

# Mrs. Cathcart Is Fatally Injured as Car Overturns

### Funeral Services for Winnsboro Woman to Be Held Thursday Afternoon.

Mrs. Terrece Tennant Cathcart was fatally injured Tuesday morning about 11:30 o'clock when the car in which she was riding was overturned on a freshly top-soiled highway approximately 9 miles west of Winnsboro, as the driver attempted to turn into a detour. She died at 3:30 p.m., at a Columbia hospital.

The car was driven by her son, Chief Petty Officer Ervin Boyd Cathcart, who is at home on a 30-day leave from the navy. Neither he nor the other occupants of the car—Mrs. Lewis Still, Mrs. Cathcart's daughter, and Terrece Still, her young granddaughter—were seriously injured. Mrs. Cathcart and the infant were thrown from the car which overturned on them, but the child miraculously escaped unscathed. When the mishap occurred, the party was returning from a monument company where Mrs. Cathcart had gone to select a stone for another son, Walter Greene Cathcart, who was killed on Anzio Beach during the war.

Mrs. Cathcart was born at Woodward, the daughter of the late B. G. and Rosa Boyd Tennant, and she had lived in Winnsboro most of her life. She was a faithful member of Sion Presbyterian Church where she took a most active part in all of the affairs of the church and its auxiliary organizations. She was also a member of the American Legion Auxiliary.

She is survived by her husband, Charles Ervin Cathcart; one daughter, Mrs. Lewis Still, Winnsboro; two sons, Charles E. Cathcart, Jr., Memphis, Tenn., and Ervin Boyd Cathcart of the U. S. Navy; three sisters, Mrs. Otto Ray, Chester, Mrs. J. G. Stover and Mrs. Dan Hollis, both of Winnsboro; two brothers, Chalmers Tennant of Winnsboro and A. Boyd Tennant of Lancaster. Five grandchildren, Sarah, Lewis, and Terrece Still and Peggy and Charles Perry Cathcart, also survive.
