Local Pilot Passes Friday at Fort Jackson Hospital, Following Fatal Crash Here Last Wednesday.

Billy J. Estes, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Estes of Winnsboro, died Friday morning at 1:30 o'clock as a result of injuries sustained in the crash of a dual-control trainer plane here last Wednesday afternoon. The tragedy occurred in the back yard of a residence on Bratton street, directly behind Mt. Zion Institute.

The plane was from the Southern Aviation school at Camden, where young Estes, a civilian, had been since October 6, taking a refresher course preliminary to becoming an instructor. Previously, he had been a naval air cadet. Bob Ferguson of Anderson, who was also critically injured in the crash, is reported somewhat improved. He is suffering from multiple fractures and head injuries.

Estes attended Mt. Zion Institute and Clemson College prior to enlisting in the Navy.

Besides his parents, he is survived by his wife, the former Miss Mildred Ruth Braswell, to whom he was married on September 9th. Also surviving are three brothers and one sister: Defaux and Bobby Lee Estes of Winnsboro; Capt. T. J. Estes, Jr., now serving in the U. S. Air Corps in England; and Miss Audrey Estes of Winnsboro.

Sergeant Coleman enlisted immediately after graduation and was called to service in October 1942. He took his pre-flight training at Keesler Field, Biloxi, Miss., and from there went to Laredo, Tex., for training in gunnery school, where he received the rank of sergeant. He was serving as flight engineer at the time of his death, having passed his cadet test last week.

He was home on furlough in August.

He is survived by a brother, Virgil C. Coleman, Jr., and a sister, Miss Alice Elizabeth Coleman.

The body will be brought to Pine Bluff for burial.
