. Clifton Gladden, of Atlanta, Ga., also survive.

Funeral services, conducted by Rev. J. H. Brown, Rev. Arthur M. Martin and Rev. Frank J. Allen, were held from the home Saturday morning at eleven o'clock, and interment was in the Methodist cemetery, where Mrs. Brown was laid to rest beside her husband who predeceased her by twenty years.
