

Mrs. J. B. Doty Claimed by Death

Funeral Services for Winnsboro Woman Who Died Monday in Columbia Held at Sion Church Wednesday.

Mrs. Lucy Henry Doty, widow of the late Jesse Barkley Doty, died at the Columbia hospital Monday afternoon at 4:40 o'clock, following an operation performed a few days earlier. She had been in declining health for some time and was taken seriously ill on the return trip from Honolulu two weeks ago.

The daughter of the late Francis and Sara Henry of Abbeville, she had spent her entire married life in Winnsboro. Since the death of her husband in January, 1941, she had successfully managed the family's farming interests, continuing to make a home for her seven children. In addition, she took an active interest in the affairs of Sion Presbyterian church, of which she was a faithful member, and she played a prominent part in the civic and educational life of the town, serving at one time as president of the Parent-Teachers association, and giving generously of her time in other public enterprises. During the war she had three sons and one daughter in the services.

Mrs. Doty is survived by four sons, J. Barkley Doty of Honolulu, Albert Henry and William Doty of Winnsboro, and Frank Doty of Salt Lake City, Utah; three daughters, Mrs. Phil H. Davis of New York, Mrs. J. Dorman Turner of Nashville, Ga., and Susan Doty of Winnsboro; and one sister, Mrs. G. H. Neuffer of Abbeville.

Funeral services, conducted by the Rev. Arthur M. Martin, were held Wednesday afternoon from Sion Presbyterian church and interment was in the Presbyterian cemetery.
