Military Service For Sgt. Hagood to Be Held Friday

Funeral services for Sergeant Albert Lee Hagood, who was killed on Iwo Jima on February 23, 1945, will be conducted at 4 o'clock Friday afternoon in the Union Memorial Presbyterian church by the pastor, the Rev. Arthur M. Martin. The military service will be conducted by the National Guard unit. The body arrived Tuesday morning and will remain at the Harden Funeral Home until the time of service.

Sgt. Hagood was born May 6, 1920, and was the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. George B. Hagood of Winnsboro, S. C. He joined the Marine Corps in February, 1940, and saw service in the Canal Zone, Guam, the Marianas Islands and on Iwo Jima. He received the Purple Heart with gold star for wounds received in action on Guam; the American Defense service medal with fleet clasp; the American Campaign medal; Asiatic-Pacific medal and World War II Victory medal.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. B. Hagood; five brothers, Edgar E. Hagood, Thomas B. Hagood, Claude R. Hagood, all of Winnsboro; Marion Hagood of Spartanburg and George B.
