Mrs. Katherine Kellam Quattlebaum, wife of Dr. A. Gordon Quattlebaum, died at her residence on West Washington street last Wednesday evening at 7:30 o'clock, after an illness of several months.

The daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. S. A. Kellam, of Cape Charles, Virginia, she had made her home in Winnsboro for many years. Until her health failed, she was very active in the religious and civic affairs of the town, being a faithful member of the First Baptist church, a charter member of the Old Winnsboro civic club (predecessor of the Woman's club), the Round Dozen and other allied organizations.

She is survived by her husband, Dr. A. Gordon Quattlebaum, two brothers, Harold and James Kellam of Camden, N. J., several nieces and nephews, and an aunt, Mrs. J. D. Mapp, who was living with Mrs. Quattlebaum at the time of her death.

Funeral services, conducted by the Rev. H. Floyd Surles, of Society Hill, her former pastor, and the Rev. Ollin J. Owens, pastor of the First Baptist church, Winnsboro, were conducted from the home Friday afternoon at four o'clock and interment was in the Episcopal cemetery.

He was a faithful and loving husband and father, always lending a helping hand when he could, numbered his friends by the scores, and was loved by all who knew him, both white and colored.
