Prominent Mitford Man Passes Tuesday After Year's Illness, At The Age of 84.

Charles Strother Ford, 84 cominent citizen of Fairfield prominent Fairfield county, died at his home in the Mitford section Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, after an illness of one year.

He was born in Chester county August 13, 1856, the only child of the late Strother Ford and Mrs. Jane McWaters Ford. When he was quite young, his parents mov ed to the Mitford section of Fairfield county. He was educated in the county schools and at Kings Mountain Military academy at Yorkville. He married Miss Flor-ence Cornelia Culp, second daugh-ter of Colonel John Ripley Culp and Mrs. Fannie Ragsdale Culp of Chester. For many years he made his home at Chester where he was prominently engaged in the insurance and real estate business. He took a wide interest in all movements looking toward the advancement of his section.
