

Miss Susie Crawford Killed, Two Injured In Train-Car Accident

Tragedy Occurs at Blackstock Grade Crossing Sunday Afternoon at 4 O'clock. Mrs. Mary Robertson and Daughter, Frances, Receiving Treatment at Columbia Hospital.

Miss Susie Mobley Crawford, of Winnsboro, was fatally injured and Mrs. Mary Robertson and daughter, Frances Robertson, Route 1, seriously hurt as a result of a train-car collision Sunday afternoon at four o'clock, at a grade railroad crossing in Blackstock. The three were immediately taken to the Pryor hospital in Chester where Miss Crawford died about two hours after the accident.

Funeral Services Tuesday for Miss Susie M. Crawford

Funeral services for Miss Susie Mobley Crawford, 54, were held Tuesday afternoon from Zion Presbyterian church in Winnsboro, with the Rev. Arthur M. Martin, pastor, officiating. Miss Crawford died early Sunday evening shortly after reaching Pryor hospital in Chester.

The daughter of the late David A. Crawford and Susan Mobley Crawford, Miss Crawford had spent her entire life in Winnsboro where she took a keen interest in the civic and religious activities of the community. She was especially concerned with the work of the local chapter of the Winnsboro Christian Temperance Union, and for a number of years had served as the efficient and faithful librarian at the Winnsboro Mills community library. She leaves many friends relatives and acquaintances who bemoan her tragic passing.

Miss Crawford is survived by three brothers, David A. Crawford and Ernest M. Crawford, both of Winnsboro, and Edward Crawford of Pearl River. Last Tuesday afternoon in the Methodist cemetery. Serving as pallbearers were J. H. McMaster, U. G. DesPortes, Tom H. Ketchin, F. Harris McDonald, Joe W. Jell and Moultrie D. Douglas.

Ridgeway Native Dies At Fort Mill

Final Rites for Dr. James R. DesPortes, Prominent Physician, Held Tuesday.

Dr. James R. DesPortes, 69, prominent Fort Mill physician, died at his home there Monday and funeral services were conducted from the residence Tuesday afternoon. Interment followed in Ridgeway.

Doctor DesPortes was a native of Ridgeway, but had practiced in Fort Mill for 28 years. He was a past president of the South Carolina Medical association, serving in that capacity in 1937-38. He was a trustee of the South Carolina Medical college and served as a lieutenant colonel in the state guard medical detachment during World War II. He was a Mason and a Shriner, and was a member of the Episcopal church in Ridgeway.

Survivors include his widow, the former Miss Lila Parker; a nephew, Major Jack DesPortes of the United States army; two brothers, Harry W. DesPortes of Columbia, and W. S. DesPortes of Ridgeway; two sisters, Mrs. Eleanor Peay of Ridgeway, and Mrs. A. B. Bishop of Philadelphia.

David R. Coleman Services For Mrs. John L. Carey Are Held On Tuesday

One of Fairfield's Oldest Citizens Passes at Feasterville Home, Wednesday, June 18

David Roe Coleman, Sr., 90, died at his home in the Feasterville section of Fairfield county, Wednesday afternoon, June 18, at two o'clock. He had been in declining health for a period of several months but prior to that time he had been very active on his farm and in the work of his church, in which he maintained a keen interest.

One of the oldest residents of Fairfield county at the time of his death, Mr. Coleman was born June 3, 1857, the son of David A. Coleman and Sarah Ann Yongue Coleman. He had been a member of Salem Presbyterian church since September, 1874, and as clerk of the elders for 37 years. He was superintendent of the Sunday school for more than three decades. His wife, Lucy Hamilton Coleman, predeceased him by two years.

Surviving him are one brother, W. Y. Coleman of Feasterville, and the following sons and daughters: Betty Coleman and Annie Coleman of Blairs; Mrs. T. A. Ladd, Sr., Strother, Mrs. J. R.
