

Jenkinsville Man, Dies In Japan 16 Months Ago

Pfc. William L. Moore, 42, Had Served In U. S. Regular Army for Eighteen Years.

Mr. and Mrs. A. K. Moore of Jenkinsville received a telegram from the War Department Monday saying that their son, Pfc. William L. Moore, 42, had died on Honshu Island, Japan, on January 12, 1944, as a result of pneumonia. The report of his death was received from the Japanese government through the International Red Cross.

Pfc. Moore had been with the regular army for about 18 years, went from Fort Bragg, N. C., to Washington, where he was with a medical outfit at Walter Reed Hospital, then went to Panama, and at the beginning of hostilities with Japan, he was sent to the Philippines, still serving with a medical detachment. He was taken prisoner in the first siege of the Philippines, and a card was received by his mother from him as a prisoner of war, saying he was all right. Nothing had been heard recently, until this telegram reported his death more than sixteen months ago. The message was signed by J. A. Ulio, Adjutant General.

Charles H. Neil, 62, Passes Monday

Charles H. Neil, son of the late John J. and Mary Grey Thompson Neil, died at the age of sixty-two at his boyhood home here on the night of April sixteenth after a severe illness of two months.

Mr. Neil had spent the past 22 years in Hawaii where he was a professor in the English Department of the University of Hawaii. After Pearl Harbor, he was evacuated home by the government, after being retired from the University because of ill-health. He has spent the years since in semi-invalidism at his home.

He was a devout member of the Catholic church. The funeral services were conducted at the family residence at eleven o'clock Wednesday morning, and interment was in the family plot in Sion Presbyterian cemetery.

Surviving are three sisters: Mrs. Harry H. Withers, Misses Margaret and Nan Neil; one brother, John J. Neil of Columbia; a niece Miss Mary Grey Withers of Columbia and Winnsboro; four nephews, all of whom are in the armed services: John J. Neil, Jr., Charles McKeown Neil, Robert Bruce Neil, all of Columbia and John S. Withers of Winnsboro.
