

H. E. Meade, 67, Passes Sunday ¹⁹⁵⁰

Services for One-Time Minister and Evange- list Held Tuesday.

Harry Edward Meade, 67, former minister and evangelist and proprietor of Meade-Villa apartments, died Sunday morning at 11 o'clock at his home four miles north of Winnsboro. He had been in declining health for a number of years. He suffered a cerebral hemorrhage and heart attack on Saturday, from which he did not rally.

Born in Canada on June 25, 1884, he was the second son of the Rev. and Mrs. Samuel Meade. At the age of 17, after finishing high school, he enlisted in the British Constabulary and served for a number of years in the Boer War in South Africa. He also served in World War I as a sergeant in the Quartermaster Division of the Infantry. Thereafter, he entered the Rescue Mission Work, working in several great centers of population in the United States and Canada. In 1922, after serving in a number of Northern churches, Mr. Meade was called to the First Baptist church of Marked Tree, Arkansas, and there he was instrumental in erecting a beautiful new house of worship.

A few years later, he joined three of his brothers ("The Four Meade Brothers") in the field of evangelism and conducted revivals throughout the South. One was held in Winnsboro in 1927. Subsequently, he became pastor of Stephen Greene Memorial Baptist church at Winnsboro Mills and he later served the Baptist church at Chesnee, S. C.

He left the ministry due to failing health, spending the summers in New York and the winters in Florida and South Carolina. Eleven years ago he opened the Meade-Villa apartments on Highway 21, north of Winnsboro, and there he conducted a reputable tourist court and restaurant.

Mr. Meade is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mae Bond Meade; three daughters, Mrs. Sam Coleman of Columbia, Mrs. Clayton Bradshaw of Tulsa, Okla., and Mrs. Jacques Surer of Philadelphia; two sons, Cecil Meade of Canada and Keith Meade of Columbia; three brothers, the Rev. Walter J. Meade of Norfolk, the Rev. Lawrence A. Meade of Camarillo, Calif., and Harold C. Meade of Ohio; one sister, Mrs. B. A. Fisher, Tacoma, Fla. Nine grandchildren and several nieces and nephews also survive.

Funeral services, conducted by the Rev. Ollin J. Owens, pastor, assisted by the Rev. Russell M. Kerr and the Rev. Arthur M. Martin, were held from the First Baptist church, Winnsboro, Tuesday afternoon and interment was in the Greenlawn Memorial cemetery in Columbia.

Active pallbearers were Harry Fisher, Allen Meade, Guy Surer, Steve Coleman, J. C. Fant and James McGinnis.

Harry Edward Meade, soldier in two wars, minister evangelist, restaurateur, raconteur and world traveler, who died Sunday at the age of 67, was an interesting individualist. Many were those who journeyed to Meade-Villa to enjoy the fine cuisine—and the food was famous for miles around—only to remain longer to listen to his absorbing talk. In an age when conversation has sometimes been described as a "lost art," Mr. Meade could discourse on a wide range of subjects: the Boer War, where he met many "big-name" personalities, and the diamond mines there which was one cause of the conflict; religion, politics, fishing in Canada and the manufacturing of mirrors in St. Louis, where the plant in which he was interested had to pay tribute to the Pendergast machine. He ran a reputable eating and lodging place which was an asset to Winnsboro and vicinity. Mr. Meade was possessed of many fine traits of character and he will be missed.

Miss Janie Lemmon Dies At Age of 93

Veteran Teacher Was Among Oldest Resi- dents of County. Re- called Sherman's March

Miss Sara Janie Lemmon died at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon, Feb. 4, at her home in the Union section of Fairfield county after an illness of several weeks. She was 93 years old. ¹⁹⁵⁰

Born Oct. 7, 1856, in Fairfield county, Miss Lemmon had lived in her old Colonial home all of her life. She was taken there at the age of three weeks by her parents, the late John Montgomery Lemmon and Mary Yongue Lemmon.

She had memories of the Confederate War, during which her home was set afire by Sherman's men en route to Columbia.

Miss Lemmon was a graduate of Due West College, being, before her death, the last surviving member of the class of 1875. For a number of years she taught in the public schools of the county and for a great part of her life conducted a Sunday school class in her home every Sunday afternoon for the boys and girls of the community.

She is survived by one brother, William James Lemmon, and a number of nieces and nephews.

Funeral services were conducted at the home Sunday afternoon, Feb. 5, by the Rev. W. R. Parvin, pastor of Lebanon Presbyterian church, of which she was a faithful member. Interment followed in the family cemetery.

Injuries Fatal to Winnsboro Rider

"Pete" Glisson Killed In Fall August 10 on California Racetrack.

Death struck down apprentice jockey John Weldon (Pete) Glisson, 17, of Winnsboro, on August 10 at the Del Mar, California race track where he started his riding career and ended it—all in less than a year. ¹⁹⁵⁰

Glisson, younger brother of national riding champion Gordol Glisson, was fatally injured during the running of the fourth race on the same track where he rode the first winner of his career last August 19.

Survivor of another near tragic accident on the New Orleans race grounds, last August 7, the young rider was aboard Mr. and Mrs. Jack Carava's Broker when the horse snapped his left foreleg and fell approaching the first turn.

Young Glisson was hurled to the infield, his head apparently striking the rail as he went down. He never regained consciousness and died soon after arrival at a hospital of a fracture of the skull and a fractured cervical vertebrae in the neck.

His brother, Gordon, was riding C. H. Jones and Son's Winsir in the race in which the accident occurred. Gordon cancelled all mounts for the day and rushed to the hospital, but did not arrive before his brother died.

John's first brush with death was in the New Orleans spill, in which he suffered a fractured skull and a spinal injury. He was in a coma for ten days, but recovered to ride again at Lincoln Fields, Ill., on May 6.

He rode several winners at Lincoln Fields, then moved to Hollywood Park to continue his comeback. On weekends he traveled to Agua Caliente, Mexico, where he apparently became the leading reinsman with 12 victories in six days.

Last year John rode 44 winners, 18 seconds, and 22 thirds on 215 mounts. This year he had ridden 35 winners, including several at Hollywood Park and two at the young Del Mar meeting.

Glisson's death was the first jockey fatality in the 11-year racing history of Del Mar.

Services were held in California on Saturday, August 12, and the body was flown to Atlanta, Ga., where the Thompson Funeral Home of Columbia, S. C., met the plane and brought the body home. Funeral services will be held here on Thursday, August 17, at 4:30 p.m., at the Stephen Greene Memorial Baptist Church, conducted by the Rev. J. I. McGill, with the Rev. John Atkinson of Ridgeway and the Rev. Ollin J. Owens of Winnsboro, assisting.

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
