

Boulevard Rites Held Last Thursday

Funeral services for Edward Thomas Boulevard, 57, who died Monday evening at the Dr. Lisenby hospital in Panama City, Fla., following a short illness of pneumonia, were conducted at 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon at Cool Branch Baptist church by the Rev. J. F. Moseley, minister, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Wayne Bolick, minister of the Lutheran church of Columbia and the Rev. J. E. Rawlinson, minister of the First Baptist church of Chester, following which the interment was made in the church cemetery.

Mr. Boulevard is survived by his widow, Mrs. Eva Hair Boulevard, and the following children: H. C. Boulevard, Mrs. S. G. Mrs. Alice Brice of Fairfield County Dies in Atlanta

Mrs. Alice Miller Brice, 87, widow of Samuel G. Brice, one of Fairfield county's prominent women, died October 5th at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Leslie Brice, in Atlanta. She had been in declining health for some time.

She had lived for many years at "The Cedars," an historic 1,000-acre plantation south of Blackstock, a widely known landmark between Winnsboro and Chester.

Funeral services were conducted Friday morning at 11 o'clock at the New Hope ARP church in Fairfield county by the Rev. W. A. Kennedy, and interment followed in the church cemetery.

She was a native of Shelby, N. C., being born January 25, 1856, the daughter of the late Dr. John C. and Mrs. Elizabeth Fullenwider Miller. She married Samuel G. Brice of Fairfield county in 1876.

Mrs. Brice is survived by a son, George W. Brice of Charlotte, N. C., and a daughter, Mrs. Thomas Leslie Brice of Atlanta and the following grandchildren, Walter M. and Robert C. Brice of Spartanburg; Platt Brice of Atlanta; Elizabeth and Francis Brice of Atlanta; Susanne and George Brice, Jr., of Charlotte. Her daughter was the former Miss Bessie Wade Brice and married a distant relative, Mrs. Brice had resided in Atlanta since last summer with her daughter.

The body of Mrs. Janie Kennedy Brice was brought from Spartanburg last Monday, Feb. 15th, and laid beside that of her husband, James A. Brice, in the Associate Reformed Presbyterian cemetery in Winnsboro.

Mrs. Brice was reared in Due West, S. C., the daughter of J. P. Kennedy, for many years president of the then Due West Female College, now a department of Erskine College. Mrs. Brice came to Winnsboro in 1876, the bride of James A. Brice, where she made her home for 30 years. Here she reared her family of five sons and two daughters.

Shortly after the death of her husband in March 1909, Mrs. Brice moved to Spartanburg, S. C., where she made her home until her death Feb. 14th. Mrs. Brice had just passed her 89th year.

A woman of culture and charm, she was deeply religious and devoted her life to her family and her church. She stimulated her children to leadership in their school and college life, and guided them in the way of truth. The church in which she was reared had no more loyal and devoted member than Mrs. Janie Kennedy Brice.

Dr. Buchanan Dies Suddenly

Dr. John Creighton Buchanan died suddenly here Sunday afternoon, February 28, 1943, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Frank Snowden, on Garden street.

While he had had several heart attacks in the past several years, lately he was feeling particularly well. Only a few days before his death he had told his sister, Mrs. D. V. Walker, that he was feeling like a young man.

Doctor Buchanan, the son of Dr. R. A. Buchanan and Mrs. Rebecca Woodward Buchanan, was born August 6, 1862. After attending Mount Zion Institute, he entered the University of South Carolina, graduating with first honors in 1883. He was graduated from the Medical College of South Carolina in 1887 with first honors and began the practice of medicine in Winnsboro in 1888. He continued in practice 41 years, retiring in 1929.

Doctor Buchanan is survived by the following sons and daughters: Dr. John C. Buchanan, a major in the army of the United States; William Young Buchanan and Mrs. Frank Snowden, Winnsboro; Mrs. George Coleman, Montgomery, Ala.; Mrs. Frank Sanborn, Danville, Va., and eight grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. D. V. Walker, Sr., of Winnsboro.

Doctor Buchanan was very active in the civic and religious affairs of the community until the time of his death. He was a member of the Mount Zion society, chairman of the board of public works of Winnsboro, and an elder in Sion Presbyterian church.

His funeral was held from the Sion Presbyterian church Tuesday morning, March 2, at 11 o'clock, and the interment was in the graveyard of the church in the family plot.

The Rev. Arthur Byrd of Sion church and the Rev. S. C. Byrd conducted the services.
