MISS DOUGLAS DIES IN BRAZIL

Miss Margaret Moore Douglas, 64, widely known in Southern Presbyterian church missionary circles and who had been a missionary at Pernambuco, Brazil, for the last 34 years, died at her post of duty Wednesday, according to a message received in Chester on Friday.

Miss Douglas was a native of the White Rock section of Fairfield county, being a daughter of the late Rev. James Douglas of that place and the late Margaret McDowell Douglas, a native of Sumter.

She was graduated from Winthrop college at Rock Hill. Following graduation she was assistant in mathematics at Winthrop for a number of years.

She next went to Pernambuco, where she became a member of the faculty of the Agnes-Erskine college where she taught for many years. While her health had not been so good lately her death came as a great shock to relatives and friends.

Miss Douglas was a woman of splendid mental attainments and had done an excellent work in Brazil.

She had spent much time in Chester as the guest of her brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Douglas, and sister, Miss Agnes Douglas, and had a host of friends here as well as in other sections of the Carolinas.

Miss Douglas is survived by the following brothers and sisters: Dr. James M. Douglas, Miss Katherine M. Douglas, both of Davidson, N. C.; Miss Agnes R. Douglas of Davidson, a member of the faculty of the Chester high school; Robert L. Douglas of Chester and William A. Douglas of Rock Hill.

DEATH CLAIMS MRS. EDMUNDS

Prominent Ridgeway Woman Passes Suddenly Tuesday Morning. Funeral Services To Be Held Thursday (Today) Afternoon.

The death of Mrs. James Spann Edmunds, of Ridgeway, which occurred early Tuesday morning, January 9th, was a distinct shock to her family and friends, although she had been in failing health for the past two years. Mrs. Edmunds was suffering from the effect of a recent fall which caused her to spend several weeks in the Columbia hospital, but she had returned to her home in Ridgeway shortly before Christmas and was apparently convalescing satisfactorily.

Mrs. Edmunds, the former Marion Boyd, daughter of Dr. John Boyd and Lucy Bryant Boyd, was born at Bryant Hill, the old home of her maternal forebears, near the Longtown section of Fairfield county, on February 22nd, 1871. In 1876, when Hampton was elected governor, Dr. John Boyd became school commissioner and the family moved to Winnsboro. Mrs. Edmunds attended school at Mt. Hope, taught by Henrietta Thomas, finishing at Mt. Zion. For several years she taught school.

In 1894 she was married to the late James Spann Edmunds, thus uniting two of the old Fairfield county families.

Mrs. Edmunds was a woman of charming personality and beauty. Popular and beloved, a born leader, she was active in church and civic work. She served for several years as chairman for both Red Cross and Christmas Seal drives, and Ridgeway always exceeded its quota.

Surviving her four sons, James Spann Edmunds and William Clarence Edmunds, of Ridgeway; John Edmunds, of Spartanburg; and Edmunds, of Reid Brown, of Van, Texas, and Mrs. Olin Sawyer, of Georgetown, S. C.; one brother, James Boyd of Benton, Ala.; and eight grandchildren.
