Samuel Buchanan McMaster, 65, one of Columbia's best known and best loved citizens, died at 12:30 Tuesday at his home, 709 High street. He had been ill since Christmas and for some time his condition had been precarious.

The funeral was held at the First Presbyterian church of which he was a ruling elder, Wednesday morning.

Mr. McMaster, son of Colonel Fitz William McMaster and Mary Jane Macfie McMaster, was born in the McMaster home, northwest corner of Laurel and Bull streets, and lived there until his marriage in 1937 to Miss Elizabeth Alford of Dillon county. In addition to his wife, he is survived by three sisters and two brothers: Mrs. James H. Woodrow, Thornwell McMaster, Miss Agnes McMaster, Mrs. Joseph R. Foard and Col. George H. McMaster. He leaves, also, the following nieces and nephews: F. W. McKay, Asheville, N. C.; Mrs. Robert Glasgow, Converse college; Douglas McKay, Columbia; Woodrow McKay, Lexington, N. Mr. McMaster was president of S. B. McMaster, incorporated, sporting goods and automobile tire distributors and a member of the firm of McMaster and Cate, tire dealers. He, for many years, had been in the sporting goods and automobile tire business and was one of the pioneer automobile owners and dealers in this city at one time having the agency for the Ford. He was a charter member of the Rotary club and long had been active in Boy Scout work, for which he was given the coveted Beaver hat in 1932.

Mr. McMaster was a devoted churchman. For years he served first as a deacon at the First Presbyterian church and then as a ruling elder. So long as his health permitted there were few services at the church without his being present. He was a man who did a great deal of good. He was known and liked by all classes and by both races, and truly his friends were legion. He had a wide acquaintance with the young people in whom he was always so interested. His death will bring genuine sorrow to many hearts.

A lover of the out-of-doors, an ardent sportsman in the truest meaning of the word, Mr. McMaster spent much time at his country place, in lower Richland county, which so appropriately bears the title, "Goodwill." Here he entertained often and among the pleasant occasions there, always to be remembered, were his annual suppers given about this time of the year, for the diaconate and the session of his beloved first church.
